VETERAN MAIL CARRIER RETIRES

Everett Fraser, veteran rural mail carrier on the Kendrick routes, has accepted his retirement, which officially began on Tuesday, January 3, 1961.

Mr. Fraser received his appointment on July 1, 1922, and retired on December 31, 1960, after 38 years and six months on the job.

During his years of service Mr. Fraser used the horse and buggy, sleds, rode horseback, and even walked snowshoes in the mail delivery.

In his years of service the post office has been in three different locations at Kendrick, and he has served under five different postmasters.

Mr. Fraser, who relaxes with carpentry and cabinet work, says he plans now to finish the apartment he began some time ago at the rear of their home in Kendrick — and get in some extra fishing!

Wm. Holt is the substitute carrier for the present, but we understand Mr. Fraser's former position will shortly be open for civil service examination.

LINDA HOLT IS AWARD CANDIDATE

The 1961 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Kendrick High school is Linda Holt.

Having received the highest score in a written examination on home-making knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating seniors in the school, she becomes a candidate for the state Homemaker of Tomorrow award, which will be announced in March.

Each school Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive an award pin representing the slogan, "Home Is Where the Heart Is." The examination papers of school Homemakers of Tomorrow will be entered in competition to name the state's Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The \$110,000 homemaker education program sponsored by General Mills offers a \$1,500 scholarship to the first ranking girl in each state, and \$500 scholarship to the state's second ranking participant.

State Homemakers of Tomorrow and their faculty advisors receive an expense-paid educational tour to New York City, Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., April 8 to 13, the trip culminating in the announcement of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow whose scholarship is increased to \$5,000.00. Second, third and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will have their scholarships raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

The testing and judging is conducted by Science Research Associates of Chicago. With a record of 402,786 girls in 12,633 of the nation's schools participating this year, the Betty Crocker search has enrolled more than two million girls in its seven-year history.

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JANUARY MARCH OF DIMES MONTH

Boise, Idaho, Dec. 29 — Governor Robert E. Smylie today proclaimed the month of January, 1961, as March of Dimes month in Idaho.

Governor Smylie urged all citizens "to give their services and support to this important drive to prevent crippling diseases."

The 1961 New March of Dimes will seek funds to support the expanded program of The National Foundation, which now seeks answers to birth defects and arthritis as well as polio.

State chairman for the campaign in Idaho is Don Pieper of Idaho Falls.

The Governor's proclamation pointed out that "The National Foundation has maintained a vigorous program to prevent crippling diseases with major emphasis against birth defects, arthritis and polio."

"This expanded program, developed through years of successful experience as a voluntary health organization, provides real hope in the fight toward eventual elimination of these disabilities," he said.

C. F. HARTUNG, FORMER KENDRICK RESIDENT, DIES

Carl F. Hartung, 88 a retired contractor who built homes and buildings in and about the Kendrick area for more than 38 years, died unexpectedly last Thursday at Richmond, California.

Death came at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Harry Newman. Exact cause of death was not known, but he had suffered from high blood pressure.

Born in a small town in Germany January 5, 1872, Mr. Hartung came to the United States with his parents when he was a year old. They settled in Michigan and moved to Minnesota in 1885.

Mr. Hartung married Emelia Kajowska October 25, 1895, at St. Paul, Minn. In 1900 they moved to Idaho and settled near Kendrick, where he farmed and worked as a house builder.

Among the buildings he erected before his retirement in 1938 are the Asotin County Airport building, a number of schoolhouses and hundreds of residences. He made his home at Kendrick from 1900 to 1937 then moved to Lewiston. He moved to Richmond in 1938.

He belonged to the Kendrick Odd Fellows Lodge and the Woodmen of the World. He was one of the founders of the Kendrick Rochdale Grain Elevator Co. He belonged to the Lutheran Church.

Survivors include four other daughters, Mrs. William Wolff and Mrs. Frank LaBelle, Portland, and Mrs. Walter McCall, Kendrick and Mrs. Henry Taylor, Sacramento, Calif. Sons surviving are Walter of Moscow, Herman and Oscar of Clarkston, Carl E. of Portland and August of Oakland, Calif.; and 24 grandchildren and 26 great-grandchildren. Mr. Hartung's wife died in 1944. Burial will be at Berkeley, California.

