# STATE OF IDAHO

### LOCATION AND TOPOGRAPHY.

This state is bounded on the north for a short distance at the end of the "Pan-Handle" by British Columbia, on the northesat and east by Montana. and east by Wyoming, south by Utah and Nevada, and west by Oregon and Washington. It is irregular in shape (appearing on the map in the form of a gigantic easy chair, with the top to the north, fronting the east), being less than 50 miles wide at the northern boundary, nearly 300 miles along the southern boundary, and 500 miles along the western boundary, embracing an area of 84.600 square miles, being larger than the six New England states with Maryland included. It is larger than the states of New York and Maine combined. The state has an area of 55,228,160 acres. Of this 8,400,000 are classed as mountainous, 15,000,000 as agricultural land, 7,000,000 forest, 25,-000,000 grazing lands, and 600,000 in lakes. Its vast mineral belts are included in the mountain area, as are also most of the forests, stretching along its eastern edge, and separating Idaho from Montana and Wyoming, are the rugged mountains of the Bitter Root, Rocky and Wahsatch ranges. The Bitter Root occupying the northern, the Rocky the central, and the Wahsatch the southern link of its boundary. The "spurs" of these ranges, especially the Wahsatch, extend well over into Idaho, and they contain some of the State's best mineral belts. Their highest peaks reach altitudes ranging from 9,000 to 13,000 feet. On the south and southwest are the Owyhee mountains, which form an important link in the great divide between the waters of the Columbia and the Humboldt. The Sawtooth, Salmon River, Wood River and Boise are among the most prominent mountain ranges in Central Idaho, on the west are the Blue Mountains of Oregon and Washington. Idaho is, therefore, practically mountain locked, although from the south, southeast and west there are numerous depressions through which railways and wagon roads find easy natural access. The mountain scenery in the section north of the Snake River Valley is unsurpassed in any country in the world. The interior is a vast plateau, varying in altitude from 600 feet above the sea in its lowest valleys to 10,000 feet on the top of the highest peaks. Its numerous mountain ranges run in a variety of directions, the trend of the principal ones. however, being southeast to northwest. In these interior ranges are the mineral belts which first attracted general attention to Idaho. Alternating and nestling among the mountain ranges are many valleys, large and small. affording in aggregate a vast area of fertile lands. The arable portions range in size from one to twenty miles in width, and from twenty to one hundred miles in length. Traversing Southern Idaho is an extensive volcanic belt in the basin of the Snake River. This belt stretches far into neighboring territories, being 800 miles in length. In Idaho it averages about 50 miles in width. Some of the best valleys traverse it, but it is more noteworthy as the great winter grazing region of this and adjacent territories. Its nutritous herbs and grasses fatten thousands of cattle and sheep annually.

### CLIMATE.

The climate of Idaho varies owing to the changing altitudes that obtain throughout the State, the annual mean temperature being 45 degrees.

The average or mean annual temperature at Lewiston, in Northern Idaho, is 56 degrees, a milder showing by 5 degrees than is made in Ohio; milder by 10 degrees than Iowa, and milder by 12 degrees than Maine and New Hampshire. Boise City, in Western Central Idaho, with a much greater altitude than Lewiston, has an average temperature of 51 degrees, the same as Ohio, and 4 degrees warmer than Connecticut.

The rain and snowfall at Lewiston is about 24 inches; at Boise, 14.42 inches. In fact, the Snake River Valley is exceptionally mild throughout its course from Shoshone Falls westward and northward to its intersection with the western boundary of the State.

A section of greater mildness than Lewiston lies in the Snake River

Valley, directly south of Mountain Home, Elmore county.

It is not generally understood that there is a large area of the State having an annual precipitation about equal to that of Southern Maryland, where crops are grown without irrigation. This section embraces Kootenai, Shoshone, Latah and parts of Nez Perce, Washington and Idaho counties.

Although the remainder of the State may be considered semi-arid, there are other large areas in the eastern counties where, owing to a kind Providence, the distribution of precipitation is such that the greater fall occurs in the spring months at the time when crops are in greatest need of moisture, thus enabling what is known as "dry farming" to be prosecuted extensively.

At Boise the lowest record during seven consecutive winters was 12 degrees below zero in January, and the highest 108 degrees in July. The signal officer reports that the mercury sank below zero only four times during one period of five years. The coldest weather record in twenty years was the exceptional January, 1888, when the mercury sank to 27 degrees below zero. The normal wind velocity is very low, averaging 12 miles an hour, and seldom exceeding 30. While this is a fair representation of the climate of the agricultural portion of the State, it must be borne in mind that the much more elevated mining districts have winters as harsh as any region in the Alleghenies, the snowfall reaching seven to ten feet on the level. The Owyhee range, in the southwest part of the state, has an exceptionally mild winter climate.

