LAWRENCE BARTLETTS LOOK BACK ON EVENTFUL 50 YEARS OF MARRIAGE

Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Bartlett, true pioneers of the great Northwest, were honored Sunday, Nov. 20th, on the occasion of their Golden Wedding Anniversary, with an Open House at the Kendrick Fire Hall.

Bartlett, who has worked many years as a forest ranger and as a farmer, wed his bride in the little town of Bartlett, Oregon, so named for his father, T. A. Bartlett, who settled the community.

Mrs. Bartlett, the former Rose McNeal, worked for many years as a licensed practical nurse. She has delivered 23 babies in the Kendrick area — and she brought some of them into the world after hurried trips by horse and buggy.

The Open House was arranged by the Bartletts' sons and daughters. Six are living — Mrs. Kirk Wilson, Kendrick; Loren Bartlett, Spokane; Wayne Bartlett, Clarkston; Harold Bartlett, Lewiston; Lawrence Bartlett, Jr., Elk River, and Mrs. Maxine (William) Fry, Juliaetta. Two are dead.

The Bartletts also have 12 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Bartlett, born at Hastings, Minn., moved to Pasco, Wash., with his parents as a child. Then the family took a steamship to Lewiston and settled at Asotin for about a year. They returned to Minnesota, but then decided they liked the west better, so the father built a homestead, which was to blossom into an Oregon town.

It was there that the younger Bartlett met Rose McNeal. They were married Nov. 23, 1910. The McNeals had moved to Bartlett from Pomeroy when Rose was 12.

Bartlett became a forest ranger in 1919 and took a post in 1922 at the two Canyon Ranger station 60 miles southwest of Pomeroy.

"Back in those days," he recalled later, "all of the traveling rangers did was on horseback and by pack mule."

The couple went into farming in 1927, purchasing a farm near Kendrick. They moved to Lewiston in 1952 after Bartlett's retirement. Last August the Bartletts moved to Kendrick to make their home.

A beautiful four-tiered wedding cake decorated with bells and a gold "50" centered the refreshment table. Accompaniments of heart shaped side cakes, gold tapers in hand made holders that matched the cake ornamentation and bouquets of gold and white mums completed the setting.

Relatives of the couple served the cake, punch and coffee to the 118 guests who came to greet the honorees.

CELEBRATION HONORS REV. MESKE'S SILVER ANNIVERSARY AT CAMERON

The Emmanuel and Zion Lutheran churches of Cameron and Juliaetta held special services to honor their pastor, the Rev. Theo Meske, on the 25th anniversary of his Ordination, in the Cameron Church and hall on Sunday, Nov. 27, 1960. Pastor Meske was ordained Dec. 1, 1935, in Lind, Washington. His father, Rev. H. G. Meske, and Rev. E. A. Rein officiated.

The Rev. Paul R. Daneker, pastor of Lewiston's Trinity Lutheran Church officiated at the morning worship service. The text of his sermon, taken from I Cor. 3:6,7, was "Unworthy Yet Indispensable." 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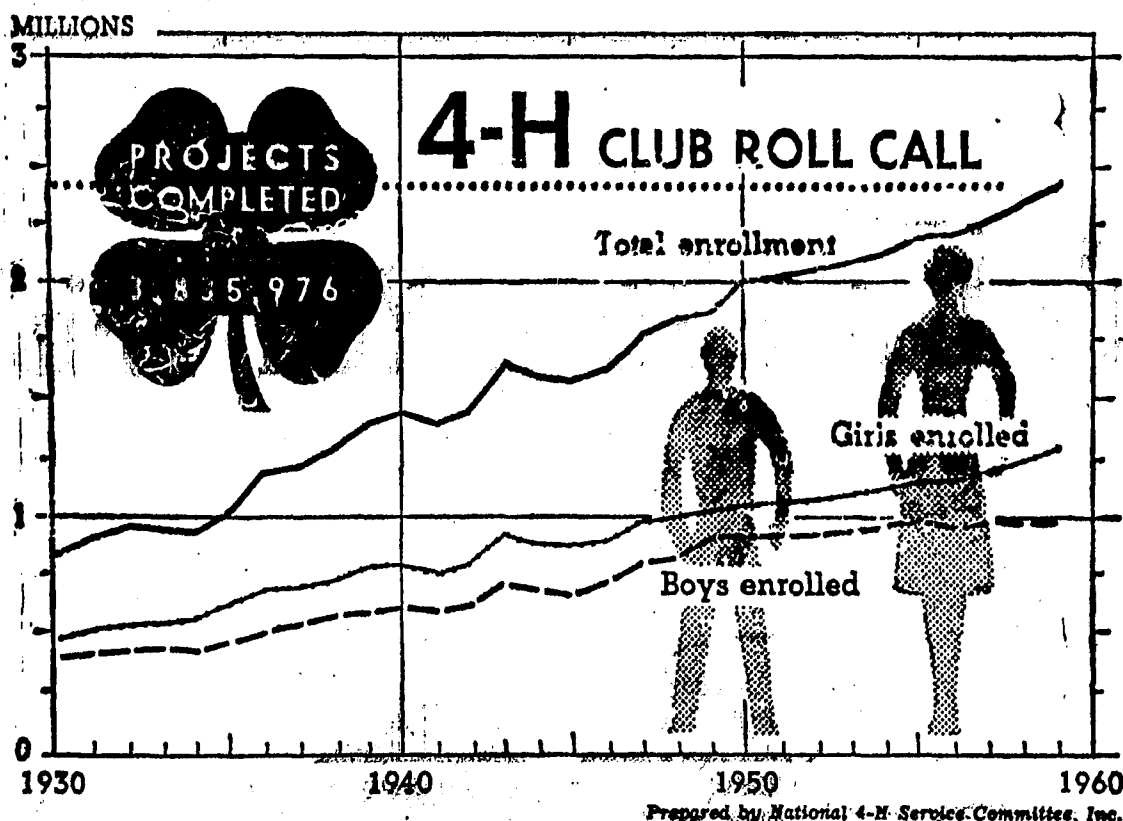

