

KENDRICK-TROY ROAD SOON TO BE PART OF STATE HIGHWAY SYSTEM!

Boise (Jan. 13) — State Representative George F. Brocke of Latah county announced today that he has been informed by the State Highway Board that they have taken action to place the Kendrick-Troy road in the State Highway System. As of April 1, 1961, the state will take over the maintenance of this road.

"This is excellent news for the people of Latah county," said Brocke. "The State Highway Department has shown good judgment in placing this road in the state highway system. I wish to thank all the people who have taken such keen interest in this project, and have given their time and effort in this endeavor."

"I wish to extend my appreciation, also, to the Moscow Chamber of Commerce, the Latah County Chambers of Commerce, and all the other organizations that have helped so significantly in the successful effort to have this road included in the state highway system."

The above proves that working together can pay off. Years ago (1947-48 we believe) a survey was completed from the top of Brady Gulch to Troy by the state highway department — but somehow became lost "in the limbo of time," and the Brady Gulch grade, itself, then was turned over to the Kendrick Highway District. If ever a link between towns was needed it is the one from Kendrick to Troy and thence of course, to our county seat, Moscow!

LEGISLATURE SPENDING BASED ON \$88 MILLION BUDGET

"THE BUDGET MESSAGE"

The budget message which I sent to the Legislature last Friday contained few surprises. It was based on spending \$88 million dollars from the general fund and repealing the \$10 capitation levy imposed by the last Session.

The budget was in balance and will require the enactment of no new taxes.

I tried to make it plain as I possibly could that the level of expenditure which I recommended would make adequate but not exorbitant provision for all of the now authorized functions of government. I told the Legislature that, of course, expenditure levels and revenue sources were finally matters for them to decide. I urged them to control their appetite for spending because I believe our people are not now willing to accept new taxes and I firmly believe that what I recommended in the way of spending would most adequately do the job.

The budget recommended the appropriation of 32 million dollars to our public schools which is a 5 million dollar increase over the sum appropriated two years ago. This sum will provide for the fact that 4,000 new students are in our classrooms and it will provide for adding about \$100 a year in each of the two years of the biennium to teachers' salaries. In the field of higher education I recommended that the estimates of the Pre-Legislative Budget Committee, which was composed of four members of the Democratic party and two members of the Republican party, be approved and I took the same action with respect to the hospitals and other institutions of the state.

In the field of Public assistance we will be able to recommend appropriation to continue to make cost of living adjustments in the grants administered under that program and in the direct payments which we make for nursing and medical care for old age assistance recipients.

I will send a building program to the Legislature some time in the next few days which will permit us to move forward in the task of completing adequate facilities at our university and college and at our state hospitals and institutions in accordance with the sound principle that priority of need should govern priority of construction. This program, when it is submitted, will be consistent with the public decision made last November to pay for capital construction as we go.

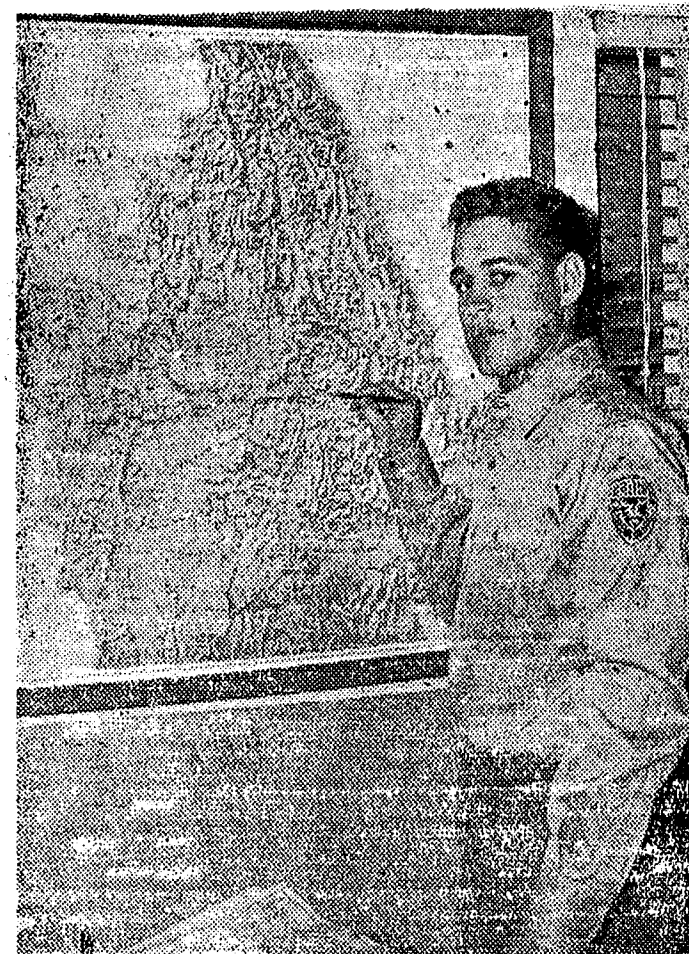

ALIEN REGISTRATION

Helena, Mont. — The district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service urges all aliens in the states of Montana and Idaho, who have not already reported their address this year, to go to the nearest postoffice or immigration office and report at once. It must be reported before January 31. U. S. law requires all non-citizens of the U. S., except persons in diplomatic status, foreign representatives of certain international organizations and aliens admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers to report their address to the government each January.

For this reason, throughout the U. S., during January, February and March of each year, about 30 percent more applications for naturalization are filed by aliens. The program acts as a reminder that U. S. citizens do not have to make the address report

Salmon Experiments Being Conducted

Eyed salmon eggs last fall were planted directly into the river on man-made spawning beds, while lots of 100 eggs each were sacked in plastic mesh bags as control units. These eggs can be raised from the water periodically to determine incubation progress. A recent report said the eggs already are beginning to hatch.

STATE ENGINEER IS PROMOTED

Boise — G. Bryce Bennett, state highway engineer, announced this week that Ellis Mathes, planning and traffic engineer for the state highway department, has been promoted to Assistant State Highway Engineer, effective immediately.

Mathes will assume the duties of James H. Cairns, who has served in this position since 1957. Cairns, a thirty-year veteran in highway work, has received an assignment as Special Projects Engineer.

Mr. Cairns is quite well known in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area, having been stationed at Kendrick for some years, while construction was underway on the Bear Ridge Grade, Texas ridge grade, and other area projects.

IT'S OUTGO TAX TIME AGAIN!

Boise — It's federal income tax time again — and here are some brief, trouble-saver reminders from the Internal Revenue Service:

"All Taxpayers" — The instruction booklets show line-by-line how to prepare the returns. Keep records to prove all deductions. April 15 is the income tax filing deadline except for farmers and corporations.

Farmers — February 15 is the due date for income tax filing unless estimated tax is paid by January 15, which permits until April 15 to file complete return. January 31 is the final date for the annual social security tax report on all 1960 farm employees.

Employees — before making your return be sure to have all W-2 forms from every 1960 employer. Corrections delay refunds.

Employers — January 31 is the deadline for issuing W-2's to employees, also filing employees' tax returns for last quarter of 1960, and annual federal unemployment tax.

Business and Professional Men — January 15 is last date for amending and paying final quarterly income tax estimate for 1960, otherwise the complete return is due by January 31. Quarterly excise tax returns due on January 31. April 15 is the deadline for first quarter 1961 estimate and payment.

Corporations — Returns for the calendar year 1960 are due March 15. Truck Operators — Highway use tax on any trucks first used in December, due by January 31, and each month-end thereafter accordingly.