### AGRICULTURE.

The agricultural districts of the State are widely scattered, owing to the broken condition of its surface, but the southern and central portions contain the most of the 25,000 square miles of land suitable for this purpose. There are, however, fine large tracts scattered through the rich valleys of the northern portion, which are well watered by natural springs, numerous streams and heavy precipitation of rains, which makes them more valuable than much of the land in the southern portion, which requires irrigating continually. The agricultural resources of Idaho rank high, and the future for the industry is very promising. All varieties of spring and fall wheat are grown successfully. The average yield being 30 bushels to the acre, and in some places in the northern portion 100 bushels per acre. Barley, oats and rye are profitably grown. Hay, timothy, clover and alfalfa are the leading crops, and yield from six to eight tons per acre for the season and make a large growth for pasture besides. All kinds of vegetables and fruits grow abundantly, also roots and forage plants. Some flax is grown in northern portions: corn in the warm southern counties; also broom corn, sugar cane, tobacco and sweet potatoes.

### DAIRYING.

This is a growing industry all through the northern and southern portions of the State, where access can be had to the railroads, but it is nevertheless very profitable throughout the State, as the products find ready market in the extensive and numerous mining camps where hundreds of men are employed, and which are scattered all through the mountainous regions. The price of butter averages 25 cents per pound the year around, and is much higher in the mining regions. The products of the farm, garden and dairy are taken into those camps by farmers and sold at good figures, which gives them a large revenue.

### FRUIT GROWING.

This industry has increased with great rapidity during the past few years, until it has become on of the leading industries of the State. Apples, prunes, pears, peaches, apricots, nectarines, plums and cherries, and all varieties of small fruits are extensively and profitably raised and fast becoming famous for perfection in quality, superior flavor and high color in all markets in the country. Hardy fruits can be found on many of the high elevations. The crop seldom fails—some orchards yield as high as 50,000 bushels of fruit annually. Grapes suceed admirably, and attain a high perfection in size and quality for table use and wine making, while berries of all kinds grow with great vigor and yield most extravagant crops.

### STOCK RAISING.

Idaho ranks high as a stock growing state. It contains a summer, winter and spring range, suitable to horses, cattle and sheep. The herds grazing from the valleys in winter and follow the range up the mountains in summer. The natural grasses are usually found in such quantities the year round that stock will thrive without hay or grain.

The annual value of horses, cattle, hogs and sheep exceeds \$30,000,000.

### IRRIGATION.

The vast and forbidding desert of Idaho, in the drainage basin of the Snake River, is to be transformed, it is promised, into a green garden of productiveness under the national irrigation law by the government engineers. The government has already spent over \$3,000,000 in irrigation works and a vast amount of arid land has been transformed into a veritable garden of Eden. In irrigated parts of the State apples, plums, apricots, grapes and melons reach a high state of perfection, men have become wealthy from the careful cultivation of twenty and forty-acre tracts, and enough can be raised from five acres to support a family. The desert lands of Minidoka, producing only sage brush, are now only waiting water. Ten years will be allowed for the settler to pay back to the government the cost of the works, divided pro rata among the lands reclaimed. Neither the Desert Land act nor the commutation clause of the Homestead act can be utilized for entering land under any of these government irrigation projects, but only the old-time Homestead law, requiring actual residence and improvement for the full period of five years. Practically all the great Minidoka tract is today public land, so that the future homemaker will deal directly with Uncle Sam. and will pay no profit to the middleman or speculator. At the point where the water is to be taken from the Snake River, just at the head of the Minidoka Rapids, the Snake has cut its way, during countless centuries, through a bed of solid, black lava rock. The government surveys show that it will be possible to irrigate by gravity about 68,000 acres of good land. In addition to this it is possible to divert about 3,000 cubit feet of water a second, and by turning it back into the river develope about 17,000 horse power. The western portion of these plains will, in a few years, be the most thickly settled region of Idaho under this system of irrigation, as the Boise, Payette and Weiser Rivers run parallel within easy distance of each other, and the diversion of their waters will reclaim an immense area of land.

