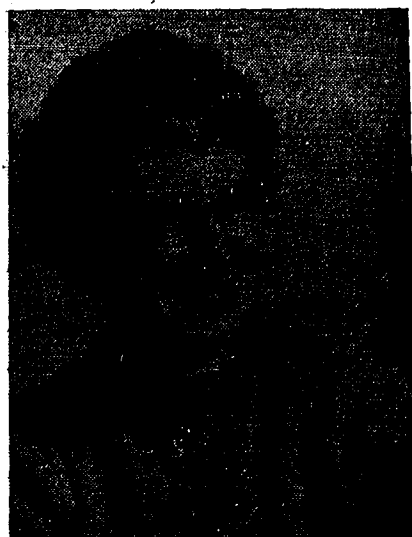

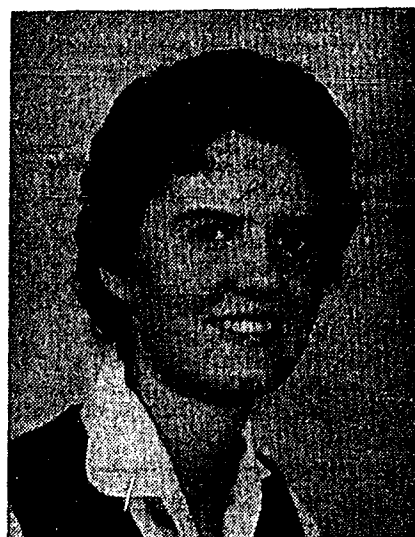

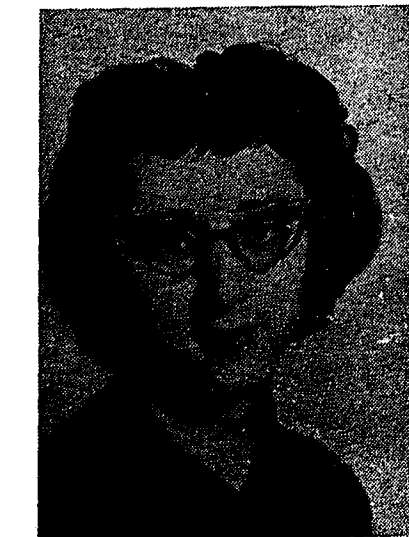

## BLOSSOM FESTIVAL HEADS HOLD MEET TUESDAY EVE.

Tuesday evening of last week a joint meeting of committee heads for the Locust Blossom Festival was held at the Kendrick Fire Hall, with V. F. W. and Lions Club representatives reporting on their combined efforts to date - and discussing problems.

First on the agenda was the parade, the committee being headed by Bill White of the Lions Club and Chas. Deobald representing the V. F. W. It was decided that all Kendrick business firms have an entry or face a "kangaroo court" and explain why they did not. It is also requested that those planning to take part please register with Mr. White or Mr. Deobald by Friday evening.

During a discussion of problems it was suggested that trophy prizes in three categories be awarded: Commercial; Non-Commercial and Sweepstakes. So plan your entry accordingly - you may be a winner.

No member of the Sports Committee being present there was little discussion on this event, except that it would be run in the street adjoining the park or in the park itself.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Audrey Osburn, Craigmont, and Mrs. Irene Millard, Kendrick; two sons, Robert and Eugene Bulen, both of Culesac; and 12 grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. Eugene Bulen is Culesac's postmaster.

## DR. D. J. INGLE TO BE HONORED AT COMMENCEMENT

U. of I., Moscow - Two members of the University of Idaho class of 1929, both of whom have made outstanding contributions to science, will be awarded honorary doctorate degrees by the university at Commencement Exercises June 10, D. R. Theophilus, president, announced this week. The recipients of doctor of Science degrees will be Carl P. Clare, Chicago, founder, president and the chairman of the board of C. P. Clare & Co., and Dr. Dwight J. Ingle, head of the department of physiology at the University of Chicago.

