Fire swept through the upper story of the John Wilson home at Kendrick early Sunday morning, leaving the house in a weakened and roofless state. The Wilsons were not at home at the time of the blaze.

It is believed that the fire started from faulty wiring in the upper story of the frame structure.

Kendrick Volunteer Firemen were called to the scene about 6:40 a. m. when an unidentified early morning fisherman saw smoke coming from the roof and rushed to a phone to report the fire.

The actual damage was contained mainly in the upper story of the home, but water damage was extensive throughout.

Mrs. Wilson reports that they were able to save a considerable amount of their belongings, but that most of the clothing was either burned or water damaged. She also reports that the home was insured, but that no estimate of the damage had been made as of Tuesday.

The Wilsons are presently living with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Cain.

It is not known at this time whether the house will be called a complete loss, or if it is in a repairable condition.

## GEO. F. BROCKE IS CANDIDATE FOR REPRESENTATIVE

George F. Brocke, incumbent State Representative from Latah County, will be seeking re-election to the post in the November 8 general election. He is on the Democratic ticket.

Brocke, a Kendrick and Latah county resident since 1904, is in private business in Kendrick, where he deals in wholesale, retail, and cleaning of seeds. He is well known throughout the state, having been active in politics for many years. He was a member of the Idaho State Senate in 1949 and 1950. During that time he was chairman of the Forestry Committee of the Senate.

At the present time Brocke is a member of the House of Representatives, and is the chairman of the Agricultural Committee.

In seeking re-election, Brocke is quoted as standing for the program of "A state highway from Kendrick to Troy," completion of the Deary-Harvard road, and a revision of the present tax paying plan on property taxes, by giving the tax payer more choices in the payment of taxes — making the payments due quarterly or even monthly. This will ease the burden of paying taxes for a large group of people. Brocke said that he is also in favor of Federal Aid to Education, through state distribution of funds."

The Gazette believes that George F. Brocke has proven to be the type of man that our county needs in politics, and we believe that, if re-elected, he will continue to do a good job as State Representative.
