## Many Subjects Discussed At Meeting Of School Trustees

Trustees of Jt. School Dist. 283 met in a regular meeting Thursday night and transacted considerable important business.

School lunch charges were discussed and the Superintendent was told not to extend lunch ticket charges for more than 30 days at a time, effective as of November 8th.

Principal Darrel Manfull was authorized to get the ball rolling on installation of a translator at Juliaetta, which will provide educational T. V. programs beamed daily during school hours from the University of Idaho. Correlating programs are being received at the High School presently and it will be just a short time until the Elementary School has the same service. Construction of a shelter 6' x 8' is all that is now needed to insure Elementary Educational Programs.

Principal Robert Heppner projected complete athletic expenditures

and contemplated receipts to cover the sports contests for the year. He informed the Trustees that the program would be hard pressed to break even at the end of the year. Much will depend upon basketball receipts, as the basketball program normally has to carry football, basketball, baseball and track. Varsity football showed a small profit this year for the first time.

Supt. Don A. Blakeley informed the board that all school plants had passed fire inspections which are made every three months.

The Trustees were told the High School and Elementary students would participate in the Lewis-Clark Science and Math Fair, Lewiston, March 10, 13 - Inland Empire Science Fair, Spokane in April and the Kendrick Fair Feb. 19th.

Joe Staub of Coltonwood appeared before the Board members and explained benefits of tax-sheltered annuities available from the Olympic National Life Insurance Company. The decision of joining was left up to the teachers under a payroll deduction plan.

Kindergarten plans were endorsed and will be under the supervision of the P. T. O. Plans for next year's first grade students to enroll Feb. 2 and attend Kindergarten for 12 weeks duration. Jean Craig and Donna Simpson will work out plans with Supt. Blakeley.

Floyd Williams, Music Instructor, informed the Board through the Supt. that three students were tapping auditions for possible participation in the Northwest Band, Orchestra and Choir contests in March.

The Trustees gave approval for Betty Jabbor and Nancy Griffith to journey to Boise and attend the Instructional Reading Conference, November 21.

In conclusion Trustees Newman, Parks and Benjamin reviewed workshop discussions held at the State Trustee meeting in Coeur d'Alene November 4, 5 and 6.

Bills totaling \$4,676.91 were approved for payment and some of the larger bills were: Mobil Oil Corp \$102.32 for gas, Washington Water Power Co. \$199.25 for heat and electricity, Idaho Sporting Goods \$189.50 for P. E. Gazette News \$140.60 for printing and supplies, Munichem \$135.75 for janitorial supplies.

In conclusion the Board approved a Student Council request whereby girls might wear nice slacks or slacksuits on Fridays throughout the year effective immediately.

## Old Pasture Yields To The Plow

Sharp steel of a plow blade sliced into what surely must be one of the few remaining places of original Palouse prairie soil recently, as Henry Mendelkamp, a farmer living three miles northeast of Uniontown, Washington, on the Moscow cut-off road, plowed a sod pasture on his place.

Mr. Mendelkamp's father, who purchased the land in 1890, used the land as pasture for milch cows, hogs and horses at various times, and his son continued to use the acreage for the same purpose until this fall, when he decided to plow it prior to planting the field to barley. In earlier days a creek ran through the pasture, but Mr. Mendelkamp said the earth was on the dry side when it was plowed and the tractor ran in low gear during much of the plowing. It was especially noticeable how solidly packed the soil was and the build-up of layers of mud could easily be seen in the furrows left by the plow.

Mr. Mendelkamp's father passed away in 1920. His son has been raising and pasturing beef cattle on this original prairie land. An overhead sprinkling system has kept the pasture green and lush for the cattle. Mendelkamp is understandably curious to see what yield the barley will produce on this land. Close-by land has yielded up to 100 bushels per acre in the past.