### LUMBER AND TIMBER.

This industry, although quite extensive in some locations, does not compare as yet with the coast slope, but great preparations are being made to push it as soon as transportation facilities are furnished them. The forest

area of Idaho is computed to contain an area of 7,000,000 acres, composed of bull, white and yellow pine, red and yellow fir, white cedar, hemlock, cottonwood, tamarack, white red and black spruce, scrub oak, mountain mahogany, birch, alder, willow and some yew trees. In many counties the timber is very dense and of the finest quality. Much of these lands are being taken up by parties representing large interests, and will soon make extensive preparations for converting the forests into lumber. The white pine and red fir of the State exceeds anything of its kind in the country.

### MINERALS.

Quite a space would have to be devoted to this subject to do justice to the matter, but it is one of the leading industries of the State, and one of the most profitable. Since the first discovery of gold in 1863, the output of gold and silver has been in excess of \$400,000,000. The lead mines of the Coeur d'Alene district in Shoshone county are the richest in the world, and produce 55 per cent. of the lead in the United States. Extensive and rich copper fields have been found in different parts of the State.

Owyhee county has some of the best opal fields in the United State, and the brilliancy of the stones compare favorably with any found elsewhere. Marble has been found in large quantities, and fine quality in Bear Lake, Cassia and other counties. Vast coal fields have been located, and are simply waiting for the means of transportation facilities to be fully developed.

Rubies are found in Latah county, and the stone quarries of fine granite

and other grades are found in many places.

### POPULATION.

The population of the State of Idaho, according to the United States Census of 1900, is given at 161,772. The present estimated population is 400,000.

### IDAHO COMMERCIAL LAWS

Prepared especially for this publication by Joseph T. Pence, of the Boise City Bar.

Acknowledgments may be taken within the state at any place, by a Justice or Clerk of the Supreme Court; within the city, county or district, for which the officer was elected or appointed, a judge or vlerk of a court of record; a County Recorder; a Notary Public, or a Justice of the Peace. Without the state, but within the United States, and the jurisdiction of the officer; a justice, judge or clerk of any United States, State, or Territorial Court of Record; a commissioner appointed by the Governor; a Notary Public, or any officer having authority under the laws of the state or territory where the

acknowledgment is taken. Without the United States, a Minister, Commissioner, Charge d'Affairs, a Consul or Vice-Consul, of the United States resident and accredited where taken. Judge of a Court of Record of the county where taken, Commissioner appointed by the Governor, or a Notary Public. Deputies may take in the name of their principals. A conveyance or incumbrance of the homestead, or that part of the community property occupied or used by the husband and wife as a residence, is void unless acknowledged by the wife.

ACTIONS-Common law pleading abolished and Code system adopted.

ARREST-(Civil)-Defendant may be arrested in action for recovery of money or damages arising upon contract, where he is about to depart from State, with intent to defraud creditors, or when action is for wilful injury to person, character or property, knowing property to belong to another; in action for fine or penalty, on promise to marry, or for property or money embezzled, or fraudulently misapplied, or converted to his own use by a public officer, or an officer of a corporation, attorney, factor broker, agent or clerk, in the course of his employment, as such, or by any other person in a fiduciary capacity; or for misconduct or neglect in office or in a professional employment, or for a wilful violation of duty; in an action to recover possession of personal property unjustly detained when the property or any part thereof has been concealed, removed or disposed of to prevent its being found or taken by the sheriff. When defendant has been guilty of fraud in contracting the debt or incurring the obligation for which the action is brought, or in concealing or disposing of the property, for the taking, detention or conversion of which the action is brought. When the defendant has removed or disposed of his property, or is about to do so, with intent to defraud creditors. Affidavit showing existence of necessary facts and bond required.

(Federal Statute on Bankruptcy abrogates State law.)

NEGOTIABLE INSTRUMENTS-What is known as the "Uniform Negotiable Instrument Law" is operative in the State of Idaho, since March 10, 1903, as to all instruments of that character made and delivered since said

ATTACHMENTS-May issue in all actions upon judgments or contracts for the direct payment of money, unsecured by mortgage or lien upon real or personal property, or if so secured, when such security has without any act of the plaintiff or person to whom the same was given, become valueless; also in all cases in an action upon a judgment or contract against a non-resident. No showing of fraud is necessary. Affidavit must be filed and undertaking given before writ issues. Any creditor of a defendant may share pro rata with the attaching creditor by starting suit within 60 days after posting of notice of attaching creditor.

GIVING OF WORTHLESS CHECKS AND DRAFTS—Any person who shall in payment of any debt in whatsoever manner contracted give any check or draft upon any bank or banking association wherein such person shall not or draft funds or credit for the payment of the same shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not to exceed five a misted dollars or imprisoned in the county jail not to exceed six months, or both such fine and imprisonment. Effective May 7, 1903.

