In the Democratic voting, as in the Republican, the local candidates led the field. George F. Brocke, totaling 92 and Gerald Ingle 83. We also note with interest that Vernon K. Smith, open "gambling" candidate, was smothered by Howard Hechtner 47 to 18, in the governor's race. Leon Danielson, a write-in candidate for county commissioner garnered more votes than his "printed" opponent, Glenn H. Sanders.

We have no information on an exact ballot count, but apparently it was 95.

## JULIAETTA ELECTION RETURNS

We regret that time does not permit a tabulation of the Juliaetta Precinct returns, but highlights are:

On the Republican Ticket apparently 39 votes were cast. Of these, the local candidate, Eugene Taylor received 39, in the voting for assessor. Robert E. Smylie led in the Governor's race, receiving 29 of the 39. In the Commissioner race Ade P. Anderson led Grace J. Wicks, 17 to 18.

On the Democratic Ticket there were apparently 48 votes cast. Here, again, the local candidates led, with George F. Brocke, for State Representative, receiving 48, and Gerald Ingle, for County Commissioner, receiving 42.

In the race for Governor Howard D. Hechtner led with 23, followed by the "gambling candidate" Vernon K. Smith with 15.

Millie Mabbott, a write-in candidate for Precinct Committeeman had 19, to win.

Leon Danielson, a write-in candidate for County Commissioner, garnered 12.

French Church, for United States Senator led the national portion with 48 tallies.

Mrs. Edna Othella (Johnson) Daugherty passed away at the Deaconess Hospital in Spokane on Monday, June 4th, 1962, of cancer.

She was born at Blackdiamond, Washington, August 5th, 1896. In 1906 she moved with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Johnson, to Leland, Idaho, where the family made its home.

In 1916 she was united in marriage to Clyde H. Daugherty, at Spokane, Washington. The Daughertys settled on a farm near Leland, and she was employed by the DeWinter & Goudzward Co. at Leland for about five years.

To this union was born two children, Clyde Daugherty, Jr., now of Los Angeles, California, and Mrs. Margaret Stewart, now of Seattle, Washington.

About 1927 Mr. and Mrs. Daugherty moved to Kendrick, making their home here until 1944, when they moved to Spokane. Mr. Daugherty passed away April 2nd, 1961.

In addition to her son and daughter she is survived by four grandchildren, Robert and Caroline Stewart of Seattle, and Timothy and Nancy Daugherty of Los Angeles, Calif. Other survivors are three brothers: Carl E. Johnson of Kellogg, Ida.; Herman V. Johnson of Leland, Idaho; and William H. Johnson of Kendrick; one sister, Mrs. Louise Siderius of Somers, Montana.

Mrs. Daugherty was a member of the Lutheran Church.

## NEW BRIDGE BEING INSTALLED ACROSS BEAR CREEK

Monday morning a low-boy truck loaded with a new girder-type steel bridge went through town — headed for the Bear Creek bridge location at the foot of the Little Bear ridge grade, and just below the Albert Westendahl home.

The old bridge — which luckily did not fall down while being crossed, was lifted out by Lum Farrington, logging contractor — who also used his big log jammer, to set the new steel girders into place.

These girders bolt together, are locked at the ends with concrete — a ten-gauge steel grid covers the whole, and then it in turn is covered with six to eight inches of asphalt paving.

There is no doubt but what the new bridge will hold up its load — for the beams measure 27 inches at the thickest point, tapering to 34 at the shallowest. There are seven of them, and the bridge is 21 feet wide, being capable of accommodating a full-rigged combine!

The Kendrick Highway District is the purchaser and installer of the bridge.

During the installation period a "ford" has been graded across the now shallow stream to accommodate those who must cross.

## ROAD WORK AT STANDSTILL

All work on the near road link between Juliaetta and Kendrick came to a "screeching halt" last week, due to a strike called by the Teamsters Union.