## Film At Juliaetta School

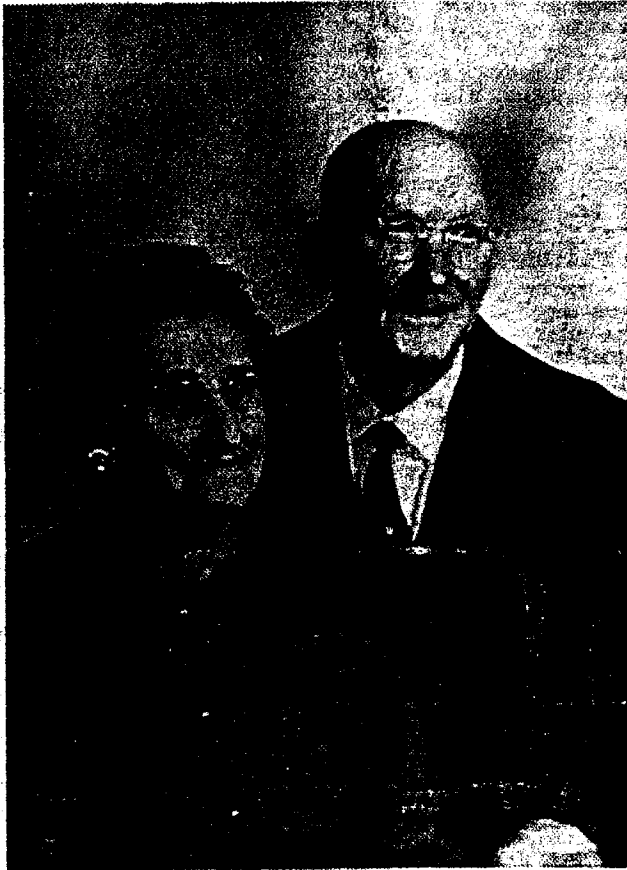

## Area Sportsmen Will Oppose Lenore Dam At Hearing Thursday Evening

Members of the Kendrick Wildlife Club will join other sportsmen in the area Thursday evening, Nov. 19, as they plan on presenting opposing testimony on a proposed Lenore Dam at a hearing to be held in Lewiston by the Corps of Engineers concerning the environmental study of the Lower Clearwater River. The meeting will be held at the Hotel Lewis-Clark in Lewiston, beginning at 7:30 p. m.

Members of the local Wildlife Club are asked to meet at the Kendrick

Fire Hall at 6:30 p. m., and the group will drive to Lewiston from there. All interested parties are asked to attend.

Construction of a re-regulating dam at Lenore on the Clearwater River will leave just 12 miles of free flowing water between Dworshak National Fish Hatchery and the Pacific Ocean, Stu Merrell, Conservation Educator for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, said earlier this week.

Murrell said a U. S. Army Corps of Engineers study on Ice Harbor Reservoir in 1969 showed that it takes 26-man days of fishing to catch a steelhead in a reservoir, and only three days to catch one in free flowing rivers.

The Fish and Game Department has taken a stand against the construction of Lenore Dam, a structure the Corps says is needed to control the rapidly changing level of the Clearwater when Dworshak Dam is finished and used to provide peaking electrical generation.

Murrell also cited use of the river that would be inundated by more than 19,000 anglers, swimmers, boaters, picnickers, and others in explaining opposition to the dam. The elimination of shoreline vegetation will also be harmful to the upland game birds and all other birds, to Murrell added.

### Bud Harless Dies In Accident

Carl A. (Bud) Harless, 57, Route 1, Coeur d'Alene, became Idaho's 285th traffic victim late last Monday when the pickup truck he was driving plunged off the Post Falls bridge into the Spokane River.

The Idaho State Police said Harless was apparently driving south from Post Falls about 9:30 p. m. when his vehicle struck the bridge railing on the northeast side of the river and flipped end-over-end, landing on its wheels about 10 feet out in the river.

Water was up to the truck's dashboard when State Police, Kootenai county sheriffs' officers and Post Falls police ordered the vehicle towed from the river.

Harless' death was termed a "possible drowning" by investigating officers.

