

## FRED SCHOEFFLER, CAMERON PIONEER, KILLED BY HORSE

William F. (Fred) Schoeffler, 70, pioneer Potlatch ridge rancher, was killed Friday morning, June 15, when he was kicked in the head by a horse. He had gone out about 6:00 a. m. to do chores. He was found about 7:00 by Judy Gheaster, Lewiston, who was visiting in the family home. Nez Perce County Coroner Wilfred J. Duclos, Lewiston, ruled the death accidental. He said the horse was tied in a shed back of the farm work shop. Mr. Schoeffler's body was found on a small pile of lumber in the shed, about a foot or 18 inches off the ground. Duclos said he may have gotten on the lumber after being kicked, or could have fallen there. He expressed the belief, however, that he died soon after being kicked. His forehead bore the imprint of the horse shoe. The horse had been freshly shod the day before. No autopsy was deemed necessary. Mr. Schoeffler was a native of Cameron, having been born there on Nov. 24, 1891, and had lived there all his life, being engaged in farming. He was united in marriage to Ada Oylear at Asotin, April 28, 1918. He was a member of the Lutheran Church.

Surviving, besides his wife, are a son, Willard Schoeffler, Southwick; two daughters, Mrs. Irene Kelley, Lewiston, and Mrs. Irene Hatley of Clarkston; four sisters, Mrs. Martha Ripley, Long Beach, Calif., Mrs. Minnie Olsen, Eugene, Ore., Mrs. Lena McCoy, Bend, Oregon, Mrs. Ida Gorman, Spokane, Wash.; a brother, Otto Schoeffler, Kingston, Idaho, and three grandchildren. All were present for the funeral services. Funeral services were held Monday at 2:00 p. m. in the Brower-Wann Chapel, Lewiston, with the Rev. Theo Meske of Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Cameron, officiating. Mrs. Jack Lohman and Mrs. Burton Souders, Jr., sang "In The Garden" and "Good Night and Good Morning," accompanied by Mrs. Pauline Brigham at the organ. Active pallbearers were life-long friends, Ervin Lohman, Elmer Lohman, Leo Lohman, Aubrey Oylear, Frank Schoeffler and Wayne Schoeffler. Honorary bearers were Eugene Sherman, Leslie Heimertner, Darwin Tarry, Herman Meyer, Ward Helton and Henry Wendt. Also life-long friends and neighbors. Interment was in the Cameron Cemetery.

The funeral chapel was filled to overflowing, and the profusion of floral offerings added to the mute testimony of the high esteem in which Mr. Schoeffler was held. All who knew him, counted him as a friend.

Following spells of inclement weather, the Area Living War Memorial Swim Pool at Kendrick is in full operation, with attendance reported as "good." Miss Bertella Burk, Water Safety Instructor at the pool, said that lessons would probably get underway soon after the first of July. The schedule of lessons has not been completed at this time, but as soon as a schedule is available, and the times for registration, it will appear in the Gazette. A decision made last year to have family season tickets will be continued this year, Miss Burk said. The prices are as follows: Up to and including four persons in a family — \$12.00. The next break will be five-through-seven persons inclusive, and this size family will be charged \$15.00. Families up to eight and more will be charged \$17.50. **Will Latah Demos Support Nominee "GAMBLING" SMITH?**  
Moscow, June 18 — North Idaho Democrats met here Sunday to hear Vernon K. Smith, Democratic candidate for governor, and in the words of one spokesman, "The group was in general accord: It was felt that Smith, being the candidate, should have the support of the party." But not all those who attended were so ready to suggest that such an accord had been reached as Latah County Democratic Chairman R. Cecil Love, who made the statement. "No decision was made at all," said Rep. Carl Moore (D-Nez Perce), a candidate for state senator. He said the group had taken no vote on supporting Smith or his program of local option casino type gambling. There were minor differences, said Love. His opinion was echoed by Moore. Yet all leaders expressed belief that Democratic leaders wished the party to remain united. Smith addressed the group for about an hour, and then answered questions from the floor. He returned to Boise immediately afterward, while the group discussed "several issues of interest to the Democratic Party." Love said that the party's stand on Smith's gambling proposition was among the things discussed. Smith had told the group earlier that his "spectacular" primary victory committed him to campaign on a platform of legalized gambling this fall. Smith will oppose Gov. Robert E. Smylie, a Republican seeking a third term. Smith won the Democratic nomination June 5 over five other candidates by garnering 42.8 per cent of the vote in the primary election. The margin was more than he needed for victory without a runoff election and was greater than most party leaders, who had opposed Smith, had anticipated. — Lewiston Tribune.