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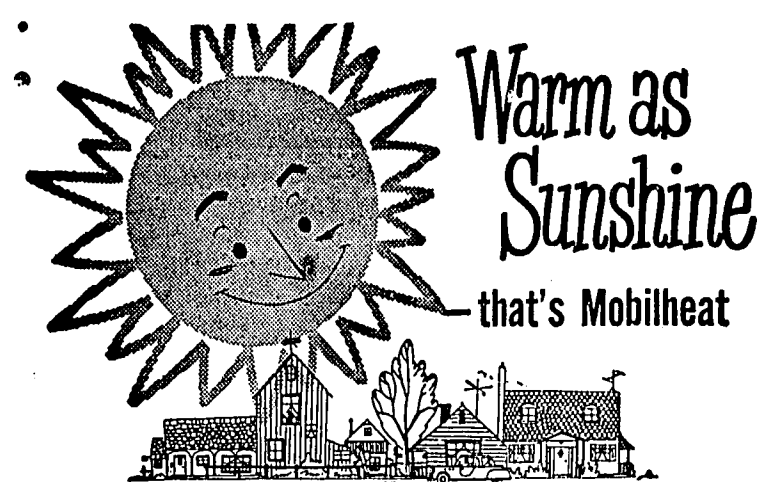

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IDAHO LEGISLATURE CONVENES FOR 36TH SESSION THIS WEEK

By Gov. Robert E. Smylie

Idaho's Thirty-sixth Legislature convened this week in Boise. The session got underway with the selection of leadership for the two Houses. Both the Senate and the House have Republican majorities for the first time since 1955.

On Tuesday I presented my biennial message to the session. I hope that there were few surprises.

Close study of appropriations requests indicated that the budget for general fund expenditures could be safely trimmed 2.2 million dollars below the estimates prepared by the Pre-Legislative Budget Committee. It was possible to do this and still give very adequate support to our public schools, our University and State College and to the other institutions of the state.

The revenue in sight in the general fund amounted to \$3.4 million dollars. With expenditures set at \$5.1 million, I recommended repeal of the \$10 capitation tax imposed by the last session, and proposed a modest building program at some of our hard-pressed state institutions.

I recommended once again that the executive branch of the State government be recognized in order to promote efficiency and economy in its operation.

In the field of natural resources, the message called for the consolidation of several existing agencies in order to perfect the planning of policies necessary to the wise conservation for use of these resources by all the generations yet to come.

The education of our children has always seemed to me to be the most important task we have as a state government. For that reason I was glad to be able to increase state support of local school districts by 5 million dollars and to suggest that a part of the added sum be used to afford an increase in teachers' salaries of \$100 per year in each of the next two years. There were some recommendations which will make it easier for some school districts to eliminate sub-standard and dangerous school buildings that are now in use.

As most people expected, I recommended that the primary runoff which was used last summer for the first time be repealed and that the so-called "call for ballot" be eliminated. I made this suggestion because I felt that many people resented having to give a party identification, and because it is too expensive to run a statewide election in which only nine percent of the eligible people participated.

Because more than thirty suggestions have already been made for changes in the constitution, I suggested that consideration be given to asking the people whether a convention should be called to revise or rewrite the Constitution and submit the revision to the people for ratification.

There were some recommendations concerning the unemployment compensation program designed to aid the areas in the northern counties where the recession in the lumber industry has caused crippled unemployment.

Many people are convinced that we will not be able to have a state Park and Recreation system of which we can be proud until we have trained professional leadership

in that field. I recommended that statutes be enacted to take the State Park Service out of politics and create a workable system which can get on with the kind of development nearly everyone wants.

We also asked for adequate funds to finance an inventory of our State water supplies with emphasis on underground water sources. We need desperately to do a better job of planning the long range use and re-use of our water supplies before someone in the water short areas around us starts working on some plan to use that water themselves. If we don't plan the use of this water we could lose it.

The budget will be presented this Friday. With that action before it will have all of its work before it can start performing its biennial task. I am confident that partisanship will be at a minimum and that some really forward looking legislation can be written.

These messages are quite long and the Legislature has a lot of work in prospect. If you would read the entire message, drop a post card to me at the State House. Copies are available at no cost.