The road is open, is bladed occasionally and is quite passable, if you discount dust, when it's dry — and slippery, slimy clay mud, when it's wet.

No information is available as to when work may be resumed.

The last State Highway Dept. report listed the job as 96 percent complete, and with 17 men employed.

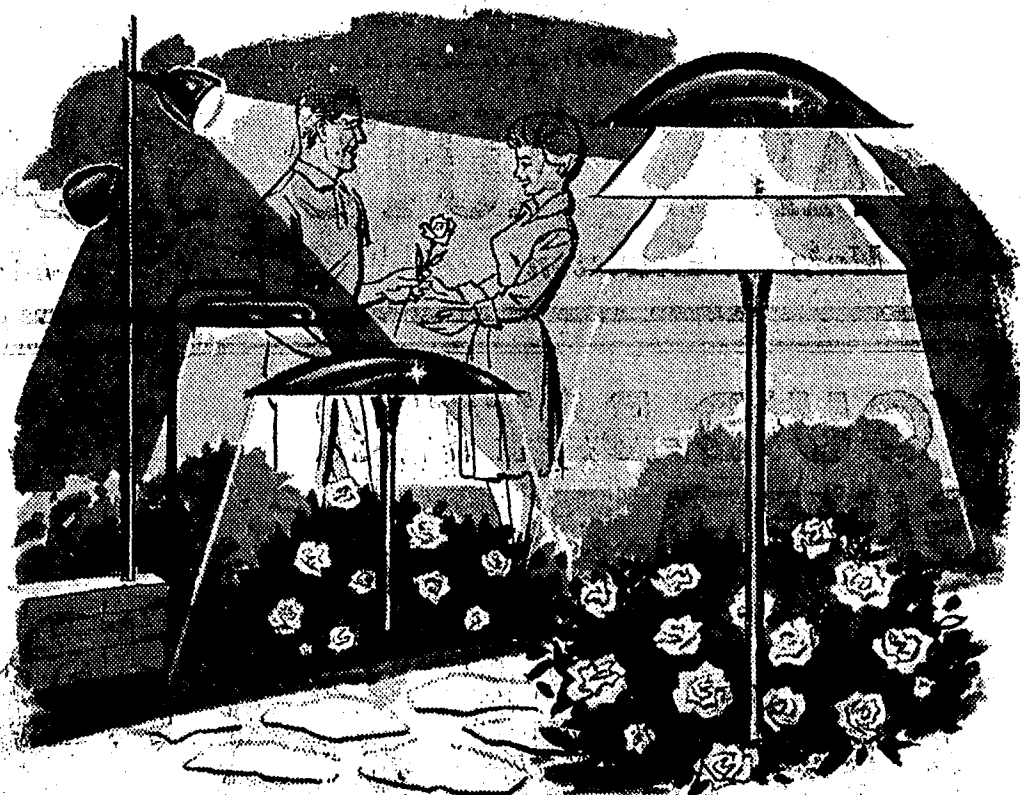

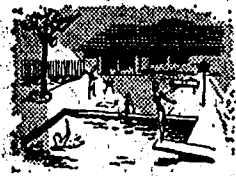

MEDICAL ASSN.  
ISSUES STATEMENT

Kellogg, Idaho — Dr. Robert E.  
Staley, President of the Idaho State  
Medical Association, charged this  
week that proponents of medical aid  
to the aged through the Social Se-  
curity System are waging "a cam-  
paign of deception."

He said that "arguments in favor  
of compulsory government medicine  
for our senior citizens revolve around  
the spurious claim that such a pro-  
gram is a form of insurance guar-  
anteeing medical care as a right."

"Backers of this measure — now  
pending in Congress, are doing the  
country a great disservice by cir-  
culating this statement," he said, add-  
ing, "their aim, of course, is to foist  
on the American people a system of  
national medicine — similar to that  
in England — under the guise of in-  
surance."