## GRASSHOPPER CONTROL

A preliminary grasshopper survey shows young hoppers are hatching reports Keith Evans, Federal Director of Pest Control in Idaho. It is estimated that 35,000 acres in Nez Perce and Latah counties will come under the cost-share control program.

Evans reported that contracts are being prepared for airplane applicators and, depending on the weather and hopped numbers, spraying should start the last of June or first of July. So far the hoppers have been slow in hatching due to the cool weather, but a few warm days could cause them to hatch in great numbers.

Evans will have a survey crew working in both counties keeping track of how fast hopper numbers increase and plotting areas with populations high enough to require control.

Safety in the by-word in this control program, mentions Evans. Of the 35,000 acres to be treated, about 10,000 acres will be baited with treatad bran to prevent injury to beneficial bees, livestock and crops.

At a board meeting of the grasshopper control associations, farmers presser concern over the few hold-outs that aren't taking advantage of this program. Leaving out one farm can hatch and, then, spread the hoppers to adjoining areas.

If everyone would join in this control program, it is possible to cut hopper numbers down to where it will take several years for their numbers to build up to proportions causing damage. The cost of the control is but a fraction of the cost of the hopper damage.

The first control program in this area was in 1959 and farmers term-

ed it an outstanding success.

Farmers in Latah County interested in joining this program should contact Wayne Davis, Kendrick, Chairman of the Latah County Grasshopper Control Association; Roy Glenn Vice Chairman or James Benson, Treasure.

## COUNTY AGENT TELLS OF RECEIP

A snack that combines potatoes and milk in a wafer is the latest thing in nibblers. The county home agent, Mrs. Ruth J. Shane, learned this week it has been developed by the Department of Agriculture. It is made of potatoes and nonfat milk according to a formula devised by dairy technologists. The wafer is light and crisp and has a flavor like cheese. It has very little fat and is low in calories.

Unlike snacks that are fat-fried the potato-dairy wafer has long storage life. The new snack consists of two-thirds potato solids and one-third nonfat milk. This is a concentration of protein and other ingredients for which the two foods are valuable in the diet, says Mrs. Shane.

The wafers are made by whipping air into the mixture of the main ingredients, then adding salt and other flavoring. The doughlike mixture is forced through a cooky press onto a screen in the form of a ribbon. This is cut into wafer bits, dried and roasted to a light brown.