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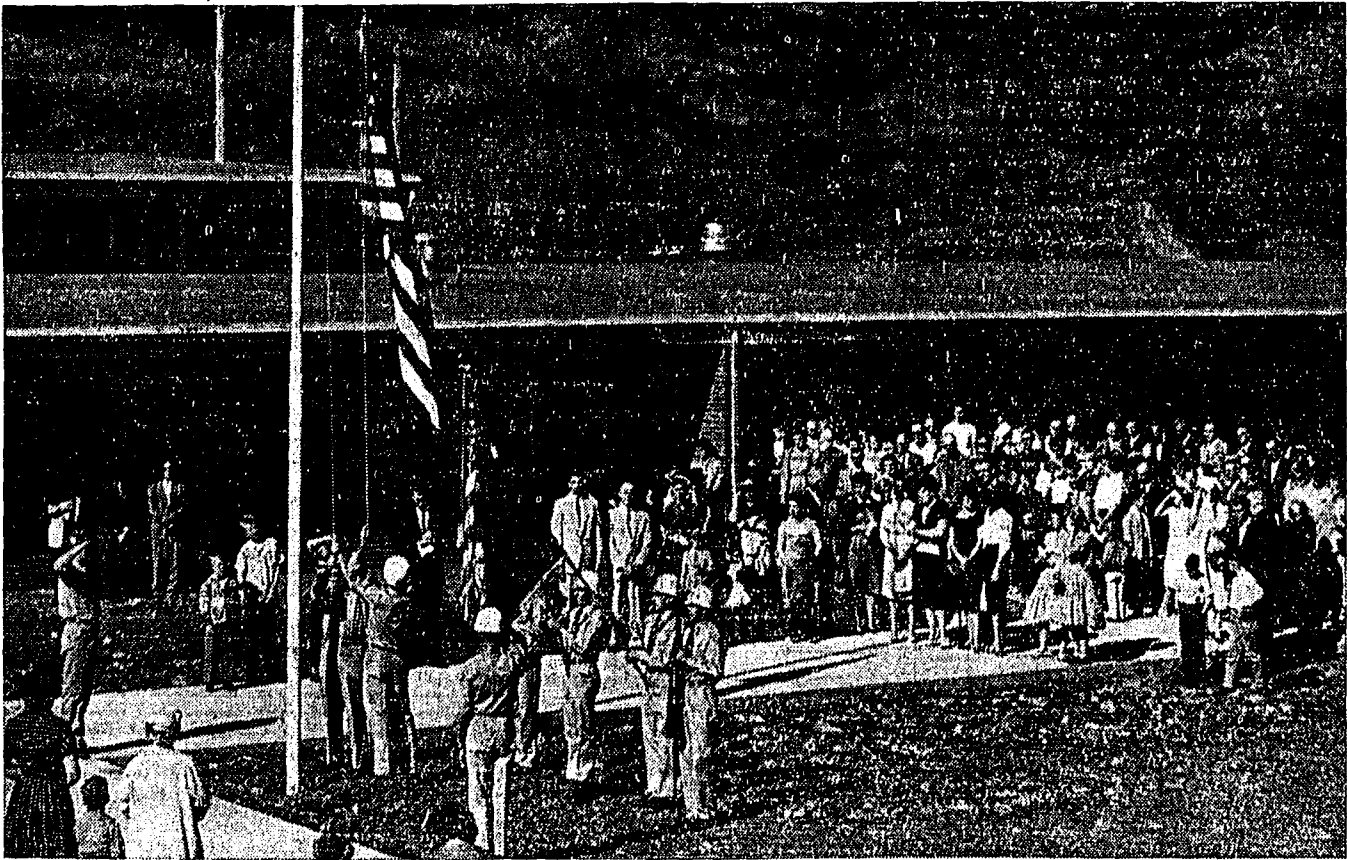

