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



WEEDS PROBLEM FOR STOCKMEN

U. of I., Moscow - A widespread weed problem on Idaho's grazing land is halogeton. Over the years excess grazing and insect activity have knocked down beneficial native plants such as saltsage (Multall's saltbush), and the undesirable weed, halogeton, has replaced them.

During their recent annual research review meeting with the Bureau of Land Management, scientists of the University of Idaho's College of Forestry and College of Agriculture reported their work with the halogeton problem. The bureau cooperates with research funds in the project.


Lee Sharp, associate professor of range management, reported work centers around competitive plants such as saltsage that will grow in the same areas as halogeton. At present he is working with the University's agronomy department in the selection of superior strains of saltsage.

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
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


