Trains Delayed By Slide
The midnight train Sunday night failed to arrive in Kendrick, it being cut-off by another big slide in the hillside some three miles above town.

A work train was promptly brought in from Lewiston, and another from Spokane, and attacking the huge pile of earth and rock from both ends, the tracks were opened shortly after noon on Monday, but a work train was still on duty Tuesday, cleaning up debris.

This spot is the same one on which slides have occurred on numerous occasions in the past. It is "springy" and presents a real engineering problem when wet weather comes.

KENDRICK CO-OPERATIVE CREAMERY PAYS OFF DEBT

On Tuesday morning of this week a check in the sum of \$7,904.84, representing the unpaid balance of the debt of the Kendrick Co-operative Creamery, Inc., was mailed to the Farm Security Administration at Denver — and now the creamery is free of all indebtedness and operating on its own — and, say the directors and its employees, "it's a grand and glorious feeling!"

This local business institution was organized in July, August and September of 1942, purchasing the building, lockers and equipment of the Thomas Creamery, and began active operation October 1, 1942, under the management of Frank G. Harris, formerly of the Mutual Creamery, Lewiston. At that time the total indebtedness of the institution was \$13,000.00, the money being secured from the Farm Security Administration.

Since its opening day the business has enjoyed a steady growth. Not only did it pay its own way, but permitted steady improvement in the building and equipment. For example, many steel lockers were installed in the locker department; a quick freeze and sharp room were installed; complete modern equipment for making ice cream was purchased and put into use; display and storage cabinets for butter and ice cream and other dairy products were installed in the sales department; the office was remodeled and complete new equipment installed; the main building renovated, and many minor changes in the nature of improvements made, until, today, Kendrick has one of the finest and most modern creameries for a town of its size to be found anywhere.

The last department to be put in — the ice cream — has not been able to operate at anywhere near capacity due to the very strict rationing of sugar, but that has not prevented the product from joining the others put out by the firm in the top quality bracket.

It is hoped that next spring a new ice maker and ice flake machine can be installed, and that the ice cream department will be able to produce at a higher rate.

Other improvements are also planned in building and equipment. These, however, will have to be governed by "availability."

At the present time the business, now free of all debt, is owned by approximately 300 members — and the list is steadily growing.

Two managers have worked with the board of directors of the institution to date, Kenneth G. Powell, an employee since the organization was formed, succeeding Mr. Harris who resigned last summer, due to ill health; Mr. Powell resigning last month to begin business for himself at Troy. On Dec. 1, the management was assumed by Robert South, who has had more than 16 years experience in the creamery business.

The directors and Mr. South are looking forward with every expectation that the business will continue to grow and prosper — a view that is shared by the membership and the community it serves as a whole.

New Manager Assumes Duties

Robert South, Enumclaw, Wn., arrived here Friday of last week to begin his new duties as manager of the Kendrick Co-operative Creamery. He replaces Kenneth Powell, an employee for the past four years, who resigned to open his own creamery at Troy.

Mr. South has had some 16 years experience as a butter maker, having begun his creamery training at Cottonwood, going from there to the Mutual Creamery in Lewiston; the Golden Grain Creamery, also Lewiston, and then to Enumclaw, where he was foreman of a big creamery.

It can easily be seen, therefore, that Mr. South does not lack experience, and there is no doubt whatever but that he will continue to produce the high quality products for which the local institution is noted.

Mr. South is married, and expects to be joined here by his wife as soon as an apartment becomes available. Kendrick will welcome these newcomers to our community.