"The medical aid proposal, known

as the King-Anderson Bill, would  
provide — at public expense — hos-  
pital and nursing home care for those  
65 and over who are eligible for so-  
cial security, regardless of their need  
and regardless of their income or  
other resources," Dr. Staley said.

"The King-Anderson proposal, like  
the Social Security System itself, is  
a tax program and nothing more. It  
is in no way insurance."

"Medical care for the aged under  
this proposal would be financed by a  
gross payroll tax imposed upon the  
active workers and their employers  
to pay for medical benefits for the  
elderly — whether they needed or  
wanted such benefits."

Dr. Staley said sponsors of the  
King-Anderson Bill "know that pro-  
visions of the bill itself constitute a  
denial of the argument that wage  
earners would be building up a fund  
for their future medical benefits  
which they would receive as a matter  
of right."

"Isn't it time the sponsors of this  
bad medicine bill stopped trying to  
hood-wink the American people with  
false statements about this legisla-  
tion? Isn't it time they started ad-  
mitting their bill would force wage  
earners and their employers to pay  
higher taxes to finance a program  
that would provide medical care to  
millions of people who are well able  
to take care of themselves?"

"Isn't it time they acknowledged  
that their scheme would actually cost  
our elderly citizens the right to par-  
ticipate in a system of medicine that  
guarantees them the free choice of  
physician and hospital?" Dr. Staley  
asked.

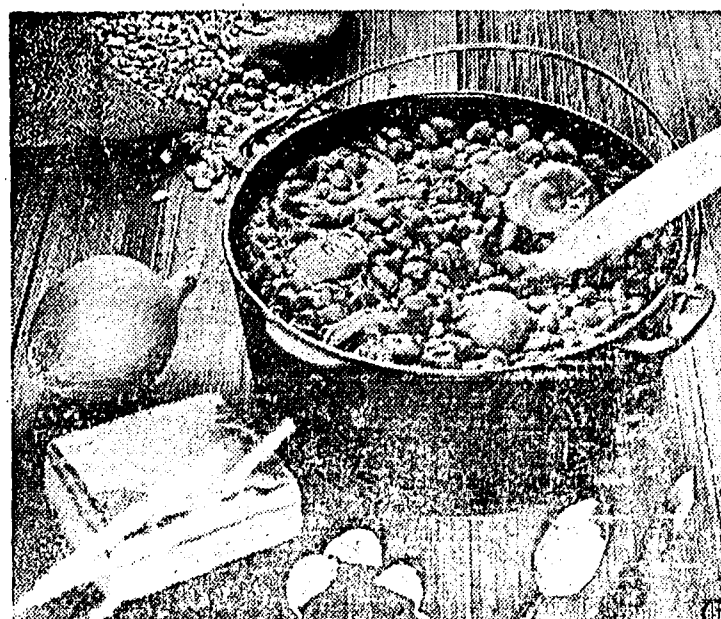

## Idaho's Buckaroo Beans



If you aren't acquainted with Idaho's dappled beans known as  
"Pintos," a pot of Buckaroo Beans made with this Western favor-  
ite will provide a perfect introduction and lead you into meeting  
another of the famous Idaho Bean family—the Red Bean. Either  
can be used in this hearty low-cost all-in-the-pot meal, obli-  
gingly slow-simmered either on the newest of thermostatically-  
controlled range surface units or over the glowing coals of a  
camp fire, with practically no watching and few dishes to wash.  
And what a meal it is! This recipe makes 6 substantial servings.

