

PARKING, TRAFFIC POSES PROBLEM TO TRUSTEES, OTHERS

Right now the Village Trustees in Kendrick are faced with one of the "toughest and toughest" problems they have been called on to solve for a long, long time.

At the request of the State of Idaho, and also to relieve a dangerous situation, an ordinance, No. 500, was passed, and we quote: "Prohibiting the parking of vehicles of every nature on the North side of Main Street between Eighth Street and Ninth Street at all times except on Sunday; prohibiting the parking of vehicles of every nature at any time on the South side of Main Street between Kirby Street and Ninth Street; violation punishable as a misdemeanor."

Section 1: (we quote) "It shall be unlawful for any person to park, halt or otherwise allow or cause to stand or remain, whether occupied or unoccupied, and whether attended or unattended, any vehicle and conveyance of every type or kind whatsoever . . . at any time except on Sunday."

On first glance this appears the solution of a narrow street, trucks and traffic control — but the situation goes deeper. The Kendrick Community Church is situated almost in the exact center of this restricted area, on the north side of Main Street.

True, the Ordinance permits parking on Sunday, but makes no provision for parking along the street for use of the church at weddings, funerals, or evening gatherings at any time except Sunday — and the church is used for many things at many times except Sunday.

Further, no cross walks are marked or provided for pedestrian use from the south to the north side of the street for gatherings at the church for any purpose — which in itself creates a definite hazard.

Further — No provision is made for the unloading of passengers, or of fuel, groceries, etc., or any other items used in the home — for residents of the north side of the street in the restricted area — and they have no other access, not even an alley.

All are aware that this move was instigated by the State of Idaho in an effort to speed up the flow of traffic in safety, by eliminating the narrow, blind approach at the foot of the school house hill. This move indeed has its merits, but local residents are largely of the opinion that the move was primarily to speed up the pulp trucks — and most are of the opinion that they move at too high a rate of speed through town anyway!

Also — The area in front of the church is used as a school bus stop zone, where grade school pupils are picked up for transportation to the Juliaetta Elementary School — but no warning sign for this operation is to be seen — so this too, reverts to traffic speed past the point, and stopping in a forbidden area.

We talked to two of our local log haulers, Burton Souder, Jr., and Everett Farrington, and this is what they had to say:

Burt: "If the speed of the truck (or other traffic) was cut from 25 to 15 miles an hour at the foot of the school house hill, it would make over two or three minutes difference per trip — or 6 to 9 minutes a day. Just plain nothing!"

Everett: "We all know the street is pretty narrow at that point, and a parked vehicle creates a hazard — but 25 miles an hour is too fast in town, anyway. If drivers would drop their speed to 15 miles an hour at the top of the rise at the foot of the schoolhouse hill there's no reason a car or pickup couldn't be parked there for church affairs or permitting loading and unloading in perfect safety. If a truck driver can't maneuver his truck in that amount of space he's got no business behind the wheel, and the two or three minutes he might save going through town don't mean a thing!"

SCHOOL ROBBERY STILL UNSOLVED

One week after a break-in and robbery of the new Joint District No. 233 Jr.-Sr. High school, no word has been released on anything that would lead to the discovery of the thieves.

Last Sunday night the Lewiston High school was robbed of some \$500. The night the Kendrick school was entered two other robberies were reported — one at Moscow and one at Pocatello.

The damage to the Kendrick school proved to be far more than the money stolen. More than \$200 in damage was done the building itself, while only \$30 to \$35 in cash was obtained.

Latah county officials said that they were sure it was the work of professionals — as the safe door was unlocked through the use of the combination!