Effective May 7, 1903. COURTS-Justice's Court has civil jurisdiction up to \$300; Probate Court has civil jurisdiction up to \$500. District Courts are courts of general jurisdiction.

DEEDS-Deeds must be signed by grantors, or attorney in fact authorized in writing and proved or acknowledged, and recorded in the office of the Recorder of the county where the property is situated. Husband can convey all common property except homestead or residence without signature of wife. Deeds given to secure a debt are treated as mortgages.

Dower and Courtesy are abolished.

Wife may convey her separate property without signature of husband.

EXECUTIONS-May issue at any time within five years from rendition of judgment. One year is allowed debtor for redemption of real estate. Judgments docketed in the office of the Clerk of the District Court are liens upon real estate of debtor in the county for two years.

EXEMPTIONS—Homestead to the value of \$5,000, by head of family, to value of \$1,000 by any other person may be selected by written instrument duly acknowledged and recorded; chairs, table, desks, books to the value of \$200; household furniture, including sewing machine, stoves and beds to value of \$300, wearing apparel, pictures, six months' provisions, two cows and hogs, with their calves or pigs; farming utensils to the value of \$300; team, harness, wagon and six months' feed; water right of 160 inches; crops grow. ing or grown on fifty acres of land cultivated by debtor; mechanics' or artisans' tools to value of \$500; professional instruments, libraries and office furniture; miner's cabin to value of \$500; his implements to value of \$200; prospector's saddle and pack animal and implements to value of \$250; team,

vehicle and six months' feed of drayman, peddler, physician or clergyman; debtors' earnings for thirty days, if necessary for family; homestead association shares worth \$1,000; life insurance purchasable yearly premium of \$250: arms required to be kept by law, and one gun. No article exempt on judgment recovered for purchase price.

AND BUSINESS DIRECTORY.

INTEREST-Legal rate, seven per cent; contract limit, twelve per cent; usury forfeits all interest and costs to creditor and renders debtor liable to forfeiture to school fund of ten per cent per annum on the entire principal. whether part payments have been made or not. Innocent indorsee protected. Compound interest is not allowed, and is held usurious by Supreme Court.

JUDGMENTS-Executions on may issue at any time within five years from date; are a lien on realty of debtor for two years.

LIMITATIONS-Involving real property, five years; on judgments and actions for mense profits of real estate, six years; written contracts, five years; oral contracts, accounts, etc, four years; for relief on ground of fraud or mistake, three years.

MARRIED PERSONS-Husband and wife must join in all conveyances or mortgages of homestead, or the realty occupied by them as a residence. The husband may mortgage or convey all other realty without the wife's joining. All property acquired by either husband or wife after marriage. except as hereafter mentioned, is community property. The husband has full control and management of the community property, and it is liable for his debts. Property owned before marriage by the husband or wife, or acquired after by gift, devise or descent, or that she shall acquire with the proceeds of her separate property is separate property. Wife's separate property not liable for husband's debts.

- Sec. 2. During the continuance of the marriage the wife has the management, control and absolute power of disposition of her separate property, and may bargain, sell and convey her real and personal property, and may enter into any contract with reference to the same in the same manner and to the same extent and with like effect as a married man may in relation to his real and personal property; provided, that the husband shall be bound by such contracts to no greater extent or effect than his wife under similar circumstances would be bound by his contracts.
- Sec. 3. A woman may, while married, sue and be sued in the same manner as if she were single; provided, that except in actions between husband and wife, the husband shall not be chargeable in any manner with the wife's costs or other expenses of suit.
- Sec. 4. Nothing in this act contained shall invalidate, alter or change any marriage settlement now made or to be made hereafter. Effective May 7, 1903.

MORTGAGES ON REAL ESTATE-Must be executed and recorded in the same manner as deeds, and foreclosed by action in the District Court.

POWER OF ATTORNEY-Must be singed, acknowledged and recorded as conveyances of real estate; if realty is dealt with, of married woman relating to her sparate property, need not be signed by her husband. May be revoked by an instrument executed in the same manner.

REDEMPTION-Land sold on execution or foreclosure one year, sixty days each for each subsequent redemption, but within the one year.

Reviver of action only by written instrument.

STAY OF EXECUTION—Only after appeal taken, by an undertaking to pay judgment.

# IDAHO FISH AND GAME LAWS.

(Synopsis of the Fish and Game Laws approved March 4, 1907.)

Sec. 1. The administration of the fish and game law of the state is delegated primarily to the State Fish and Game Warden, and to one or more deputies in each county. These officers, together with Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, City Marshals and Police Officers, who are constituted exofficio Fish and Game Wardens, are empowered to enforce the game laws of the state, by search and seizure and the arrest of violaters of the law, with or without warrants.