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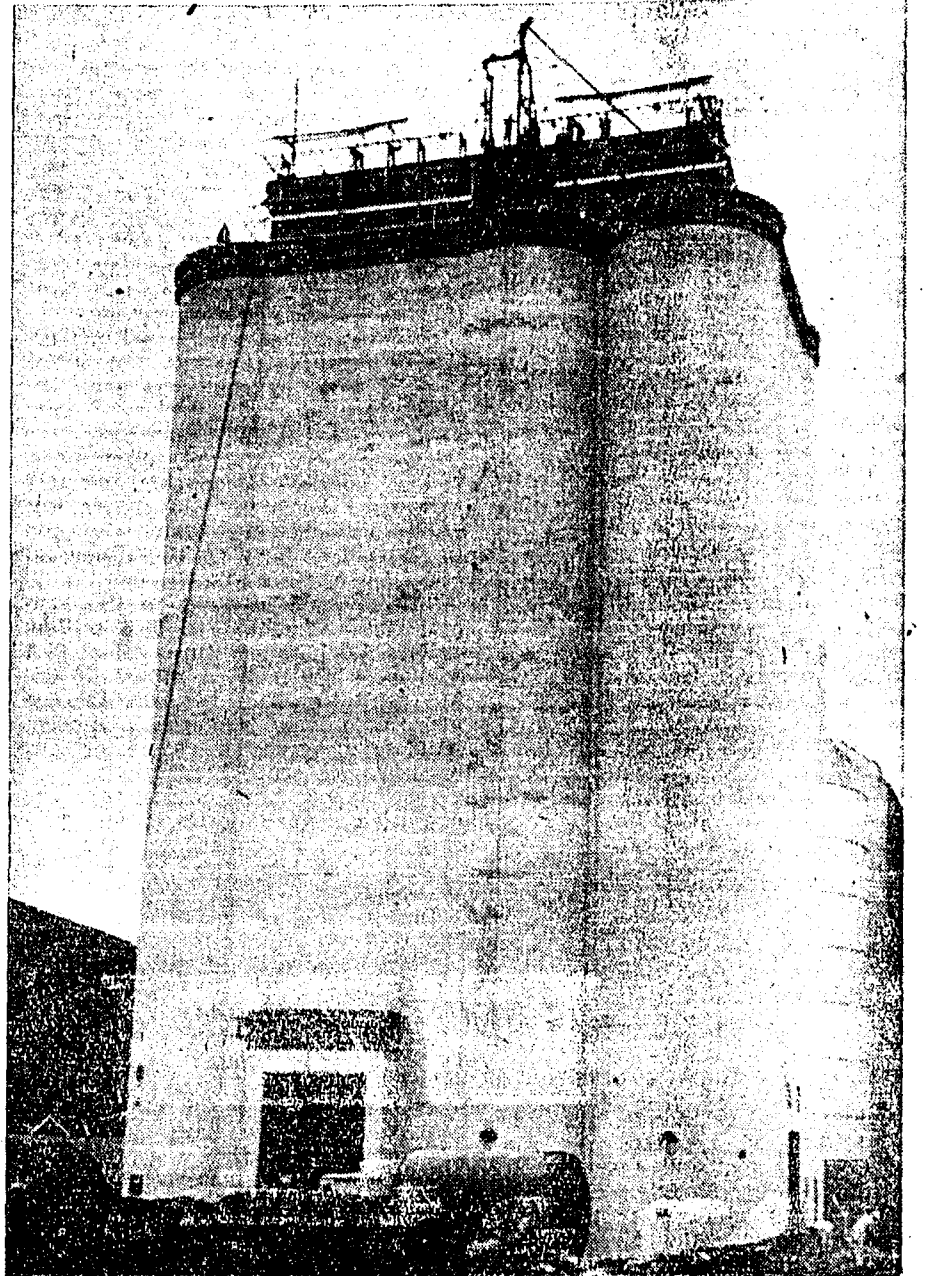

