

BLACK HORSES NO LONGER EXEMPT FROM BULLETS

Even big black mares are being "mistaken" for wild game animals as "kill fevered" "trigger-happy" hunters are taking to shooting anything that moves, so it seems.

Earlier this week a big black mare belonging to E. V. Weeks of Texas ridge, was shot by a high powered rifle. Although the bullet pierced the animal, it is still alive, and hopes are that it will live to deliver its foal, due sometime this coming spring.

Roy Glenn told the Gazette Tuesday that he examined the wounded horse, and says he believes it has a fair chance of survival. The animal was shot near the back of the left side, the bullet traveling lengthwise of the body and coming out high on the neck. The bullet tore a hole about the size of a silver dollar where it came out, Glenn said.

He added that he could find no broken bones on examination of the animal, and no apparent extensive damage to the vital organs.

Latah County Returns:


Latah County carried for Richard M. Nixon by a majority of 100 votes, in a record 9,000 cast on the county. Voters also favored Henry C. Dworshak, who was re-elected to the United States Senate; and Representative in Congress, Gracie Pfost.

In the county races, Harold Lough (D) won in the State Senator contest; George F. Brocke, Sr. (D) and Harold Snow (R) won the State Representative posts, and James O. Broyles (D) and Orval M. Snow (D) won the two races for County Commissioner.

R. C. (Speed) Lange (D), won an overwhelming majority for re-election as Sheriff; Edna M. Theriault (R) was re-elected as County Treasurer; C. L. Woodward (R) was re-elected Probate Judge; Len Bielenberg (R) won in his bid for Prosecuting Attorney; and Eugene Taylor (R) won by some 400 votes the office of County Assessor.

Wayne J. Bandel (R) won in his bid for County Coroner, and E. M. White (R) was elected Constable. The offices of Justices of the Peace have not been counted, and the winner is not known at this time.

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BEAR RIDGE - DEARY ROAD CONTRACT LET AT \$683,185.60

The Idaho Department of Highways released the figures of the apparent low bidder and the name of the firm to the Gazette this week.

The notification stated that the contract had been awarded to Frank G. Baulne, Inc. of Yardley, Washington with a bid of \$683,185.60.

The project calls for construction of the roadway, drainage structures, and a roadmix bituminous surface on 5.816 miles, Bear Ridge - Deary, on State Highway No. 7, in Latah County.

The notification did not say when work on the project is to be started, but it is generally figured that the actual construction will start some time next spring.

With the completion of this link, a black topped road will then be available from Kendrick to Deary, and points beyond.

ELK KILLS HIGHER BY 15% OVER 1959

Hunter report cards received in Boise through November 1 give a higher elk kill by about 15 per cent than during the same period last year. The deer kill, however, is down about five percent, and it is believed that excellent hunting weather in the back country has caused nimrods to concentrate on elk and get their deer later. The cards report that slightly more than 10,000 deer and 3,500 elk have been taken as compared to 10,500 deer and 3,000 elk last year at the same time. Big game kills reported through November 1 total 10,185 deer, 3,537 elk, 640 antelope, 54 bighorn sheep, 83 goat and 36 moose. Additional hunter report cards are received by the thousands each week from all over the state.

Pheasant Hunter Success Up
Idaho is enjoying a good pheasant hunting year and a fine comeback from the ringneck slump of 1959. This year, 9,489 hunters appeared at check stations during the opening week end with 10,432 birds taken in 34,962 hours. This computes an average of 1.10 pheasants per hunter at about 3.4 gun hours each. During the bleak 1959 Idaho pheasant season, statewide hunter success averaged 0.89 birds in 4.2 hours. The ten-year average is 1.01 birds in 3.6 hours.

This means that hunters are having 24 per cent better success than last year and ten per cent better than the long-term average.

Study Big Game Regulations
Hunters are urged to refresh their memories about variable closing dates in general hunting areas, split seasons and multiple-deer regulations. Briefly, a hunter may take one deer in any open area in the state, one deer on the extra tag in game management units 42, 76-A or 78, one deer on the Middle Fork tag in either unit 26 or 27. A hunter may purchase only one extra deer tag and one Middle Fork tag.

Because a bad fire destroyed thousands of acres of deer browse in the Hells Canyon region after the big game regulations were printed, this multiple-deer area does not show in the regulations or on the big game map. For this reason, a special map has been prepared and is available to show the boundaries of this area, closing dates, access roads and other details. Persons planning to hunt the Hells Canyon area are urged to get copies of the map either at the Boise office or from field personnel because not all parts of unit 22 are open for bagging two deer, and because unit 18 closed October 30. A special Hells Canyon tag has been devised for the taking of a second deer in this area.

