J. B. Helpman Dies at Lewiston

J. B. Helpman, 90, retired banker and pioneer of central Idaho, died at 10:15 Tuesday night of infirmities of age at St. Joseph's hospital, Lewiston, where he was admitted last Saturday.

Mr. Helpman was born in Hancock county, Ohio, Nov. 19, 1855, and came west in 1889, locating in Oregon. Two years later he came to Idaho and settled at Kendrick to engage in banking. He also had banking interests in Northport. His marriage to Miss Grace Wilcox was solemnized at Moscow in 1891. Mrs. Helpman died October 7, 1938.

Mr. Helpman retired from business in 1924 and made his home in Kendrick until the death of his wife, and since that time had spent his winters here and his summers at Kendrick. He was a member of the Odd Fellows lodge for 65 years and an affiliate of the Woodmen of the World.

Survivors are his son and two daughters, Hugh Helpman and Mrs. Gregory Eaves, both of Lewiston; Mrs. E. P. Roberts, Kendrick; two grandchildren, Hugh Helpman, Jr., Lewiston, and Betty Boyd, Moscow, and a great-grandchild, Susan Margaret Helpman, Lewiston.

The body is at Vassar-Rawls chapel with funeral arrangements pending. — Lewiston Tribune.

EIGHTEEN ATTEND COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETING

Eighteen members of the Kendrick Commercial Club sat down to a chicken dinner at White's Confectionery Monday evening at 6:30, and at the conclusion of the meal adjourned to the city hall for the business session.

L. S. Thurber of the Civic Improvements Committee made a report on general improvements about town and then suggested that from the appearance of the town a general civic clean-up was in order, and suggested that since the town was again the owner of a truck and Marshal Jack Kuykendall "rarin' to go," it was time for owners and renters to clean up their property and all vacant lots. It was then decided to ask the mayor, Walter Brocke, to set the date by proclamation — and he selected the week of April 15th through 20th.

E. T. Long of the Highway Committee reported local roads soft and in generally poor condition, but said that as soon as their new patrol arrived the district would be in a position "to do something about it."

Tom Long also reported for the Agricultural committee, stating that wheat and clover came through the winter in fine shape and were putting on an excellent growth. He also said that from his observation there was less erosion in this section than in any other he had seen.

The matter of the cancer control drive was brought up, and after due discussion the club voted the sum of \$50.00 toward this worthy cause. Mrs. Haerley Eichner is the local drive chairman.

George Brocke brought up the matter of a community hospital, stating that from all information now available government sponsorship of such a project appeared to be available.

A communication was also read regarding government aid or sponsorship of an airport for this section. Mr. Brocke stating that four planes had already been purchased by residents of this area. However, level ground here is at a premium, and the matter was held over for further investigation.

A. O. Kanikkeberg and J. G. Traas, reporting for the Sports committee, said that the baseball organization was shaping up nicely, and Kendrick was scheduled to play its first game of the season on April 28 with Orofino at Orofino, the local grounds being far too muddy to permit even practice sessions.

Mr. Kanikkeberg and Mr. Travis also reported that the local grounds were to be graded and smoothed just as soon as possible — but continuing rains had set the date back indefinitely.

There was also considerable discussion of new lighting and fencing for the diamond. Present plans call for the erection of 18 large poles, each of which is to be surmounted by a 500-candle power light. This will give plenty of illumination for softball games and infield operations on regular baseball.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, adjournment was in order.

Austin, Texas. — The Texas state department of agriculture said Tuesday that President Truman's plan to reduce the loaf weight of bread was illegal in Texas and that it was its "duty" to enforce the legislative-passed regulation.

The department cited Rule 5 under the 1925 revised criminal statutes that provides a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$200 for wholesaling or retailing a loaf of bread that varies in weight more than one ounce either way from standard loaf weights of one pound, one and one-half pounds, or any multiple of one pound and one and one-half pounds.



"Had those persons known of the early danger signals of cancer, and had obtained proper medical treatment in time, the chances are they would be alive today," she said.

Meat Ceilings
Higher retail ceilings for most pork and beef became effective on April 1. The new pork ceilings involve an increase averaging 3/4c a pound and affect three-quarters of all pork cuttings. The other one-fourth of pork cut ceilings including cuts derived from shoulders remain unchanged. The new pork ceilings also include increases in retail ceilings for whole dressed hogs or sides amounting to 1/4c a pound.
The beef ceilings average 1/3c higher than previous retail ceilings. Increases involve about one-third of all beef cuts and are limited in most cases to 1c per pound, with a few increases of 2c a pound and one of 4c per pound. Prices for two-thirds of beef cuts remain unchanged.