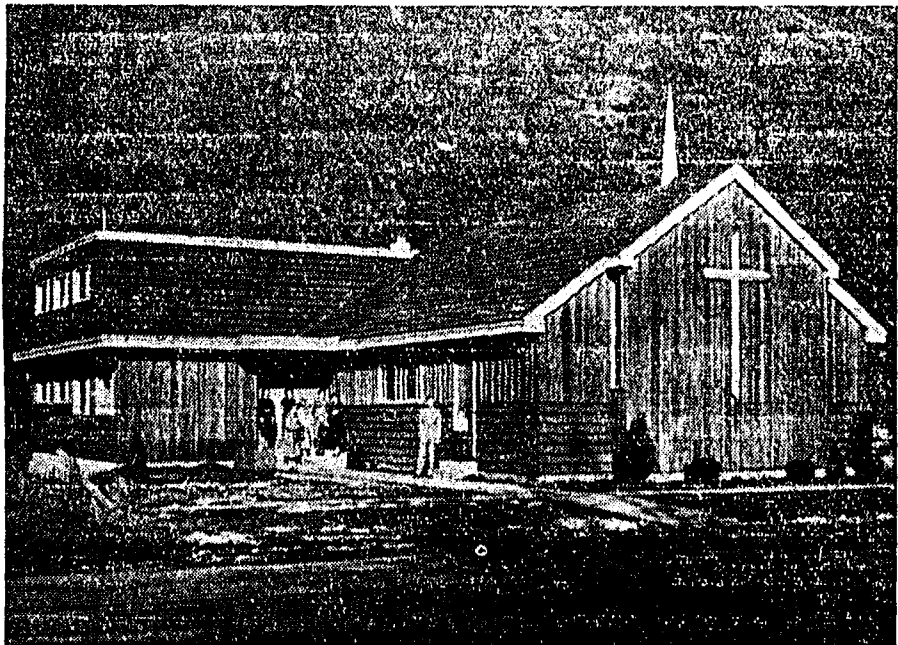

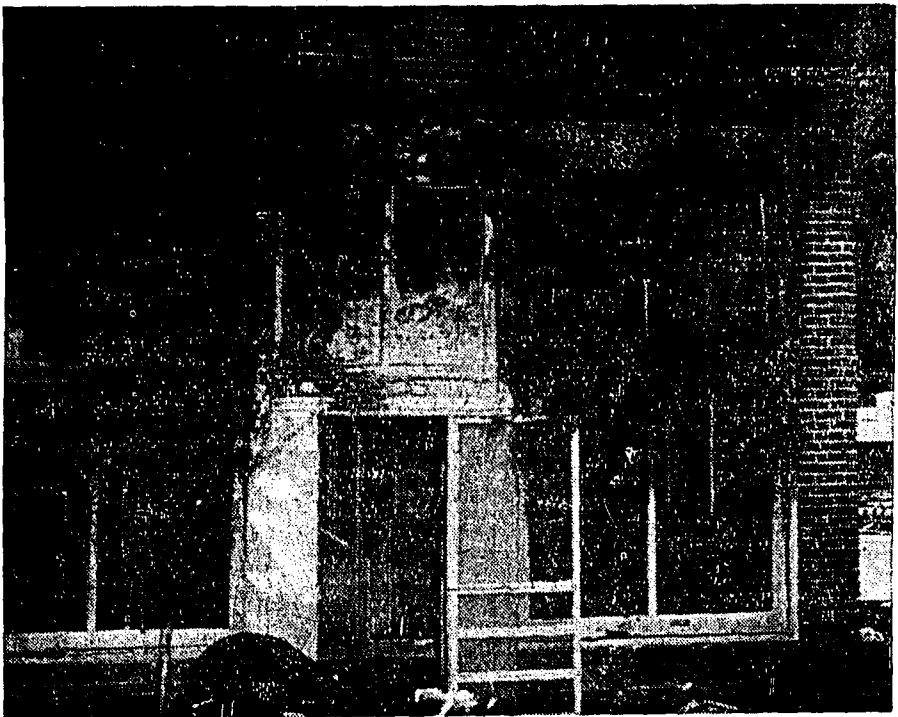

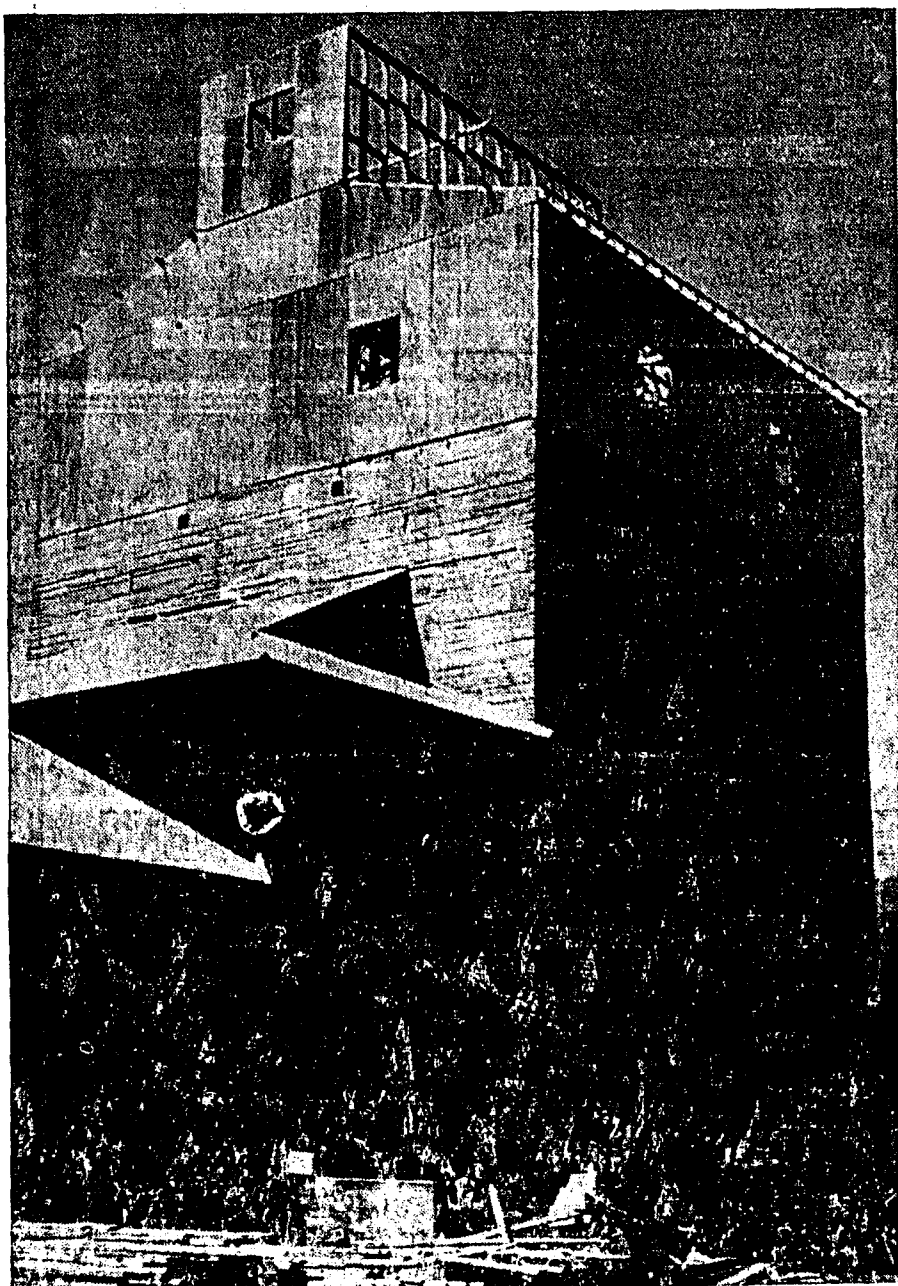

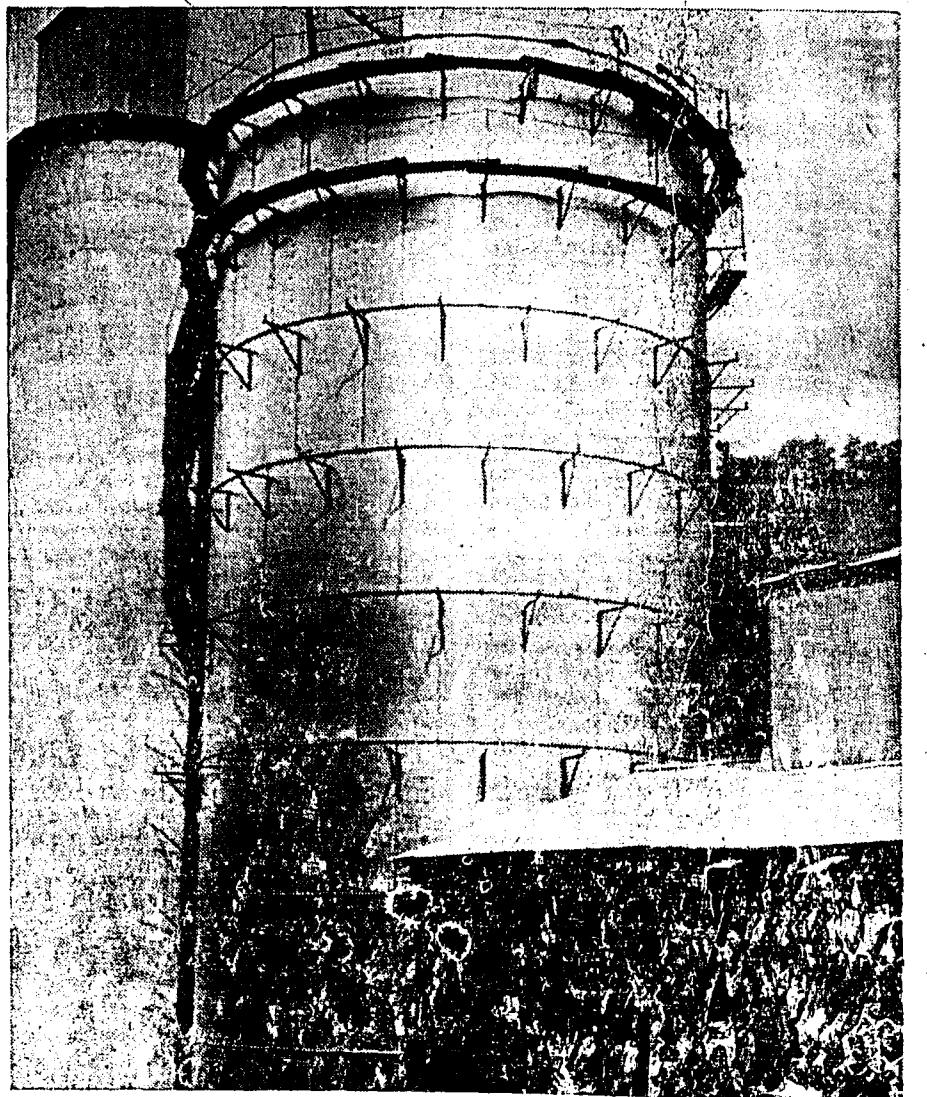

NEW AUTOMOBILE
ENGINES ARE IN
DEVELOPMENT

U. of I., Moscow — Future automobile engines will have increased economy and efficiency, but less horsepower, predicts John S. Winttingham, manager of Ethyl Corporation's research laboratory at Detroit, Mich.

Winttingham spoke to University of Idaho members of the Society of Sigma Xi, scientific honorary, under the auspices of the National Society of Automobile Engineers, of which he is a member of the governing board.

Speaking of the future of passenger car engines, he said the horsepower race is over, and compression ratios will either remain where they are or drop slightly.