The nearly four million projects completed by 2,300,000 4-H Club boys and girls in a single year is further proof that the "learn by doing" system is keeping young minds and hands busy. As a matter of fact, youth specialists say that the hundred or so categories of 4-H projects are the very backbone of the organization which has grown steadily for more than a half century.

During the past three decades the number of girls enrolled in 4-H has topped the boys in just about the same proportion, according to figures supplied by the USDA. There are presently some 300,000 more girls than boys in club work. Ages range from 10 to 21 years.

Originally planned to help farm youngsters, the voluntary educational program now claims nearly half its membership from city and non-farm rural homes. Apparently "pride of accomplishment" is a key factor in the success of this particular brand of youth organization.

Right from the very beginning of 4-H, interested parties have donated awards in recognition of top performance in citizenship, leadership and project achievement. This fall more than a thousand and expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago will be given to state, sectional and national 4-H award winners. In addition about 200 will receive college

scholarships, and one out of 15 members will win medals in local competition.

Six persons now engaged in Extension work and who are former 4-H'ers will share \$18,000 in educational grants to be used in graduate study.

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MANY U. OF I. STUDENTS EARN WAY IN SCHOOL

The student that worked his way through school was often the exception, but today he is the rule.

Two-thirds of the students at the University of Idaho are employed at some time during their college career to help pay for their education, according to Charles F. Hudson, administrative assistant of student services.

Students find many part time jobs through the office run by Hudson as one of his duties. It serves as a clearing house. Students who need the money a few hours work will bring and the employer each call on Hudson who gets them together.

Jobs are not always easy to find, but the student who really wants work can usually find it. Good shoe leather and the initiative to use it seem to play an essential part.

"When we do not have jobs available, many students start walking at one end of town and call on every business firm until they either turn up a position or find themselves at the other end. Then they turn around and go the other way," said Hudson.

Students are employed either full-time or part-time by about 130 business firms in Moscow, such as department stores, service stations, hotels, restaurants and the hospital.

Of the 4000 plus students enrolled at the university, about 2600 will receive W-2 forms at the end of the year from the payroll office of the university.

Some can be seen working at the university barns at 3 a. m. milking cows, at the poultry farm, on the university farm driving tractor, or planting trees for the college of

forestry.
Coeds find employment in university offices as part-time secretaries or typists, as assistants in mailing rooms or laboratories.
The student union employs about 70 students and wives of students

during the year as secretaries, night managers, cafeteria managers, and fountain and kitchen help.
Students today pay their way, and earn it too with part time jobs, to the tune of some \$700,000 a year.

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TRAFFIC PROBLEM IS DRIVERS

Boise — Cliches about statistics are as numerous as the figures they represent.

It is true anything can be proved with statistics simply by the omission of a few of the accurate figures. For that reason traffic safety prefers to call the long lists of numbers "facts" and qualify each of them by referring to what they designate as factors, rather than any coined terms.

Because Idaho's traffic figures represent about one-half of one percent of the nation's total, ratios and variations in the state's traffic pat-

tern can be changed drastically by one accident. Since efforts are being made to determine factors which can cause wrecks, dogmatic assertions must be entirely avoided.

An example of sudden changes in the traffic pattern can be noted for the first nine months of 1960. During that period there were 1,256 more highway crashes than there were during the same nine months in 1959 — but there were 391 fewer injured persons and only one more fatality.

That made Idaho's traffic situation look good. Knowing that a sudden change in any one of a dozen or more factors could smear the beautiful picture, there were no rash assertions that "The traffic problem is under control."

The sudden change came in October, when accidents, personal injuries and fatalities were heavier than in October, 1959. Fatalities shot up to the highest single month record in four years.