Dr. Ingle, a graduate of Kendrick High School was graduated from the university of Idaho in 1929 in education with a major in psychology. While working toward a master's degree, which was conferred by the university in 1931, he was a teaching assistant in psychology. He received a Ph. D. degree from the University of Minnesota in 1941. He was a Mayo Foundation fellow, then a George S. Cox medical research fellow and an Upjohn fellow.

In 1943, he was named a research scientist with the Upjohn Company. He held that position until 1953, when he became a professor of physiology at the Ben May Laboratory for Cancer Research at the University of Chicago. Recently, he was promoted to chairman of the department of physiology.

A world authority on endocrine secretions, he has conducted studies leading to major advances in the treatment of glandular difficulties. In recognition of his research, he has been the recipient of the Roche-Organon award and the W. E. Upjohn prize, and has been named a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is a past president of the American Endocrinology Society. He has published many technical papers and a book on his research, and is editor of Perspectives in Biology and Medicine. In 1958 he gave the Commencement address at the University of Idaho, stressing that "science and society must get in step."

## PLANT THAT GARDEN NOW

It's time to plant vegetables now. They do well in cool spring weather with a touch of sun.

Garden crops such as spinach, radishes, onions and turnips can be planted now and will probably do as well or better than those planted earlier, says Homer Futter, county agricultural agent. And the really tender stuff, corn, beans, melons, tomatoes and cucumbers can be postponed until June. They need really warm weather. If they are started too early, a frost could wipe them out or seriously stunt them.

A lot of seed is wasted by planting too deep, the county agent said. In order to germinate, seed must have proper temperature and moisture. In early spring the upper surface of the soil is warmest and is usually damp enough, so plant shallow. Later on the surface dries out and lower layers will be warm, so plant deeper. In sandy soils, plant deeper to get to moisture.

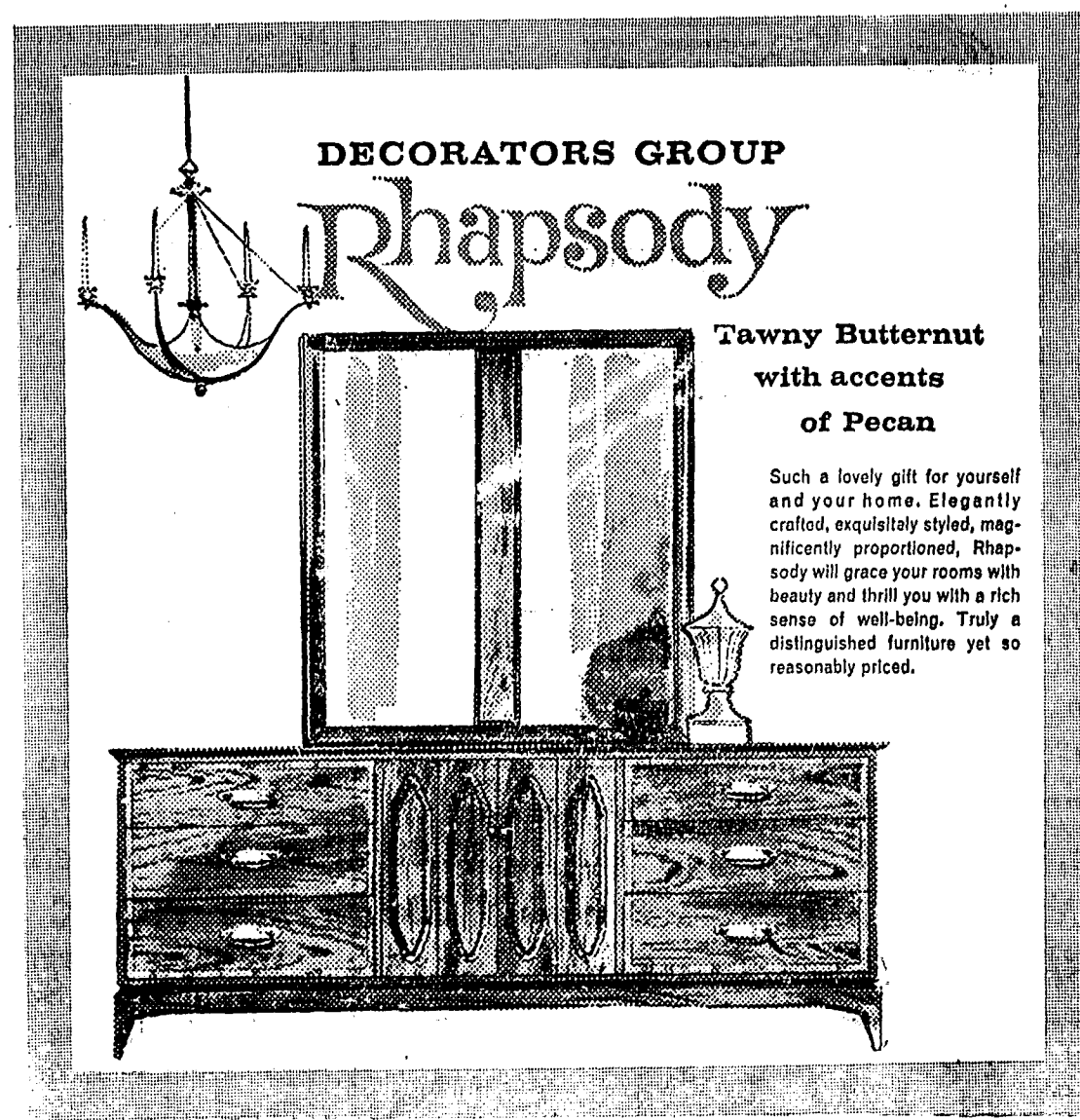
George Woodbury, head of the horticultural department of the University, says most people plant too many seeds and don't thin the crop well. For some vegetables, thin when you plant, but when you plant such crops as corn, tomatoes, peppers and cabbage, you reduce yield and quality.