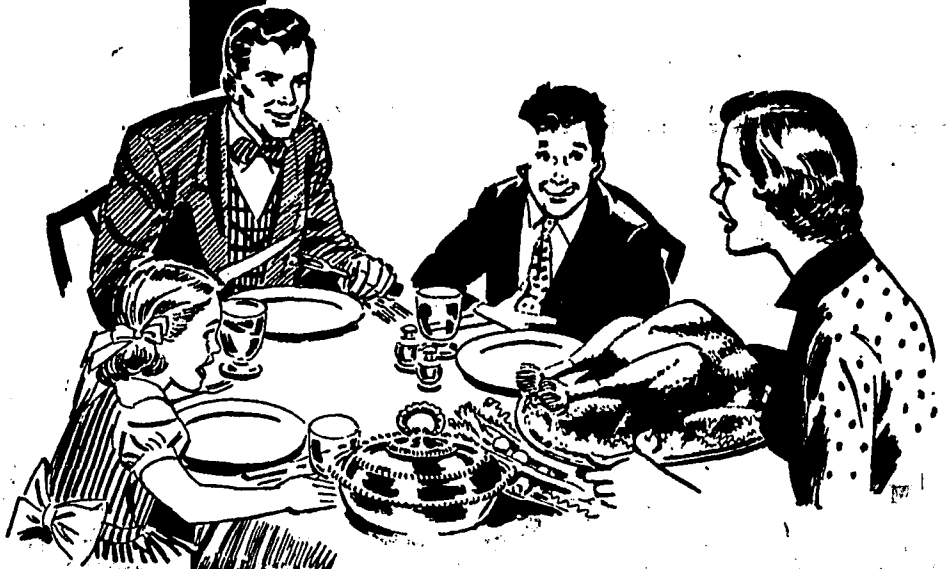
SERVING WITH 1ST MARINE DIVISION

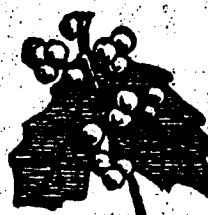

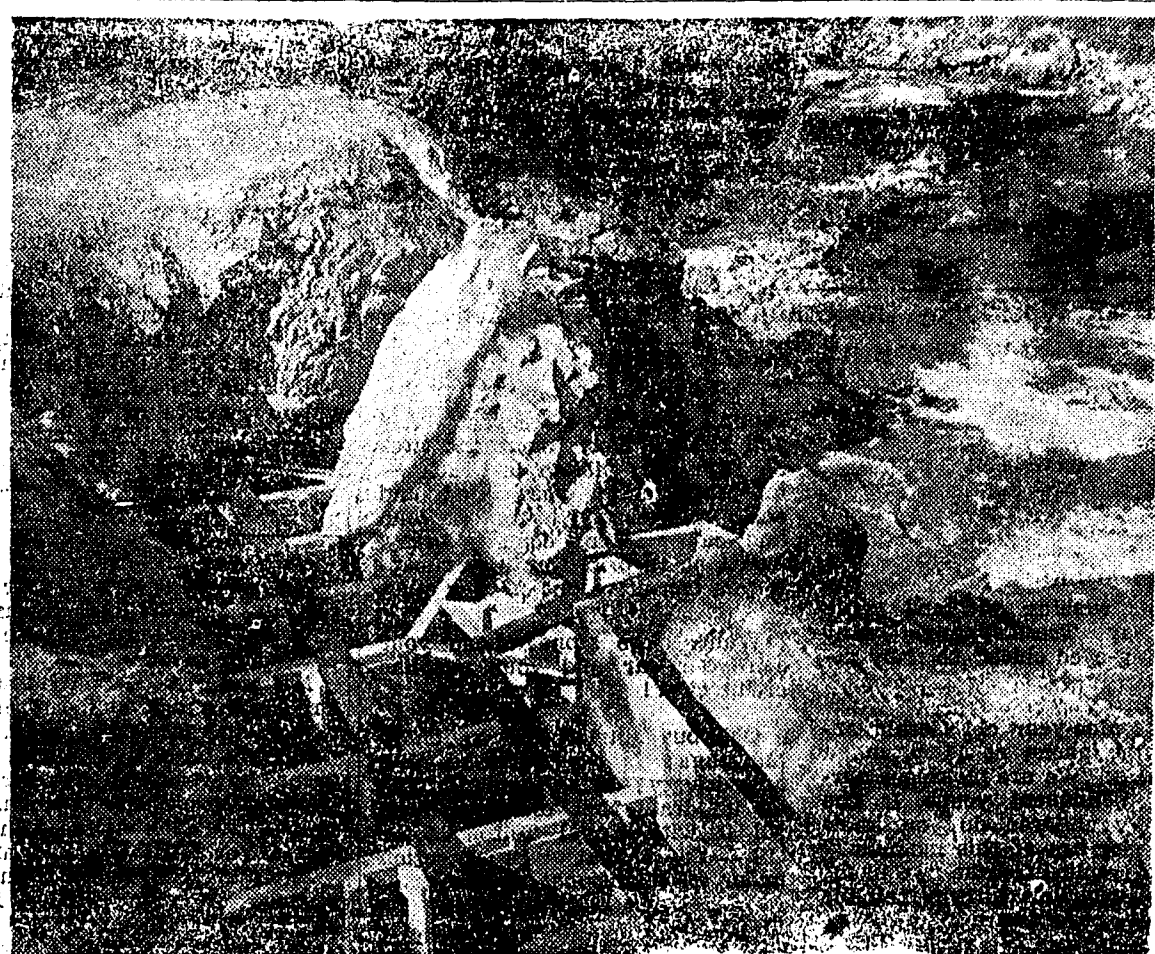

ORDINANCE NO. 500

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PARKING OF VEHICLES OF EVERY NATURE ON THE NORTH SIDE OF MAIN STREET BETWEEN EIGHTH STREET AND NINTH STREET AT ALL TIMES EXCEPT ON SUNDAY; PROHIBITING THE PARKING OF VEHICLES OF EVERY NATURE AT ANY TIME ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF MAIN STREET BETWEEN KIRBY STREET AND NINTH STREET; VIOLATION PUNISHABLE AS A MISDEMEANOR.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to park, halt, or otherwise allow or cause to stand, or remain, whether occupied or unoccupied, any vehicle and conveyance of every type or kind whatsoever on the North side on the North one-half of Main Street between the intersection of 8th Street with Main Street and the intersection of 9th Street with Main Street in the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, at any time except on Sunday.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to park, halt or otherwise allow or cause to stand or remain, whether occupied or unoccupied, any vehicle and conveyance of every type or kind whatsoever on the South side or the South one-half of Main Street between the intersection of Kirby Street with Main Street and the intersection of 9th Street with Main Street in the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, at any time.

Section 3. That any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be punished as in the case of a misdemeanor.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

CAR, TRUCK PLATES ON SALE DEC. 1ST