New engine designs are presently being tested by various manufacturers. "An engine with a triangular-shaped piston is undergoing extensive tests. The piston rotates within the cylinder at speeds up to 10,000 revolutions per minute. A combustion process takes place on every revolution, instead of once every two revolutions as in the conventional reciprocating gasoline engine."

Winttingham added, "One advantage of this engine is the amount of horsepower created in relation to its weight. In actual performance tests, a 50 pound rotary-combustion engine generated 40 horsepower. In addition, it will convert about 40 percent of the energy in fuel to useable power. The engines presently used in automobiles convert about 20 percent of the fuel energy into useful power."

"Gas turbine engines are also being tested, but there is little reason to believe that it will replace the present car engine within the next ten or fifteen years. However, he added, it will be offered in some sport and higher priced cars (over \$6,000) within a few years."

"The gas turbine has great versatility and high horsepower per pound of weight. However, it can be operated economically only at full power. Passenger cars are driven at wide-open throttle less than five percent of their operating time."

Another new entry in the power plant field is the fuel cell. Its advantage is that it can convert approximately 60 percent of the chemical energy in the fuel into useful horsepower. It operates on a gaseous or liquid fuel and either oxygen or air. It creates no noise or objectionable odors, Winttingham said.

"The major disadvantage of such an engine at present," he said, "is its high weight per horsepower produced. For a fuel cell to deliver power equal to that of your automobile, it would require a weight of about ten tons."