SMART MOTORISTS LOOK FOR FREEZE

Winter is rough on automobiles — and it's rough on motorists, too, who weather before it arrives.

A dead battery, frozen radiator, or a car stuck in the snow are some of the problems car owners can avoid by proper attention to winter care.

Safety engineers warn that some of the agony of winter driving can be caused by tires that are not suited to slippery, snow-covered roads. Winter tires with deep, over-sized treads go in mud and snow without sending out an emergency call for help. Tractionizing and sawdust tires also have their place in winter driving.

Heater hoses, fan belt, and the condition of the radiator should be checked when your service station or garageman is putting in the anti-freeze. A loose hose connection, a crack in the hose, or a worn fan belt, which allows generator slowdown can cause a lot of trouble when winter weather adds extra strain to a car's working parts.

Windshield wiper blades, heater and defroster, stop and tail lights, signal lights and brakes should be in good working condition for safety when the snow flies and windows get steamed and frosted.


Impatient drivers should be warned that winter tires are not an excuse to speed in bad weather, say the safety engineers. People with good highway manners drive slower than normal on ice and snow.

Emergency conditions sometimes cause even the best drivers to skid on ice. Most skids can be brought under control by letting up on the gas and turning the wheels in the direction of the skid.

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The 10 Commandments of Safety

1 Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of safety.

2 Guns carried into camp or home or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.

3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.

4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.

6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.

7 Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.

8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice be sure your backstop is adequate.

10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

9 GUN FATALITIES, 7 INJURIES HUNTER TOLL TO DATE

The Idaho Fish and Game Department said today that there have been 16 hunting accidents since September 1 and that nine of them ended in death. This compares to 23 injuries and six fatalities during the same period last year.

Commenting on the comparative hunter toll for the two seasons, Director Ross Leonard said that even one accident is too many, but the state's record does not classify the sport as extremely hazardous.

"It is significant that the total number of hunting accidents this fall is 13 less than last year—particularly when it is realized that just a few inches determine the difference between an injury and death when dealing with high-powered rifle slugs," Leonard pointed out.

"The appalling thing is that most of the accidents result from careless handling of guns—and mistakes made by hunters."

Leonard said that he does not know of many striking resemblances between man and a moose, duck or deer, but mistakes continue to be made.

He stressed that hunting is rated one of the safest sports—16th in insurance claims statistics and far below swimming, boating, football and the like. But as with all sports, it still pays to play it safe.

"A hunter's chances of getting shot while hunting are fairly remote," Leonard concluded. "The national rate for fatal firearms accidents from all causes in 1957 was only 1.4 per 100,000 persons, scarcely above the 1.2 deaths from choking on food."

He stressed that while both hunting and eating are relatively safe habits, it pays to play it safe.

That way avoids the tragedies of death and injury from hunting accidents.

"I am confident that the people of this county will continue to fight for better health for the children of this country as well as for themselves through the New March of Dimes, both as volunteer workers and through their contributions."

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

ORDINANCE NO. 500

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PARKING OF VEHICLES OF EVERY NATURE ON THE NORTH SIDE OF MAIN STREET BETWEEN EIGHTH STREET AND NINTH STREET AT ALL TIMES EXCEPT ON SUNDAY.

PROHIBITING THE PARKING OF VEHICLES OF EVERY NATURE AT ANY TIME ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF MAIN STREET BETWEEN KIRBY STREET AND NINTH STREET; VIOLATION PUNISHABLE AS A MISDEMEANOR.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to park, halt or otherwise allow or cause to stand or remain, whether occupied or unoccupied, any vehicle and conveyance of every type or kind whatsoever on the North side on the North one-half of Main Street between the intersection of 8th Street with Main Street and the intersection of 9th Street with Main Street in the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, at any time except on Sunday.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to park, halt or otherwise allow or cause to stand or remain, whether occupied or unoccupied, any vehicle and conveyance of every type or kind whatsoever on the South side or the South one-half of Main Street between the intersection of Kirby Street with Main Street and the intersection of 9th Street with Main Street in the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, at any time.

Section 3. That any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be punished as in the case of a misdemeanor.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

Whoever man he is, he will carry one of the world's heaviest burdens and its most awesome responsibilities for the next four years.

We must pray that the Lord will bless him with wisdom and that the strength of righteousness will attend his efforts in our behalf.