Sec. 3. It is unlawful for any person to destroy any of the fish and game of the state, or to capture or kill any of the game animals or birds in violation of the laws. Any person or association or corporation may establish or own a private park, lake or stream, or both, and may preserve and propagate such fish and game which would be protected by the Game Warden. Such fish and game may be used by the owner as he sees fit, but he will not be entitled to sell the same out of season, and such owner will be surrounded by the same restrictions for shipping as those fishing or hunting in public domains of the state. It is a misdemeanor for anyone to ship fish or game without a license, and express, railroad and other transportation companies or common carriers are forbidden to receive any fish or game for shipment unless they are presented with a duplicate of such licensed shipping permit. Sec. 4. It is unlawful to fish with seine, net, spear, basket, trap or

similar devices, except in Bear Lake, from July 15th to the following May 1st. It is, however, lawful to catch any kind of fish with hook and line attached to a pole held in the hand, at any time of the year.

It is further provided that salmon may be speared or caught on a four-

It is unlawful to catch any kind of fish through the ice at any time of the year or to fish within three hundred (300) feet of a fish ladder in any public

Sec. 4. The sale of game or fish is forbidden by this act at any time of water. the year, except as provided in Section 3. It is provided, however, that before any person shall use a seine in the waters of Bear Lake, such person shall any person small bake, such person small first procure the presence of some person authorized by the Game Warden, and such person thus appointed shall receive as compensation not to exceed and such 200 Dollars per day from the person drawing the seine, and the fish so caught or taken from said Bear Lake may be sold upon a permit issued by the State Game Warden.

Sec. 5. The amount of fish taken from public waters of the state is limited to twenty (20) pounds of trout, bass, cat-fish or sunfish in any one day, and all persons are forbidden to have more than thirty (30) pounds of fish in their possession at any one time. It is unlawful to take bass or trout from any of the waters of the state less than four (4) inches in length, and the possession of such fish is misdemeanor.

Sec. 6. It is unlawful to deposit sawdust or chemicals in the streams,

or anything that will drive the fish away or destroy them. Sec. 7. Mongolian pheasants and Canadian grouse are protected for a period of four (4) years, and the killing of these birds within that period is forbidden.

Quail are protected between the first day of December and the first day of November, but they may be killed between the first of November and the first of December, by procuring a license.

Killing more than eighteen (18) birds in any one day is forbidden, and they cannot be sold at any time.

It is unlawful for any person to ensuare or entrap any of the birds protected by the state at any time of the year.

Sage hens are protected all the year around, except from the first day of August to the first day of September, and no more than twelve (12) may be killed in any one day.

Snipe or plover are protected except between the fifteenth day of Septem-

ber and the first day of January.

The season for prairie chickens, partridge, pheasants, turtle doves, etc., is between Septembeer 1st and December 1st, and it is unlawful to hunt them at any other season of the year.

The season for grouse is between August 15th and September 1st. For wild ducks between September 15th and January 1st. The number that may

be killed in any one day is limited to twenty-four (24.)

The season for wild geese is the same, and the number to be killed in any one day is limited to three (3.)

It is a misdemeanor to destroy the nests, eggs or young birds of any game bird during the breeding season.

Sec. 8. The season for moose, buffalo, antelope, beaver, deer, elk, sheep and goats is from September 15th to December 31st, but trapping by means of pitfalls or other means is forbidden at all times, and the use of dogs to hunt, chase or capture them is also forbidden at all times.

Females may hunt or fish without a license, but every male must have a license before he can do either, and must be over twelve years of age. The license for bonafide residents of the state is one (\$1.00) dollar, to be paid anyjustice of the peace, or probate judge, or to the State Game and Fish Warden. The license will state the name and place and residence of the person holding the same, and cannot be transferred.

A non-resident must pay twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars, which will entitle him to permission to hunt and to kill any kind of big or small game. For five (\$5.00) Dollars a non-resident will receive a bird license, which will permit him to hunt and kill such number of each kind of birds as is stipulated in the license. For one (\$1.00) Dollar a non-resident may receive a license which will permit him to fish with hook and line in any of the streams or public waters of the state.

The licenses all have a synopsis of the game laws on the back thereof.

Sec. 9. It is unlawful during the open season of the year for any person to hunt or kill more than one elk, two deer, one mountain sheep, one mountain goat; and all licenses issued state the number of each kind of animals that may be killed.

The license entitles the holder to ship within or without the state, under direction of the Game Warden.

