Genesee School Mill Levy Vote Is Monday

GENESEE—This coming Monday, April 13th the people in Genesee School District will be asked to approve a levy of three mills above the 30 mills allowed by law for maintenance and operation of the schools for the 1970-71 school year. If approved the mills would only be assessed for one year. The mill levy will raise approximately \$14,500.00. After looking at the preliminary budget it was determined by the board that this amount would be necessary to hold the present educational program and to do the maintenance that needs to be done. This year's budget shows a loss of revenue over last years because of a slight decrease in state funds and some vocational and federal funds. It should also be remembered that no book fees will be charged next year. Included in the maintenance would be replacing some windows in the old building and remodeling of library facilities to help meet accreditation standards. Library furniture would also be purchased and needed classroom equipment. Some of the monies would also be spent on district transportation costs.

It should also be noted that this election will help equalize the levies between Latah and Neperce counties which was caused by House Bill 304. The election law has been changed this year so that you do not have to be a property owner to vote. You must be a United States Citizen, a resident of the state for 6 months and a resident of the district for at least thirty days and 21 years of age.

The voting place will be the lobby of the Gymnasium between the hours of 11:00 A. M. and 7:00 P. M. Monday, April 13th.

Forrest Durbin To Retire From Genesee Union



GENESEE—Forrest Durbin, the third manager in the history of the Genesee Union Warehouse Company, will retire on July first. Durbin, who has been with the farmer's cooperative since 1928, has been manager for the past 23 years.

"When I started, there were just two wooden elevators and a flathouse for sack storage on the west end, and a frame elevator, a concrete elevator and sack warehouse on the east end," Durbin said. "Things have sure changed since then."

During the 42 years that he has been with the company, Durbin has seen the coop expand to a point where at present it includes building material, fuel and hardware sales; an oil plant; and storage facilities to house over two million bushels of grain.

The eldest of three children, Durbin was born in Nevada County, Missouri in 1905. The family moved to Troy, Idaho, in 1908, where his father worked for the railroad.

After graduation from Troy High School, he attended the University of Idaho for four years, graduating

with a degree in business.

He came to work for the Genesee Union Warehouse Company as a bookkeeper on October 15, 1928, and was selected as manager September 10, 1947.

Mr. and Mrs. Durbin (she's the former Lillian Messmer) have lived in Genesee all their married life. They have four children: Richard, who lives in Spokane and is employed as an accountant by Spokane Culvert; Marilyn, who works as a bookkeeper for University Oil Company in Moscow; David, in Germany with the Army; and Robert, a student at the University of Idaho.

Taking over as manager will be William H. (Bill) Wood, who has served as assistant manager since January, 1969. Wood came to Genesee with his wife, Ada, and daughters, Nikki, age 14, and Julie, age 8, from Reubens where he had been employed by the Lewiston Grain Growers for three years. Prior to that he had been the branch manager for the Lenore Grain & Seed Growers for six years.

EXERCISE PROPERLY SAYS IDAHO M. A.

Boise—Conditioning is important in all types of exercise, reminds the Idaho Medical Association.

There have been instances of "fatigue fracture" reported in connection with jogging, almost always occurring in an over-weight and normally inactive individual taking up jogging for the first time, or an individual greatly exceeding his tolerance by jogging for several miles on the first occasion.

Fatigue fractures occur when a bone is subjected to a series of stresses which it is unable to withstand. They take place in the forearm, heel or ankle, and occasionally even in the leg or hip.

Jogging should be undertaken gradually, with the time and length increased over a period of two to three weeks, or more. Jogging and other exercise programs can be dangerous if undertaken without expert guidance. For safety sake, one should consult with his family physician before taking up rigorous exercise.



IS THE LIBRARY A DYING INSTITUTION?

Boise — Are libraries in Idaho and throughout the country to go the way of the railroad passenger service? Dr. Morris E. Massey, University of Colorado marketing professor thinks this may be the case.

Speaking to librarians from eight western states meeting in Boise for a workshop on "Marketing the Public Library" last week, Dr. Massey advocated use of Madison Avenue techniques to bring "now" into the stale image most people have of their library.

"Libraries may be dead or dying — They should be the most interesting, with libraries in a negative way. They should be the most interesting, exciting, involving, environmental situation someone can go into. It should be just as alive as a box of "Screaming Yellow Zonkers."

To breathe new life into libraries Massey suggested that librarians find out just what services the public wants, provide those services and then go all out letting the public know what is available.

"A library should include films, records, pictures, anything you can get your hands on. Libraries had better be more than just books in the future." They must be multi-

media in this age when so much information is needed to keep the public abreast of what is going on in the world, he said.

Massey, who also serves as marketing consultant to a large soft drink firm and a trucking corporation, noted that many people would benefit from services now available at their libraries if they were shown how they could gain. "Go outside and promote your services in supermarkets, shopping centers, barbershops. Even use the lawn of your local library if space is a problem."

Currently the national concern is centered on environment — the pollution and ecology problems. Yet many libraries have not promoted materials they have in relation to these problems, according to Massey.

"How about piling up some garbage in the library for an eye-catching display when promoting books and pamphlets on environment? Or to emphasize the drug problem make a display of medicine bottles, hypodermics and even a marijuana plant if the police can supply them," he suggested.


Support will come from a public that has been aggressively sold the services and benefits offered the community by their library, he concluded.



Snow Survey Results

The April 1 snow survey has been completed by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Latah Soil and Water Conservation District.

There was no measurable snow at the lower elevation snow courses. The East and West Twin snow courses each have about 22 inches of snow and 8 to 9 inches of water in the snow pack. This is about average for the past ten years, and is just slightly less than last month's snow pack and water content.

The Moscow Mountain snow course has had a considerable increase in snow pack and water content in the past month. At present there are 52 inches of snow and 18.5 inches of water on the Moscow Mountain course. This is about 20 percent more than there was last month and about 15 percent above the 10-year average.

The Shervin course, which is northeast of Bovill, has 30 inches of snow, which is average for this time of year.

Most people are familiar with claustrophobia, the fairly common dread of being shut up in a confined space, but how about the very rare chromatophobia — a morbid dread of money?

Others on a list prepared by the Health Insurance Institute include the fear of snakes, ophidiophobia; fear of spiders, arachnophobia; of heat, thermophobia; of dirt, rypophobia; of darkness, achluophobia; of nudity, gymnotophobia.

There are also agoraphobia, fear of open spaces; algophobia or odynophobia, of pain; dipsophobia, of drinking; electrophobia, of electricity; taphophobia, of being buried alive; siderodromophobia, of railway trains; xenophobia, of strangers.

If you still haven't found your phobia, you might consider phobophobia, the fear of developing phobias!