When this one month of "statistics" were added to those of the first nine months and compared with the previous year, the picture was terrible!

What caused the sudden change? Theories might be gleaned from such "factors" as people, weather, road conditions, and even the election campaign.

In the final analysis people are the deciding factor. They can do more than the statutes, law enforcement and statisticians to improve the record. Until there is evidence of public determination to solve "the traffic problem, the patterns represented by undesirable statistics will fluctuate from month to month and year to year — and the figures will continue to become larger!

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PLANTS ALSO NEED WINTER PROTECTION

Just as you put on your coat, gloves, and boots to protect yourself from the cold, you can help plants get ready for winter.

There is still time to tie your evergreens to prevent snow and ice damage.

Strips of burlap and nails to use as pins work fine to bind the limbs so the weight of snow won't break them.

A board over the low-growing evergreens and resting on blocks at each end will protect the main branches.

Gladiolus bulbs should be dug and stored in a cool, dry place protected from freezing. Dahlias keep well if cleaned, dipped in paraffin and packed in vermiculite or sawdust. Put paraffin in a bucket of hot water and when paraffin is melted quickly dunk the dahlia tuber.

Climbing roses should be taken from the trellis, laid flat on the ground and covered with several inches of sawdust, dirt or leaf mulch. Hybrid roses will come through most winters if you mound up eight or ten inches of sawdust around the main plant. Do not prune during fall or early winters as pruning causes more winter damage.

Fruit or ornamental trees should have their trunks protected by leaning boards up on their southwest side. These boards will prevent the sun from thawing out the plant cells and then having the cold rupture the cells causing the bark to split.

A little work done now to protect our trees, shrubs and flowers will insure a prettier, healthier garden next summer.

Pruning should be done on most trees in the spring, and a good bulletin to have is "Pruning Hardy Trees" which is available at your county agent's office.

LATAH COUNTY LAD 4-H WINNER

Quincy, Ill. — Larry Butterfield, Route 1, Princeton, Idaho, has been announced state 4-H winner in the National 4-H Swine Program. His achievement climaxes the successful application of many 4-H principles in working with swine. The country-wide program of 4-H clubs is supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Larry will receive an all-expense paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress to be held Nov. 27 through Dec. 1, at the Conrad-Hilton Hotel in Chicago. He will also be considered in the competition for one of the six national honors which carry an award of \$400 college scholarship. The national winners will be announced at a banquet, Thursday evening, Dec. 1, the closing event of the National Club Congress.

Activities of these young 4-H'ers in the swine project are guided and aimed at encouraging them to learn swine breeding, production and management practices by actual ownership of, and work with swine. They learn types and grading of hogs and an appreciation of quality pork, by uniform understanding of marketing procedures and needs. They also develop an appreciation of scientific research and its contribution to agricultural development.

FALL SPRAYING TO PREVENT FUNGUS

Fall spraying with Bordeaux mixture will help prevent two air-borne fungus diseases from destroying peaches and apricots the following season, says Harry S. Fenwick, plant pathologist with the University's Agriculture Extension service.

Spray trees when most leaves have fallen. Repeat the spraying in early spring while trees are still dormant.

Coryneum blight is one of the fungus diseases that spray will prevent. Coryneum blight spots the fruit, causes die-back on stems, forms cankers on limbs, and — if left unchecked — will kill the tree, Fenwick says.

Peach-leaf curls is the second fungus that gives way to Bordeaux. It weakens the tree and leaves it susceptible to winter damage, Fenwick explains.

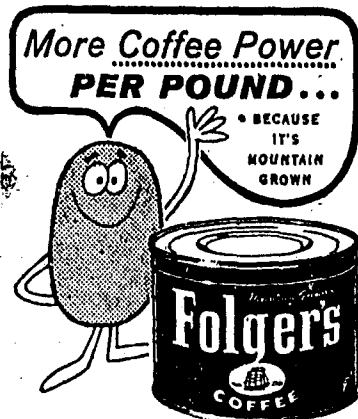

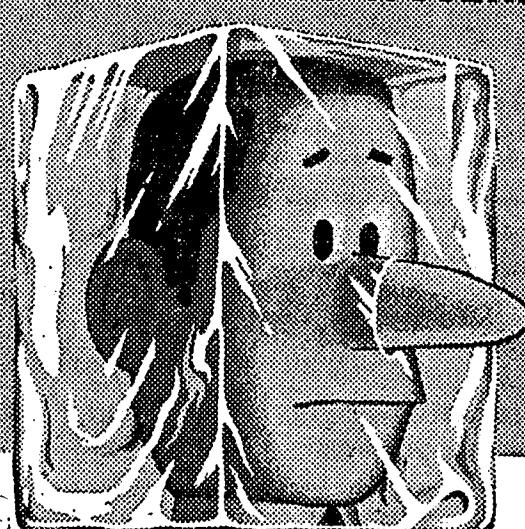