It is unlawful for any person or corporation to sell any fish or birds protected by this act and any such attempt will be punished as provided by this

- Sec. 10. Transportation companies and common carriers and their employes are forbidden to receive for shipment any game or fish except as provided by the same.
- Sec. 11. Song birds are protected and the destruction of any birds of this nature is forbidden by law, except the English sparrow, magpie and bee bird.
- Sec. 12. It is the duty of the officers named in Section 1 to inspect all depots, warehouses, restaurants, hotels and market places and prevent the shipment of fish and game contrary to law.
- Sec. 13. For the purpose of protecting the wild game of the state it is necessary to protect the forests from the ravages of fire, and it is unlawful for any person to willfully or maliciously set on fire any timber, underbrush or grass, and upon conviction thereof any person may be punished by a fine not exceeding three hundred (\$300.00) Dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding six (6) months, or both.

Sec. 14. Any person who shall build a fire in or near any forest or other inflamable material upon the public domain, shall before leaving said fire totally extinguish the same; failing to do so he may be convicted and fined as above stated.

Sec. 15. It is the duty of the Game Wardens, deputies, and other officers above mentioned, to see that all the provisions of this act are enforced.

above mentioned, to see that are provided of the provided of the sec. 16. The damming of streams to prevent fish from going up or down is forbidden, and all persons or corporations operating any mill, factory or power plant or any other manufacturing concern run by water and having either head or tail races without first furnishing suitable screens or other devices to prevent fish from entering therein, are subject to conviction and the misdemeanor is punishable as such.

Sec. 17. All persons or corporations who may divert for irrigation or other purposes from any of the natural streams shall erect and maintain an appliance at the head of a ditch or canal for the purpose of preventing fish from entering therein, as the Game Warden may deem necessary. Failure and neglect to do so after ten days' notice in writing creates a liability to have the place closed by the Game Warden.

Sec. 18. Any person who shall have in his possession any game, fish or Sec. 18. Any person who shall have in his possession any game, fish or birds, taken wilfully, is guilty of a misdemeanor. It is unlawful to store or receive any fish or game within the state except as follows: During the open season for such game or fish, when same is stored by the person law open season of it, and any person receiving such game or fish for cold storage shall be guilty of misdemeanor if they have in their possession any such game after the close of the season.

Sec. 19. Any fish or game warden appointed under the provisions of this act or any sheriff, or deputy sheriff, city marshal or police officer may, without warrant, arrest any person found violating any of the provisions of this

act. Sec. 20. Any officer neglecting to do his duty shall be guilty of a mis-

demeanor.

Sec. 21. All acts and parts of this now in force relative to the protection of fish and game are hereby repealed.

### IDAHO MINING LAWS

(Abridgement of the Mining Laws of the State of Idaho, Locating Claims.) The locator, at the time of making the discovery of such vein or lode, must erect a monument at such place of discovery, upon which he must place his name, the name of the claim, the date of discovery and distance claimed his name, the vein each way from such monument. Within ten days from the along the vein each way from such monument. Within ten days from the along of discovery he must mark the boundaries of his claim by establishing date of corner thereof, and at any angle in the side lines, a monument, at each with the name of the claim and the corner or angle it represents; marked the time of so marking his boundaries he must post at his discovery also at this notice of location, in which must be stated:

- 1. The name of locator.
- 2. The name of the claim.
- 3. The date of discovery.
- 4. The direction and distance claimed along the ledge from the discovery.
  - 5. The distance claimed on each side of the middle of the ledge.
- 6. The distance and direction from the discovery monument, to such natural object or permanent monument, if any such there be, as will fix and describe in the notice itself, the location of the claim.

Within sixty days after such location, the locator or his assigns, must sink a shaft upon the lode to the depth of at least ten feet from the lowest part of the rim of such shaft at the surface. And of not less than sixteen square feet area. Any located claim upon which work has been done in compliance with the above requirements is not, unless abandoned, subject to relocation for a period of ninety days from and after the date of location.

Within ninety days after the location of the claim the locator or his assigns must file for record in the office of the county recorder of the county or of the deputy recorder of the mining district in which the claim is situated, a substantial copy of his notice of location.

The fee for administering the oath and recording the foregoing affidavit, when taken before the county recorder or deputy mining recorder shall be fifty cents. Such affidavit, or a certified copy thereof in case the original is lost shall be prima facie evidence of the performance of such labor.

The location of abandoned claims shall be done in the same manner as if the location were of a new claim; but the locator may instead of sinking a new discovery shaft, sink the original discovery shaft ten feet deeper than it was at the time of his location.

