10,000 GALLONS OF GASOLINE LOST WHEN TANK BLOWS UP

Last Thursday morning about 10:00 o'clock an explosion occurred in the east end of town when a 12,000-gallon gasoline storage tank belonging to E. A. Deobald, "blew its end" so to speak. A tank truck had pulled alongside the storage plant, near the Deobald Garage, and was in the act of pumping gasoline into the big tank when it exploded with a "whoosh" that was heard for blocks — and dumped the approximately 10,000 gallons of gasoline it contained, onto the ground — blowing the east end of the tank out completely. Luckily there was no spark, and as a result no fire followed the explosion.

The cause of the tank blowing up was a sticking vent valve in the top, which evidently had drawn some moisture and frozen shut. Thus, as the pressure of the pump, which delivers about 80 gallons a minute was added to the weight of the gasoline (about 30 tons) the tank just could not "take it" and the whole end let loose, sailing approximately 15 feet through the air and striking, with the weight of the gasoline behind it, a trailer house belonging to Henry Jones, which was parked on adjoining ground.

The combined weight of the tank end and gasoline literally "bashed in" one side of the trailer house. The trailer was unoccupied and had no fire in it or electrical connections, and this, too, as a lucky item.

As the gasoline "whooshed" from the tank, the tank itself buckled on its steel mountings and wooden "cradles" and moved several inches westward, leaving deep dimples in the heavy metal.

In a very short time the Kendrick Volunteer Fire Department was on the job, roped off the area, and began washing the gasoline into the ground and sewer with fire hoses. The area was kept roped off that night and part of the next day.

Henry Jones, deputy fire warden, dared not start a fire in the forestry warehouse and garage which adjoined the area, until late the following day, for fear a spark might settle on the gasoline soaked ground and snow, and cause a blaze. Residents in the area were a little nervous as they looked out their back doors and saw gasoline in pools and the "pinkish" stained snow.

The remaining gasoline in the big tank truck, about 1,500 gallons, was taken to the Kendrick Rochdale Co. tanks and unloaded.

Mr. Deobald estimates the loss of gasoline and tank at about \$5,000.00. Two small tanks were hooked up Saturday to permit resumption of "regular" gasoline sales, and the big tank will be repaired or replaced as soon as possible.

Kendrick Creamery Sold
A deal was consummated last week whereby Idaho Dairy Products of Moscow, became the owners in a "right to do business way" of the Kendrick Creamery, purchasing it from Oscar Medalen and son, Allan, who have operated it for the past two and a half years.

No machinery, with the exception of a bottle washing machine, was involved in the transaction, and the locker boxes and their operation will not be affected.

Milk, cream, ice cream, butter, cottage cheese, etc., will no longer be available at the creamery, but will be for sale at the local stores and confectionery stores — varying according to item involved.

Cream will be received at the creamery building as in the past, but will go out by truck three times weekly, with empty cans returning on the following trip.

Mercury Gets Exercise
Following the bitter cold of Tuesday night of last week, the mercury here began a steady rise, until it hit a high of 40 degrees above on Friday — accompanied by a slashing rain that turned local streets and highways into a sea of slush. This was followed by a drop to 20 above, leaving everything a glaze of ice. On Saturday the thermometer read 34 degrees, and the attendant thawing really made roads slick.

Sunday a blizzard of about an hour and a half duration visited us, depositing more snow — and the state and district snowplows, which had been getting pretty steady work-outs, again took to the highways — and found plenty of work to do.

Since that time the mercury has been sitting in the "upper 20s" most of the time, day and night, with an occasional snow shower. Here in the canyon about two inches of snow and ice covers the ground, but on top the hills it runs up to as high as 12 inches.

Many, many cars and trucks have slid into ditches in this section; the highway crews and farmers reporting pulling them back on the road in almost "wholesale" proportions, but no serious accidents have been reported.