It is very easy to describe the weather of the past week — cool and damp. It is literally a continuation of that of last week. However, Monday morning of this week there was a white frost, and the thermometer read "36 degrees," for probably the chilliest night for some time.

Lawns are thick and green; lilacs are fading from the picture; japonica is beginning to bloom, and other late spring flowers are heavy with buds. All that's needed now for things to really begin to grow is a bit of warm weather.

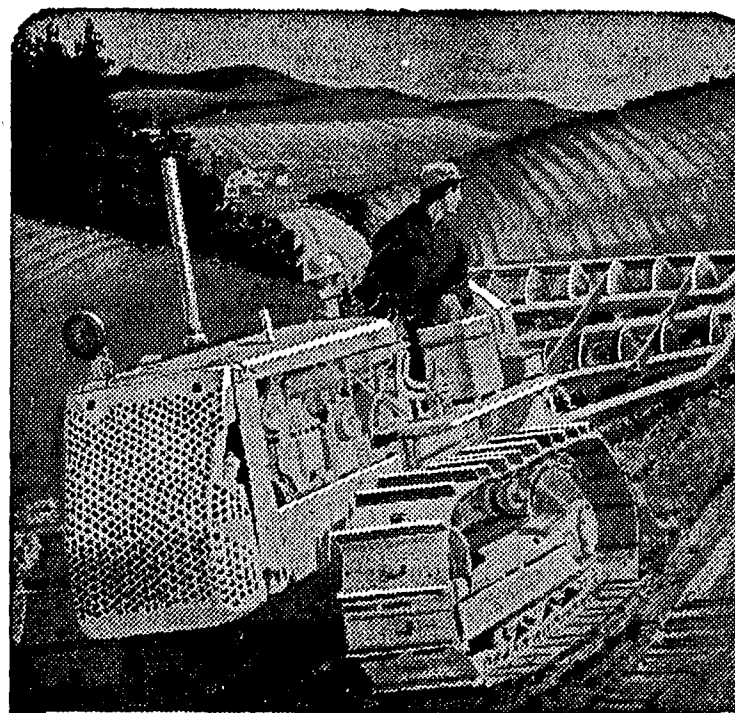