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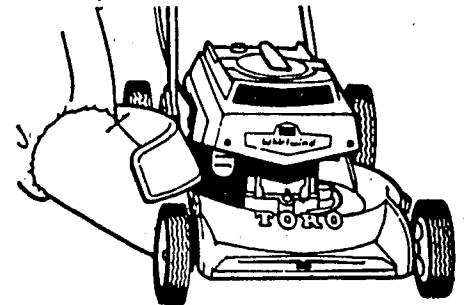
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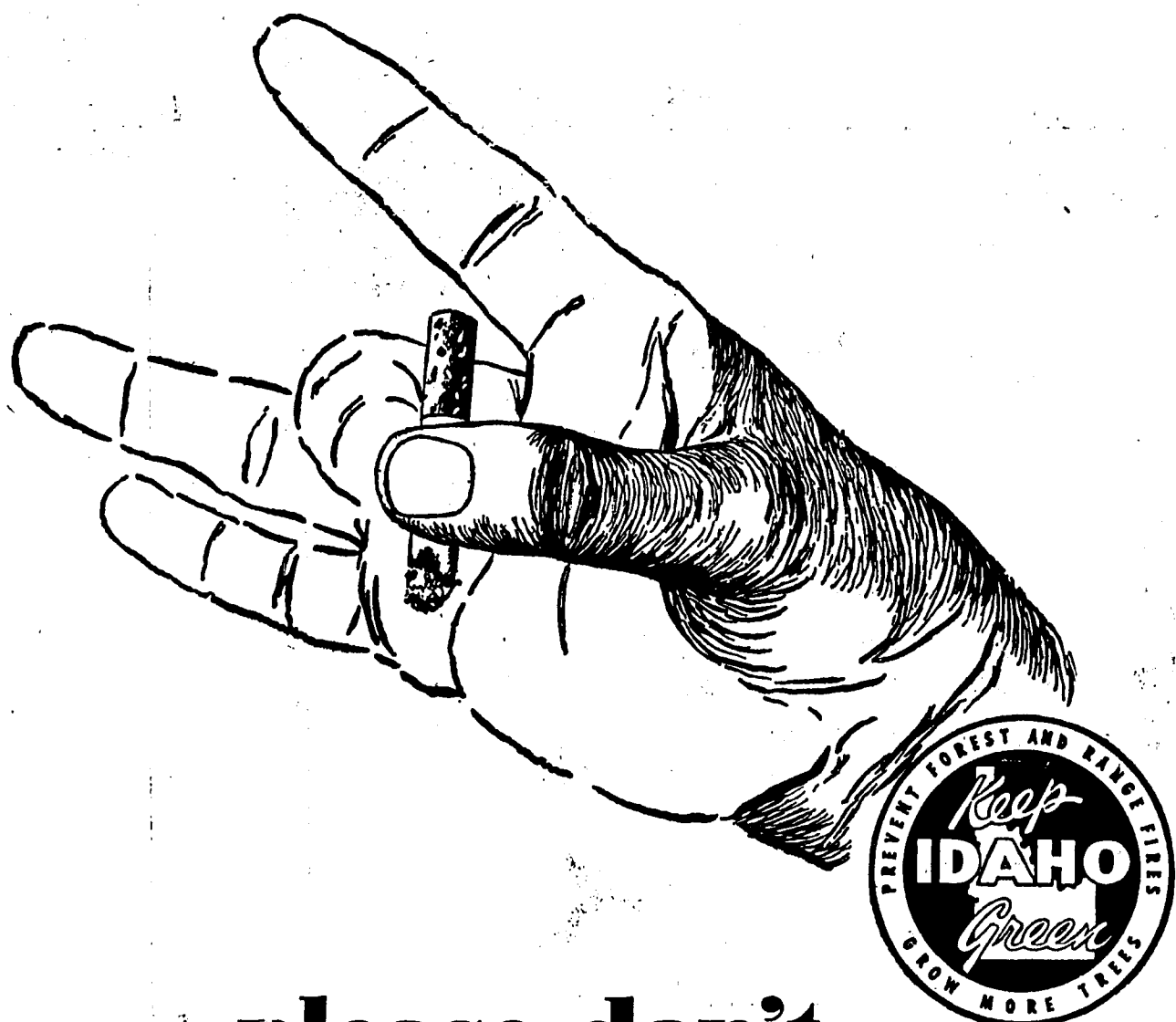

### WEEDS PROBLEM FOR STOCKMEN

U. of I., Moscow — A widespread weed problem on Idaho's grazing land is halogeton. Over the years excess grazing and insect activity have knocked down beneficial native plants such as saltsage (Mulla's saltbush), and the undesirable weed, halogeton, has replaced them.

During their recent annual research review meeting with the Bureau of Land Management, scientists of the University of Idaho's College of Forestry and College of Agriculture reported their work with the halogeton problem. The bureau cooperates with research funds in the project.

Lee Sharp, associate professor of range management, reported work centers around competitive plants such as saltsage that will grow in the same areas as halogeton. At present he is working with the University's agronomy department in the selection of superior strains of saltsage.

Saltsage is one of the most promising competitive plants to date. Nutritional value is high, and it will

germinate in "salty" soils. This latter factor is especially important. The Bureau of Land Management has been seeding areas with crested wheatgrass, but the "take" has been low in some areas because of "salty" soil.

In conjunction with these areas of research, clipping studies of saltsage for range management purposes are under way.