The Latah County Assessors office announced this week that the 1961 vehicle license plates would go on sale December 1, 1960 and that all vehicles must be licensed by January 18, 1961. The office stated that there would be strict enforcement commencing January 19, 1961 for vehicles operating with expired plate.

The Commissioner of Law Enforcement has extended the registration time to January 18, 1961. This will allow expeditious handling of all applicants at the state and county level as well as providing at least one pay period after the holidays in order that all registrants may comply before the deadline authorized.

The assessor advised these persons who have purchased a new vehicle during the year and have not transferred the title to do so prior to registration, as all vehicles except small two wheel trailers must be titled prior to registration.

The assessor asked that all passenger vehicle owners register in the county of their residence. Failure to register in your home county is a violation of the Idaho registration act.

Mrs. Norine Clutter, deputy assessor in charge of licensing, reported that reservation of special numbers will continue until the December sale begins. "There are still many desirable numbers," she said, "and those persons who reserve plates and pay for handling charges will receive their plates in the mail very soon after the opening of the sale."

Joyce Clemenhagen, Kendrick, will again supervise the sale of car and truck licenses in that area during the month of December. All titling will be done in the office of the county assessor in the county courthouse.

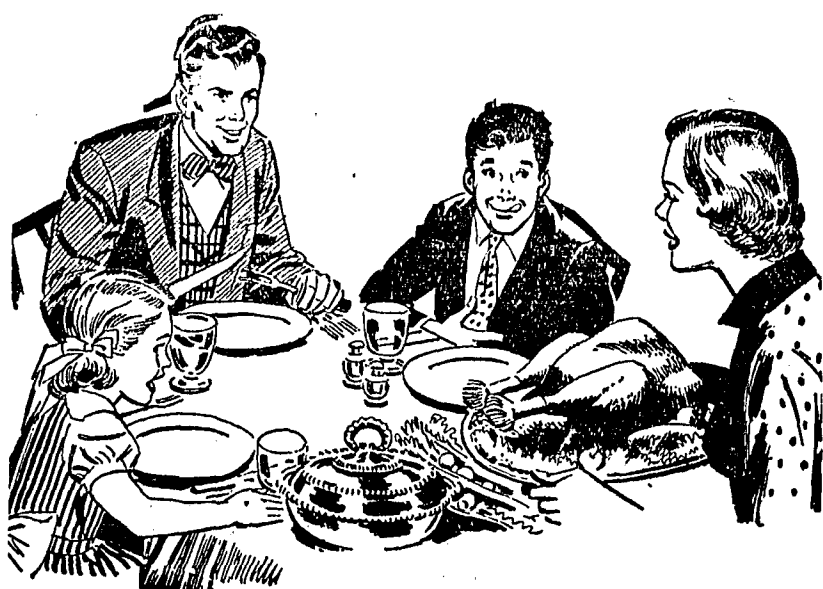

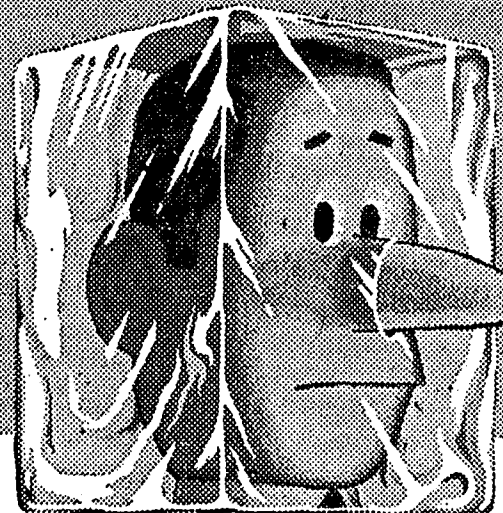
