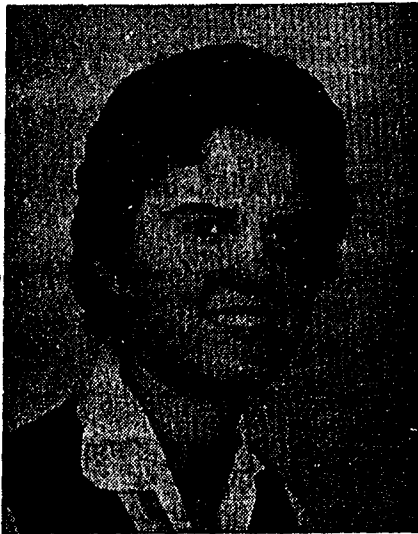

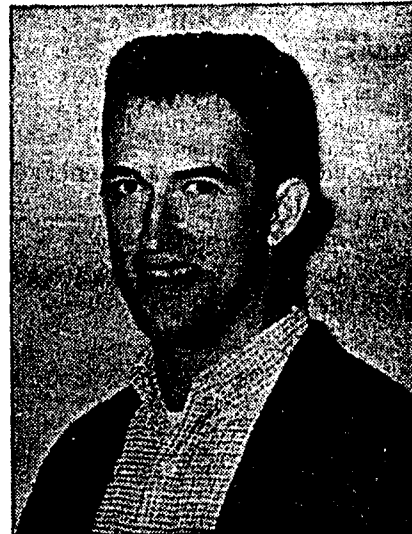
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DELEGATES TO GIRLS' AND BOYS' STATE

BEAUTIFUL DAY, LARGE CROWD AT BLOSSOM FESTIVAL

A crowd estimated at from 2,000 to 2,500 watched the parade Saturday at Kendrick's second annual Locust Blossom Festival, and 1,200 were fed at the noon barbecue by the Kendrick Community Lions Club and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

No one could have asked for finer weather, the day turning sunny and warm, following a rather chilly and cloudy early morning. The barbecue crowd almost equaled that of last year, when 1,280 were fed.

Evelyn Andrews, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Andrews, Kendrick, was crowned queen of the Festival for the 1962-63 year. Her princesses are Linda Eckman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Eckman, Juliaetta, and Sharon Fey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Fey, Kendrick. All three young ladies are juniors at Kendrick High School.

The parade was excellent, there being 35 entries in the various categories, and ranged from the "old washboard and ringer age, to the "space age." The sweepstakes trophy winner was a beautiful three-layer "birthday cake" and yellow and white which symbolized the second anniversary of the festival. It was entered by Mrs. Ted Peters of Juliaetta. Mrs. Peters spent almost uncounted hours making the 690 tiny flowers which formed the cake, and the two huge candles atop it.

DEADLY POISON WEED MAKES ITS APPEARANCE HERE — WARNING OUT

Gordon Peters came into town on Monday morning of this week, bringing with him a couple of plants of the deadly "Death Camas" or Zica-demious, which had caused the death of two of his valuable White Face cows.

When the cows failed to respond to all known treatment, and died, Mr. Peters contacted the Animal Husbandry department at the University of Idaho, and the entrails of the dead animals taken there for analysis. There the cause was determined, and a hunt began immediately for the deadly weed.

Mr. Peters said that the weed was found on the "Harrison" place, which he farms, and also found in the Bedrock Canyon Creek area.

Symptoms, when eaten by an animal are: No bloat, but a high fever, and signs of being "loco." The eyes shrink into the head, and twitching of the muscles occurs. There is no known antidote.

The plant carries a white, bunch-like bloom, and is about two feet in height. It has a bulb similar to an onion set, and the only known way of removing it is to dig!

Mr. Peters, however, issues a very serious warning: This plant puts out nitrate and nicotine poison simultaneously, and under no circumstances should it be handled with the bare hands, as the poison comes from its sap or juice, and will be readily absorbed into the blood-stream through the skin, where the result will be the same as if eaten by cattle.

