Tree Farming Defined

A Tree Farm is an area of privately owned forest land dedicated to continuous growth and production of forest crops for commercial purposes. Owners of timberlands are eligible to apply for certification of forest areas as Tree Farms if they meet the following requirements:

1. Assure his willingness to use the land under his control for the production of forest crops;

2. Provide reasonable protection from fire, insects and disease, and from damage by excessive grazing;

3. Harvest forest crops from his Tree Farm in a manner which will assure future crops.

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

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

Discussing that recent double page spread in the Saturday Evening Post "enticing young, innocent children to the printing and publishing game", Editor Maurice Tudor, of the STONE COUNTY LEADER, of Mountain View, Ark., contends stoutly that "it didn't tell all".

AREA'S POWER WOES OUTLINED

Will Be Difficult to Meet Needs, Council Told

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14. (AP) — The Pacific Northwest will have an even more difficult time in meeting hydroelectric power needs than had been expected, the Bonneville power administration's advisory council was told today.

In the coming water year it will be difficult to meet firm demands under median streamflow conditions and steam will have to be called on for 235,000 kilowatts to keep interruptible contracts filled.

Only if there is early construction of all projects where applications have been made to the federal power commission — at Mountain Sheep, Pleasant Valley, Rocky Reach and others — will all loads be served under median conditions in the next 10 years.