No location notice shall claim more than one location, whether the location is made by one or several locators, and if it purport to claim more than one location it is absolutely void.

For the convenience of prospectors and locators, the County Recorders of the several counties must appoint a deputy at any place where he may deem it necessary, and at all places more than twenty miles distance from an existing office whenever ten or more mining locators interested, petition for the appointment of a deputy. Upon failure of any recorder to appoint a deputy for ten days after the petition in writing has been presented to him, the resident miners in such district may appoint temporarily, one of their number to act as the recorder for the district.

It is the duty of the County Recorder to forward within fourteen days to the Deputy Mining Recorder of the district where the claim is located, all location notices, both quartz and placer, not already recorded in such district, and the Deputy Mining Recorder shall record all such notices in his records and return the same to the County Recorder.

Placer claims, as mentioned in sectin 2329, of the Revised Statutes of the United States, may be located for the purpose of mining deposits and

precious stones after the discovery of such deposits.

The locator of any placer mining claim located for the purpose of mining placer deposits or precious stones, must at the time of making the locaing placer deposits of precious stones, must as is required in the location, place a substantial post or monument as is required in the location of quartz claims at each corner of the location, and must also post on one of the same a notice of location containing the date of the location, one of the same a notice of location containing the date of the location, the name of the locator, the name and dimensions of the claim, the mining disname of the location, the hand and dimensions of situated. Within fifteen strict (if any) and county in which the same is situated. Within fifteen days after making the location, the locator must make an excavation upon the claim of not less than one hundred cubic feet, for the purpose of prospecting the same. Within thirty days after the location, the locator must file for record in the office of the County Recorder of the county, or of the Deputy Recorder of the mining district in which the claim is situated, a substantial copy of his copy of notice of location, to which must be attached an affidavit such as is required in the case of quartz claims.

At or before the time of presenting a location notice for record, whether it be for a quartz or placer claim, one of the locators named in the same must make and subscribe an affidavit, in writing on or attached on the notice, substantially in the following form, to-wit:

I. ..... do solemnly swear that I am a citizen of the United States of America (or have declared my intentions to become such) and that I am acquainted with the mining ground described in this notice of location, and herewith called the .....ledge, lode or claim. that the ground and claim herein described or any part thereof has not, to the best of my knowledge and belief, been located according to the laws of the United States and of this State, or if so located, that the same has been abandoned or forfeited by reason of the failure of such former locators to comply in respect thereto with the requirements of the said laws, and (in case of quartz claims) that I have opened new ground to the extent or depth of ten feet as required by the laws of Idaho.

The fee to be tendered for making such record, administering the oath to the locator and certifying the same, for indexing the names appearing on the notice and to include recording the notice by the recorder, as here inafter required, and the indexing by said recorder, is two dollars.

### MINING PARTNERSHIP.

A mining partnership exists when two or more persons who own or acquire a mining claim for the purpose of working it and extracting the mineral therefrom are actually engaged in working the same.

A purchaser of the interest of a partner in a mine when the partnership engaged in working it takes with it notice of all liens resulting from the relation of the partners to each other and to the creditors of the partnership.

### RIGHT OF WAY ACROSS CLAIM.

The owner, locator, or occupant of a mining claim, whether patented under the laws of the United States or held by location or possession, may nade and acquire a right of way for ingress and egress, when necessary in have and such mining claim, of way for ingress and egress, when necessary in working such mining claim, over and across the lands or mining claims of others, whether patented or otherwise.

### MINING TUNNELS.

Any person or company who has or may hereafter have a tunnel or crosscut, the mouth of which is located upon his own ground or upon the ground in his lawful occupation, shall have the right to drive and continue the same through and across any located or patented claim in front of the mouth of such tunnel, but not to follow or drive upon any vein belonging to the owner of such claim.

Each tunnel or cross-cut may be driven and worked for the purpose of drainage and for the purpose of reaching and working mining ground of the tunnel owner beyond the intersected claim. The owner or owners of any vein or any claim or claims so intersected, or his duly authorized agent, shall have the right to enter such tunnel upon application to the owner or owners or person in charge of such tunnel without resorting to any process of law for the purpose of making a survey and inspecting such vein or veins as may be crossed within the boundary lines of such intersected claim, and if the owner or owners of such tunnel shall, by bulk heading, damming back, or in any manner prevent the inspection of survey herein provided for, or if such owner or owners shall in any manner prevent the natural drainage of water from such intersected claim or claims without the consent of the owner or owners thereof, it shall work a forfeiture of all rights granted under section 1 of this act.