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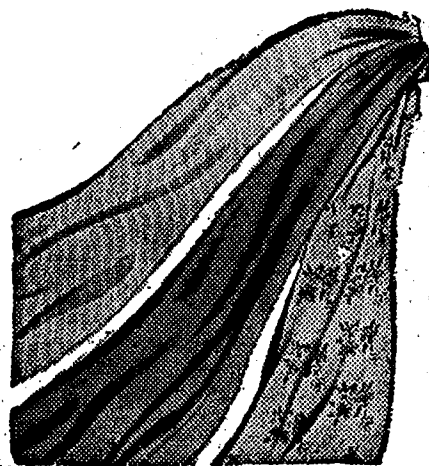

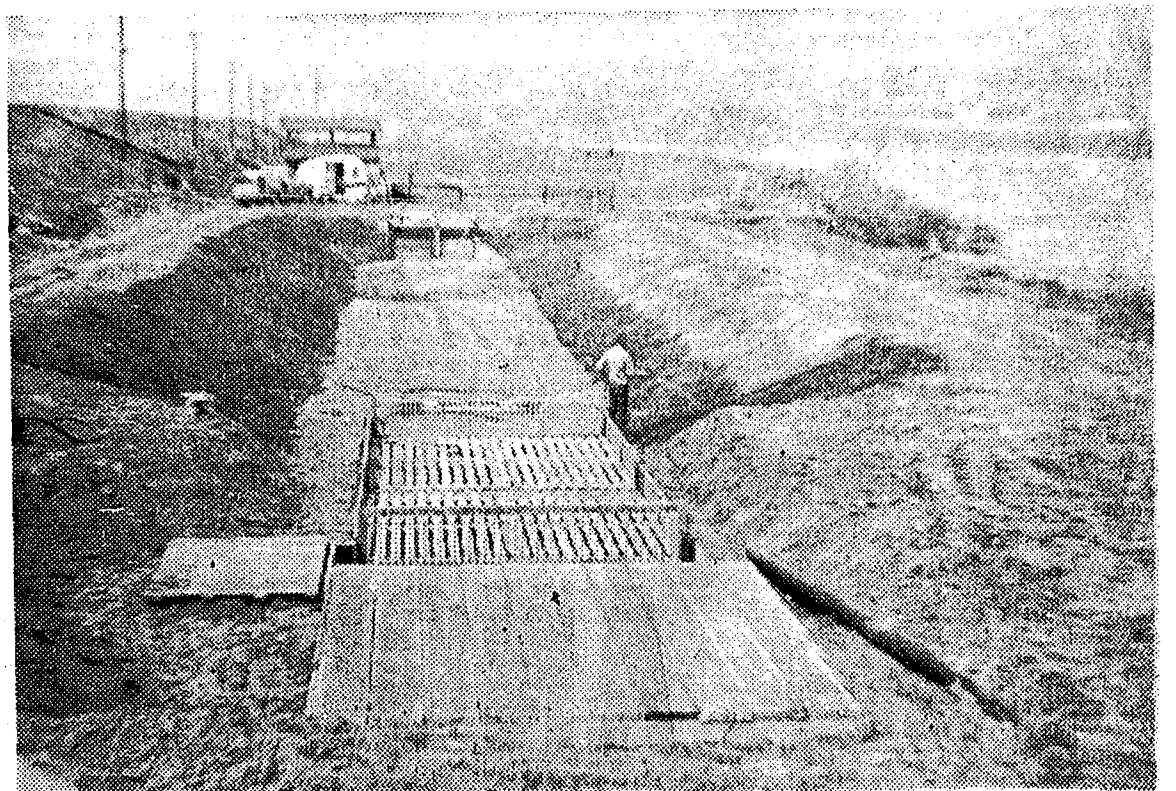

REPORTS ON LOCAL MEN IN SERVICE

Fort Lewis, Wash. (AHTNC) — Three army national guardsmen from Southwick, Idaho, are participating in Exercise Mesa Drive, a joint Army-Air Force training maneuver, at the Yakima, Wash., firing center.

Over 26,000 army troops and airmen are engaged in Mesa Drive, the largest joint field training exercise held in the Pacific Northwest.