2 cups Idaho dry Pinto Beans 2 fat cloves garlic, minced  
6 cups cold water 1 small bayleaf, left whole  
1 large or 2 medium onions, 1/2 pound smoked ham, slab  
thick-sliced or chopped bacon or salt pork

Add washed beans to the water, allow to soak overnight in a  
heavy kettle. Or, in the morning, boil beans 2 minutes in the  
water. Remove from heat, cover, soak 1 hour. Add other ingredi-  
ents. Smoked ham should be cut in 1/2 inch cubes. Slab bacon or  
salt pork (salt washed off) should be sliced twice each way, not  
quite to rim. Bring to boiling point rapidly. Reduce heat to slow  
simmer. Cover tightly. Cook 1 1/2 hours. Then add

2 cups canned tomatoes 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper 1/4 teaspoon oregano or  
2 teaspoons chili powder 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin  
2 tablespoons brown sugar salt if needed

Rapidly bring to boiling point. Reduce to slow-simmer. Taste  
for salt. Cover. Simmer about 2 hours.

There should be enough liquid left on the beans to resemble a  
medium-thick gravy. If cooked at the slow-simmer stage, the  
beans will not stick to the pot. Serve in large heated soup dishes  
or over-size coffee cups, with piping-hot buttered corn bread  
and cool crisp relishes; dessert—lemon, orange or pineapple  
sherbet or simple pudding with butter cookies.

## 4-H SCHOLARSHIPS AID AG. STUDENTS

Six 4-H scholarships that have to do with conservation are being offered again this year by the Cooperative Extension Service through the National 4-H Service Committee of Chicago and the scholarship sponsors. Four are for \$1,600 each and are the largest college scholarships offered in the national 4-H award programs. They will be provided for the sixth straight year by Homelite, a division of Textron, Inc. of Port Chester, N. Y.

Present or former 4-H Club members are eligible to apply if they are college freshmen planning to major or minor in forestry.

The two other scholarships for \$800 each, are identified as crop protection-crop production. They will be given for the sixth year by California Chemical Company, Ortho Division, San Francisco.

To qualify, students must be juniors in the college of agriculture, majoring for two years in one or more of the following: agronomy, soils, entomology, plant pathology or horticulture in vegetables or fruits.

All six scholarships have been approved by the Extension Subcommittee on 4-H Club work.

Applicants for the 1962 scholarships should apply through the state 4-H Club leader or their county extension agent. Further information also is available from these sources.

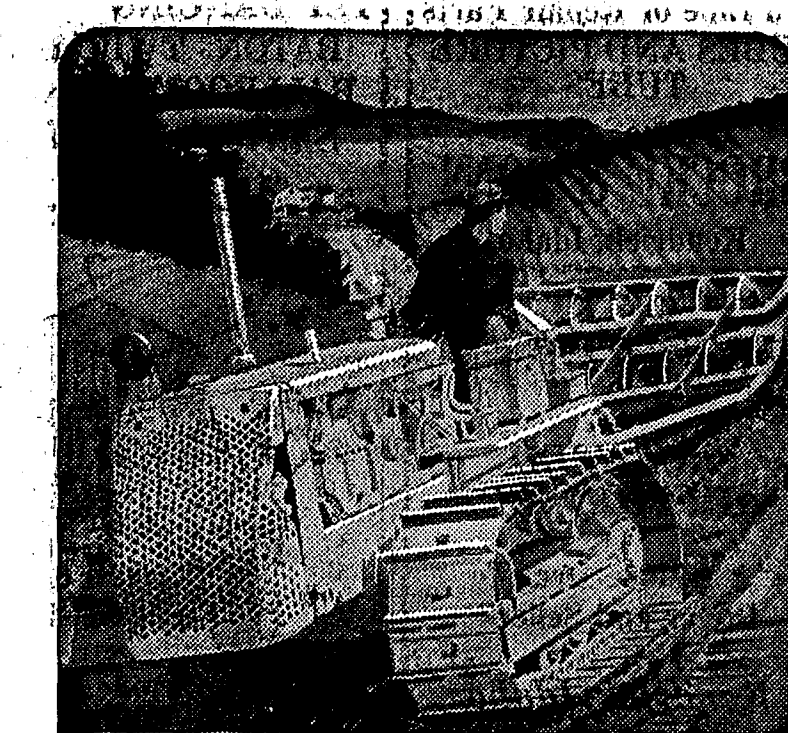