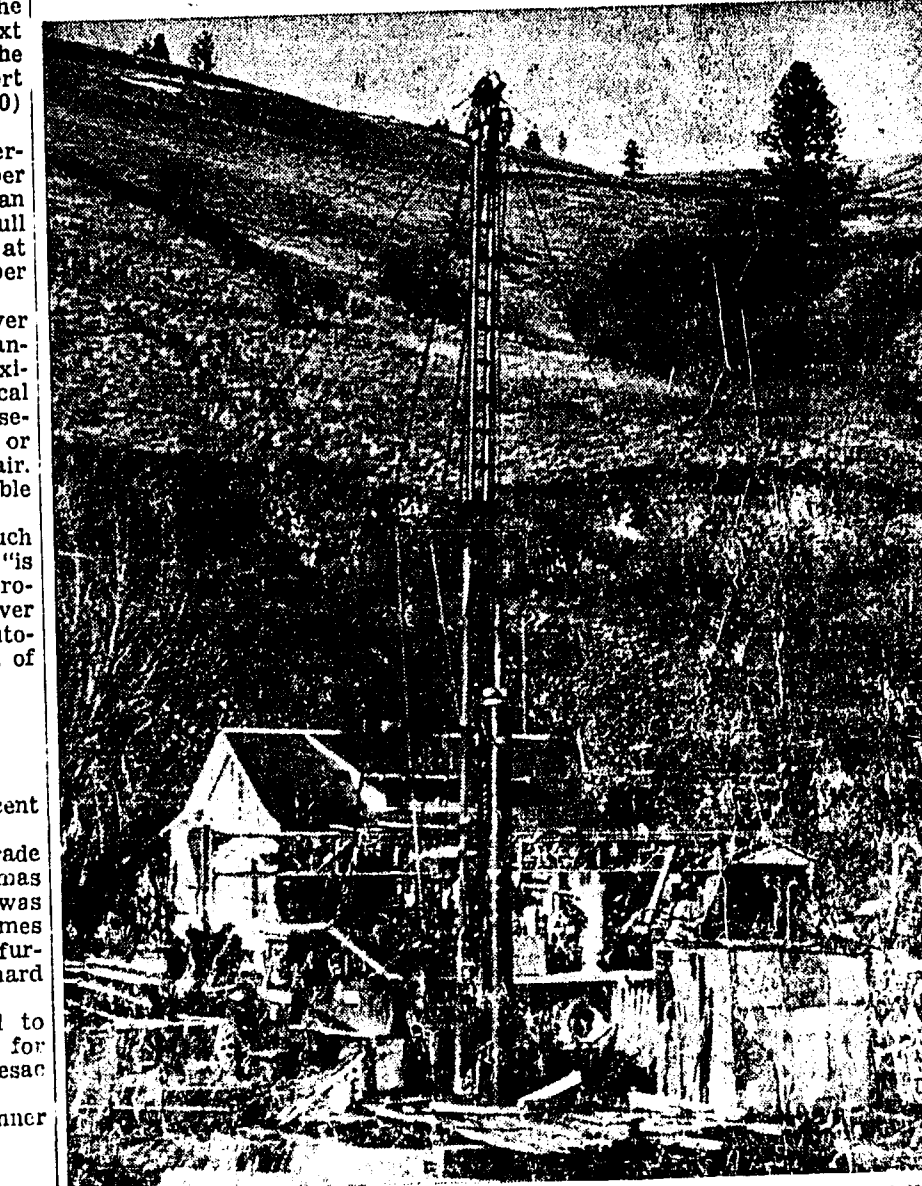

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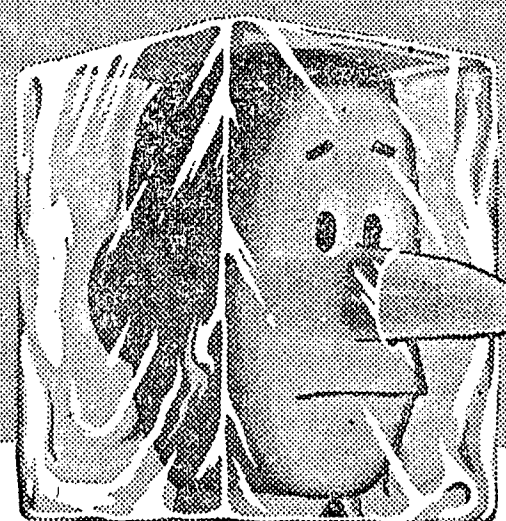
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