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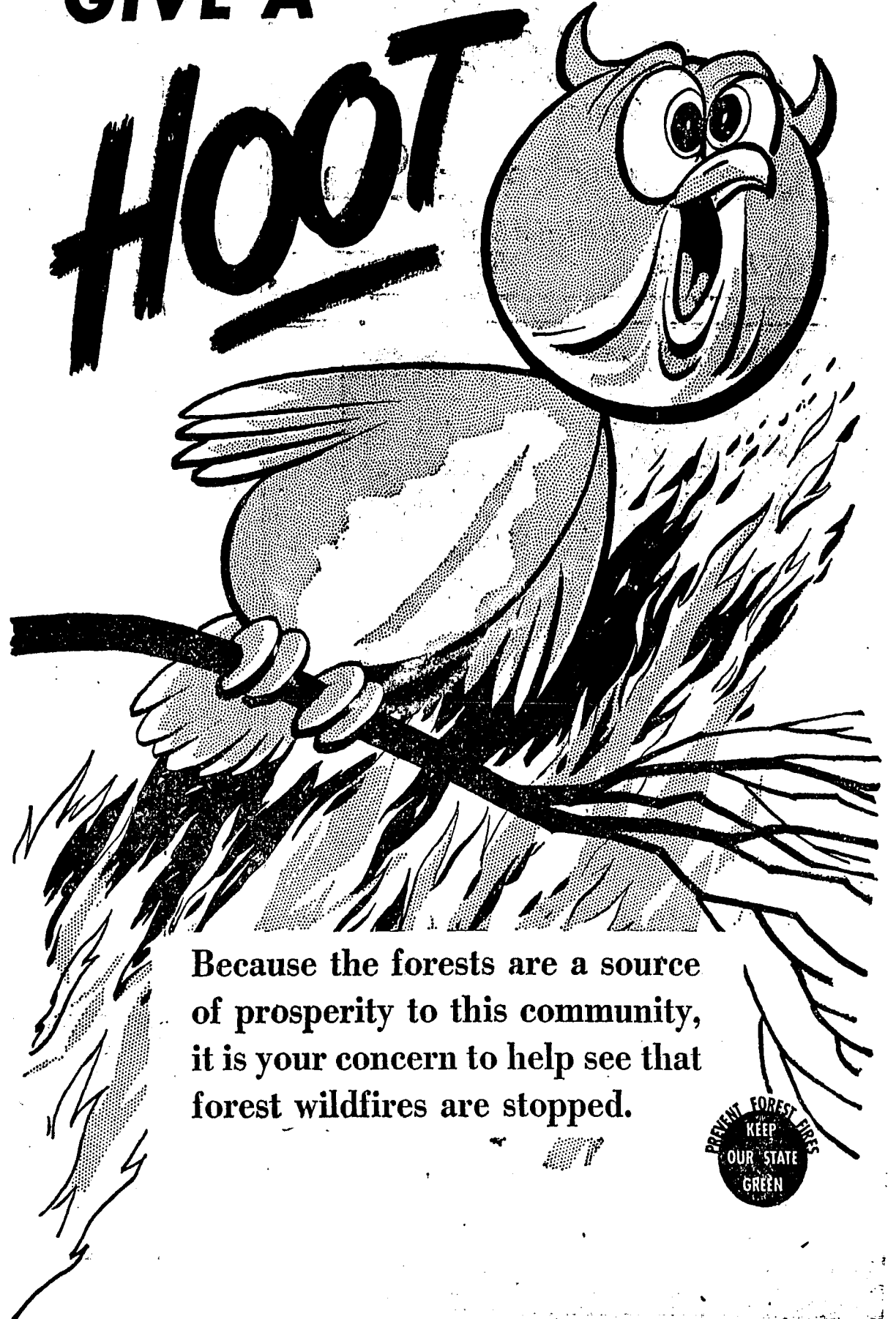

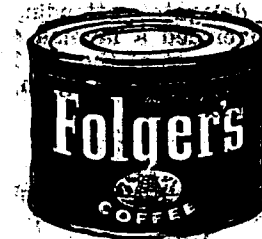

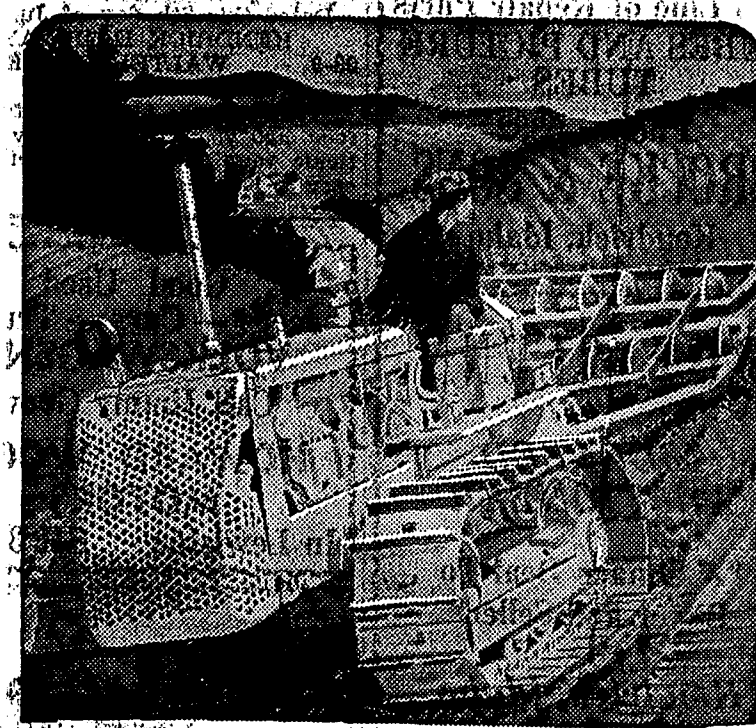