If any ore, the property of the owner of the claim intersected or crossed, be extracted in driving such tunnel, it shall be the property of the owner of the vein from which it was taken, and the owner of the tunnel shall be liable for all actual damages or injury done to the owner of the claim crossed by

In all actions between the tunnel owner of others involving the right to any vein discovered in such tunnel, the burden of proving that the vein so discovered is not the property of the adverse claimant in such action shall be on the tunnel owner.

### RECORDING MINING CONTRACTS.

Written contracts relating to prospecting or mining, or to the formation of co-partnership for that purpose, when signed by the parties thereto and indorsed by at least one witness, may be recorded in the office of the county recorder of the county wherein it is proposed to prosecute the business of said co-partnership, or where the property affected by such contract is

Such record shall be constructive notice to all persons of the matters contained in such contract or co-partnership agreement.

### SPECIAL NOTICE.

It shall be the duty of any person, persons, company or corporation, engaged in working any mine, mines, mining premises or in developing any mining claim or claims, whether quartz or placer, or in the running of any tunnel, or in the erection or repair of any building or other structure, or in the construction of any canal, ditch, railroad, wagon road or aqueduct, in every case where mechanics or laborers are employed in or about the properties above mentioned, to make, record and publish a statement, under oath, setting forth such data as are provided in section 2 of this act.

The statement required by the preceding section shall contain the follow-

1. The name or names of the owner or owners of the mine, mines, mining claim or premises, tunnel, building, canal, ditch, railroad, wagon road, aqueduct or other structure upon which work is being done or upon which it is intended to begin work.

2. The name or names of the person, persons, company or corporation engaged in or who contemplate engaging in work upon any of the properties or structures mentioned herein.

### INSPECTOR OF MINES.

The Inspector of Mines shall receive as full compensation for his services a salary of twelve hundred dollars per annum and ten cents a mile vices a straight mile actually traveled dollars per annum and ten cents a for each mile actually traveled in the discharge of his official duties, and the for each expenses for clerk hire, postage, stationery, printing and the compensation of deputies.

The Inspector of Mines shall not, at the time of his appointment, or any time during his term of office, be an officer, director or employe in or of any time during corporation in this State, or in or of any milling corporation in the state engaged in the business of smelting or reducing ores.

It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Mines, at least once each year, to visit in person each mining county in the State of Idaho and examine all to vision mines therein as, in his judgment may require examination for the purpose of determining the condition of such mines as to safety and to purpose information and statistics relative to mines and mining and the mineral resources of the State, and to collect, arrange and classify mineral and resolutional specimens found in this State and to forward the same to the State School of Mines.

It is hereby made the duty of the owner, lessor, lessee, agent, manager other person in charge of each and every mine, of whatever kind or character, within the State to forward to the Inspector of Mines at his office, not later than the first day of June in each year, a detailed report showing the character of the mine, the number of men then employed and the estimated maximum number of men to be employed therein during the ensuing years.

Whenever the Inspector of Mines shall receive a formal complaint in writing, signed by three or more persons, setting forth that the mine in which they are employed is dangerous in any respect, he shall, in person. visit and examine such mine: Provided, That all complaints shall be duly verified by the parties complaining before some officer authorized by law to administer oaths.

And it shall be the duty of the Inspector of Mines, upon the neglect or refusal of any owner, lessor, lessee, agent, manager, or other person, in charge of any mine or working, notified of the unsafe or dangerous condition of his mine, promptly to comply with the requirements of the notice served upon him to at once notify the attorney general of such neglect or refusal, and the attorney general must thereupon immediately commence action in the name of the State against the party so notified for the recovery of the penalty mentioned in section 5, in any court of competent jurisdiction, and the amount so recovered shall be paid into the general school fund of the state and constitute a part thereof.

With the consent and approval of the governor, the Inspector of Mines may appoint such deputy inspector as in his judgment may be necessary. Such deputy inspectors shall be allowed as full compensation for all services five dollars per day for each day actually engaged in the performance of their duties.

Whenever a serious or fatal accident shall occur in any mine in the State of Idaho, it shall be the duty of the owner, lessor, lessee, agent, manager or other person in charge thereof, immediately and by the quickest means, to notify the Inspector of Mines or his deputy, as may be most convenient, of such accident; and upon receiving such notice, the Inspector or his deputy, or both, shall at once repair to the place of the accident and investigate fully the cause of such accident, and the Inspector or his deputy shall be present at any coroner's inquest held over the remains of any person or persons killed in any such accident, and shall have the power at such inquest to examine and cross-examine witnesses, and may have process to compel the attendance of necesary witnesses at such inquest.
