## MORE ON DEATH CAMAS

John Guiser, Moscow, of the Latah County Weed Control was in Kendrick Wednesday afternoon of last week on official business, which included further checking on infestations of Death Camas, which was brought to the attention of this area by Gordon Peters, some two weeks ago.

He said that Mr. Peters information was correct in every detail — but said that the plant could be killed by application of chlorates, as well as by digging. Ordinary weed sprays such as 2,4-D or 2,4,5-T were ineffective, due to the narrow leave plant type. He also added that the death plant can and does spread through its seed, as well as being a perennial with a bulb.

Mr. Guiser urges all farmers and land owners to make every effort to stamp out this deadly plant now, as when the seeds are fully matured and the plant dries up, it is hard to distinguish.

Last November Mr. and Mrs. Dennler celebrated their Silver Wedding Anniversary at an Open House at the Zion Lutheran Church in Juliaetta.

Mrs. Dennler was very active in church work. She was Past President of the Missionary Society, and active in the Fix Ridge Club. She was a kind and loving wife and mother, and will be greatly missed by her many friends and relatives.

Mrs. Dennler is survived by her husband, George F. Dennler, and three daughters: Mrs. Dale E. (Arlene) Laird, Clarkston, Wash.; Mrs. Gary (Janice) Lohman of Lewiston, and Linda at the family home, and two grandsons, Fredrick and Jeffrey Laird. She is also survived by her father, Ben H. ### FEWER WOMEN FATAL DRIVERS

Involvement of women drivers in Idaho's fatal traffic accidents dropped sharply during the first five months of 1962 from a somewhat high ratio recorded during the same period a year ago, according to the department of law enforcement.

Of the 93 drivers who have been involved in fatal crashes this year, only six of them were women, a decline from 18.4 percent to 6.5 percent the department reported. The most recently published national figures show that 12.8 percent of all fatal accidents were women.

No records or estimates were available on Idaho's ratio of male and female drivers or the estimated amount of travel for each sex, a department spokesman said.

During the same five months period this year, driver fatalities climbed to a new high, with operators representing 60.5 percent of all this year's traffic deaths, a report showed. By June 1, a year ago, driver fatalities accounted for only 53.2 percent of the traffic deaths.

## TOURISTS SEEKING INFORMATION ON IDAHO

Idaho has a new range of peaks — peaks that are now out-topping in the nation's peaks. For every day's mail adds a new peak, a new high peak in the number of tourists seeking information about Idaho, and so every peak reached by Idaho's forward surge in tourist preference, out-tops the neighboring peak in the national average for tourist interest as shown by mail response.

The secret of all this in plain words is that Idaho is getting far more volume inquiries from the travel-minded public is way up in times higher than the national average. This is pointed out by Louise Shaduck, Secretary of Idaho's Department of Commerce and Development, who also indicates that the trend is all the more amazing because Idaho has not increased its scheduling of advertising. The comments increase in cost, she comments entirely due to price rises in publications rates, a nominal advance due to the inflation spiral. The cost however, has been insignificant; the response outstanding.

Advertising authorities agree that as a general rule it takes a great deal more than 20% increase in expenditures to bring back a response increased by 20%. In fact, it is such a difficult task to boost an established response, it is not infrequent that a 100 percent, or better, increase in expenditure falls to bring in a response, increase as big as Idaho's has been this year. The result is that the people of Idaho are largely getting a far better than \$25 value for every hundred dollars spent on tourism, when compared to the entire United States. So the good news from the Gem of the Mountains is that Idaho's peaks in this field are growing higher and faster by being introduced on their own sound merits — a policy which means that more and more of the desirable tourists who come, will come back more and more throughout the years.

A cross section shows that these "Inquiries for Idaho" come from all sections and represent men and women of all ages and in all walks of life who want to see their travel of life and vacation dreams come true in an Idaho setting. And a study of May figures just released show Idaho

ho inquiries still increasing at a high rate over last year in this month of May, the month in which the national average for inquiries dropped off from 55-60 percent, or nearly two-thirds.

## New Tourist Stations

To take care of the increasing inflow of tourists which nation follows the inquiries, police officials at Ports of Entry are supplying newcomers with tourist literature for the Department of Commerce and Development, especially that is suited to their needs and giving them helpful guidance. In addition, Idaho's hospitable tourist greeter stations have been increased all along the arteries leading through the heart of the entire land so that nearly all major cities now feature this helpful service. More volunteers and well-informed staff workers have been added. There are two new greeter stations at Twin Falls, one at Lewiston, one at Orofino and civic groups are pushing ahead with plans for still more.

## NEW NIBBLER

A snack that combines potatoes and milk in a wafer is the latest thing in nibblers, says Mrs. Ruth J. Shane, county home agent. It has been developed by the department of agriculture. The new wafer is made of potatoes and nonfat milk according to a formula devised by dairy technologists. The wafer is light and crisp and has a flavor like cheese. It has very little fat and is low in calories.

Unlike snacks that are fat-fried, the potato-dairy wafer has a long storage life. The new snack consists of two-thirds potato solids and one-third nonfat milk. The is a concentration of protein and other ingredients for which the two foods are valuable in the diet, says Mrs. Shane.

The wafers are made by whipping air into a mixture of the main ingredients, then adding salt and other flavoring. The dough-like mixture is then forced through a cookie press onto a screen in the form of a ribbon. This is then cut into wafer bits, dried and roasted to a light brown.

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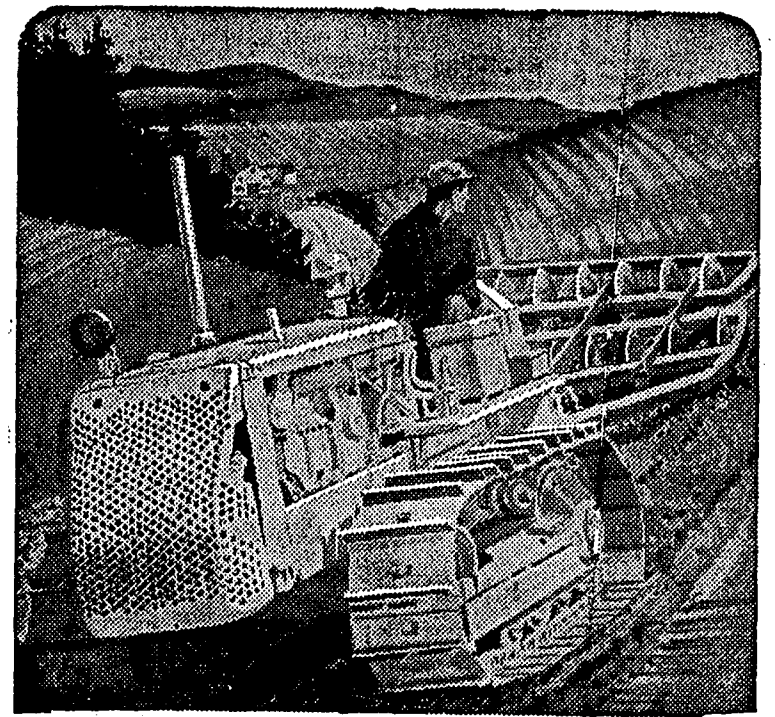
