

CITY STARTS LEGAL ACTION IN EFFORT TO COMPLETE WELL

It was announced this week by Kendrick's mayor, Frank Abrams, that legal steps had been begun in an effort to force the completion of the city well, drilling operations on which started about a year ago.

The original contract called for the completion of the well by Oliver Zinkgraff & Sons of Spokane, within 90 days. At the end of that period, the well was not completed because of difficulties encountered. Since that time, efforts have been made to retrieve a stuck bailer bucket from the shaft, but have proven futile.

No work has been done on the well since early fall, and the city has notified the bonding company of the matter, Mayor Abrams says. When no other word was heard, the city decided to give the bonding company 10 days to take some action. To this notification the city has received no reply, Mayor Abrams stated.

With the 10-day notice some ten days overdue, the city advised its attorney, Frank V. Barton, to start legal action to force resumption of work on the well.

What will come of all this, and whether or not the well can be completed in time for use this summer is not known. However, if it is not completed, the pump can again be placed in the open portion of the shaft, and water can be supplied from the well on a limited basis, Abrams said.

MRS. J. E. BECK DIES AT MOSCOW

Mrs. J. E. Beck, 56, of Leland, died at 5:35 p. m. Thursday, Jan. 19, at the Grifman Memorial Hospital in Moscow, where she had been a patient since Jan. 8. Her death was attributed to cancer. She had undergone cancer surgery in October of 1959, and had been in failing health since that time.

Mrs. Beck was born Sept. 16, 1904, at Leland, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Thornton. She spent her girlhood and attended school there. She was married to William Dawson in about 1920. They lived at Agatha, where he was employed by the railroad, and moved to Orofino in 1930.

They later were divorced and she was married to James E. Beck at Pomeroy, May 8, 1951. They lived at Kamiah for a year and a half, moved to Ahsahka to reside for two years, lived at Pierce and Bovill briefly, and moved to Leland last July. He was employed in woods work.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, Darrell Dawson of Salt Lake City and William C. Dawson of Orofino; two stepsons, Earl D. Beck and Harold Beck, both of Orofino; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Marie Sanders of Hayward, Calif.; four sisters, Mrs. Edith Boggs of Tacoma, Mrs. Alice Blum of Edmonds, Wash., and Mrs. Viola Lohm of Lewiston; five brothers, Jesse and William Thornton, both of Leland, Royal of Palouse, Clarence of Kendrick and Bernard of Lewiston; six grandchildren and eight step-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday at 1:00 at the Gilbert Chapel in Orofino, with Rev. William E. Strance of the Orofino Methodist Church officiating. Burial was in Riverside Cemetery, Orofino.

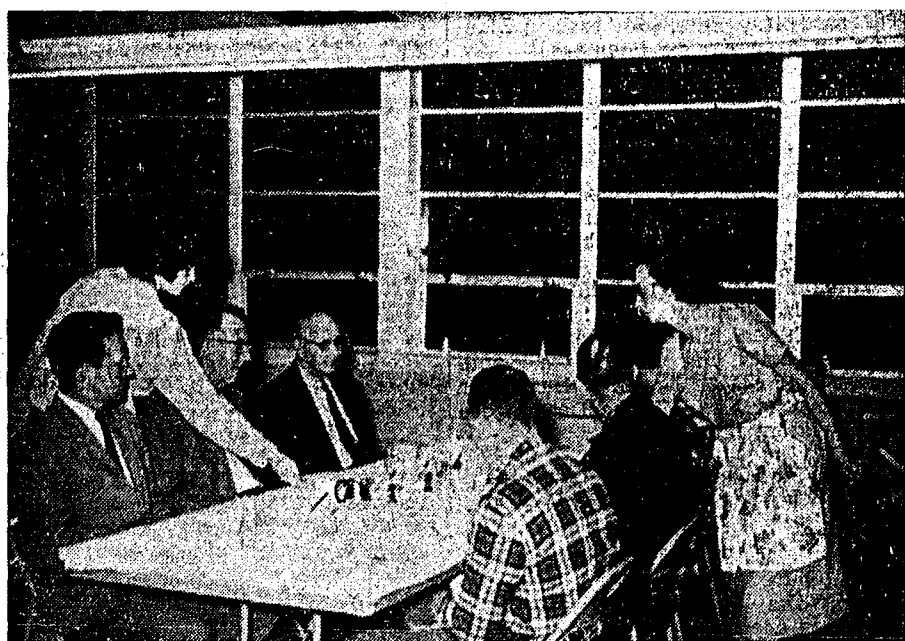

LINDA HOLT WINS SCHOOL DISTRICT HOME EC. HONORS

Minneapolis, Minn.: Linda Holt has been named the 1961 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Joint School District No. 283 high school, Kendrick, Idaho.

Having received the highest score in a written examination on home-making knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating seniors in her school, she becomes a candidate for state Homemaker of Tomorrow award, which will be announced in March.

Each school Homemakers of Tomorrow will receive an award pin representing the slogan, "Home is Where the Heart Is."

The homemaker education program offers a \$1,500 scholarship to the first ranking girl in each state and a \$500 scholarship to the state's second ranking participant. State Homemakers of Tomorrow and their faculty advisors receive an expense-paid educational tour to New York City, Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., April 8-13, the trip culminating in the announcement of the All-American Homemakers of Tomorrow, whose scholarship is increased to \$5,000.00. Second, third and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will have their scholarships raised to \$4,000; \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

MRS. NELLIE BRUCE DIES WEDNESDAY

Mrs. Nellie Bruce, 75, a pioneer resident of the Moscow area, died Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 18, at her home in Lewiston where she had lived since 1947. A heart attack was the cause of death. Mrs. Bruce had suffered two previous attacks and was hospitalized in October.

She was born at Moscow in 1885, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hobart. Her father was a veteran of the Civil War, who traveled west with his wife by wagon train in 1882, and settled four miles east of Moscow.

Mrs. Bruce was married in 1900 to John K. Bruce, who died in 1951. They lived at Moscow, where Mr. Bruce farmed until 1939, when they moved to California. Mr. and Mrs. Bruce moved to Lewiston in 1946, where he worked as a real estate agent.

Mrs. Bruce is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Walter May, Kendrick; a son, Hobart Bruce, Moscow, and four grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at Short's Chapel, Moscow, at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, with the Rev. F. C. Schmidt, Kendrick, as officiant. Interment was in the Moscow cemetery.

Workmen are to be on the job within a day or so to begin restoring the house to its original condition.

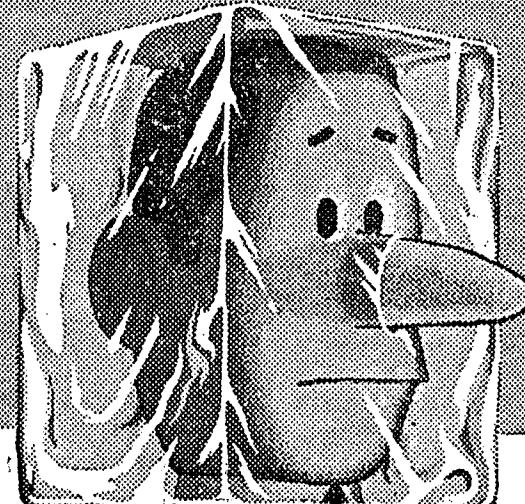