Harless, a World War II veteran, was born at Orofino on Feb. 18, 1913. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Anna Harless, Juliaetta; three sisters, Mrs. C. Y. (Ethel) Groseclose, Juliaetta; Pearl Secrest, Spokane, and Marie Mooers, Nesperce, and three brothers, Ray Harless, Seattle; Ned Harless, Aberdeen, Wash., and Glen Harless, Fullerton, Calif.

His funeral was held at the Yates Funeral Home in Coeur d'Alene on Friday, Nov. 13th.

## Many Subjects Discussed At Meeting Of School Trustees

Trustees of Jt. School Dist. 283 met in a regular meeting Thursday night and transacted considerable important business.

School lunch charges were discussed and the Superintendent was told not to extend lunch ticket charges for more than 30 days at a time, effective as of November 6th.

Principal Darrel Manfull was authorized to get the ball rolling on installation of a translator at Juliaetta, which will provide educational T. V. programs beamed daily during school hours from the University of Idaho. Correlating programs are being received at the High School presently and it will be just a short time until the Elementary School has the same service. Construction of a shelter 6' x 8' is all that is now needed to insure Elementary Educational Programs.

Principal Robert Heppner projected complete athletic expenditures

and contemplated receipts to cover the sports contests for the year. He informed the Trustees that the program would be hard pressed to break even at the end of the year. Much will depend upon basketball receipts, as the basketball program normally has to carry football, basketball, baseball and track. Varsity football showed a small profit this year for the first time.

Supt. Don A. Blakeley informed the board that all school plants had passed fire inspections which are made every three months.

The Trustees were told the High School and Elementary students would participate in the Lewis-Clark Science and Math Fair, Lewiston, March 10-13. Inland Empire Science Fair, Spokane in April and the Kendrick Fair Feb. 19th and 20th. Joe Staub of Cottonwood appeared before the Board members and explained benefits of tax-sheltered annuities available from the Olympic National Life Insurance Company. The decision of joining was left up to the teachers under a payroll deduction plan.

Kindergarten plans were endorsed and will be under the supervision of the P. T. O. Plans call for next year's first grade students to enroll Feb. 2 and attend Kindergarten for 12 weeks duration. Jean Craig and Donna Simpson will work out plans with Supt. Blakeley.

Floyd Williams, Music Instructor, informed the Board through the Supt. that three students were tapping auditions for possible participation in the Northwest Band, Orchestra and Choir contests in March.

The Trustees gave approval for Betty Jabborra and Nancy Griffith to journey to Boise and attend the Instructional Reading Conference, November 21.

In conclusion Trustees Newman, Parks and Benjamin reviewed workshop discussions held at the State Trustee meeting in Coeur d'Alene November 4, 5 and 6.

Bills totaling \$4,676.91 were approved for payment and some of the larger bills were: Mobil Oil Corp. \$102.32 for gas, Washington Water Power Co. \$199.25 for heat and electricity, Idaho Sporting Goods \$189.50 for P. E., Gazette News \$140.60 for printing and supplies, Munchum \$135.75 for janitorial supplies.

In conclusion the Board approved a Student Council request whereby girls might wear nice slacks or slacksuits on Fridays throughout the year effective immediately.

## Old Pasture Yields To The Plow

Sharp steel of a plow blade sliced into what surely must be one of the few remaining places of original Palouse prairie soil recently, as Henry Mendelkamp, a farmer living three miles northeast of Uniontown, Washington, on the Moscow cut-off road, plowed a sod pasture on his place.

Mr. Mendelkamp's father, who purchased the land in 1899, used the land as pasture for milch cows, hogs and horses at various times, and his son continued to use the acreage for the same purpose until this fall, when he decided to plow it prior to planting the field to barley. In earlier days a creek ran through the pasture, but Mr. Mendelkamp said the earth was on the dry side when it was plowed and the tractor ran in low gear during much of the plowing. It was especially noticeable how solidly packed the soil was and the build-up of layers of mud could easily be seen in the furrows left by the plow.

Mr. Mendelkamp's father passed away in 1920. His son has been raising and pasturing beef cattle on this original prairie land. An overhead sprinkling system has kept the pasture green and lush for the cattle.

Mendelkamp is understandably curious to see what yield the barley will produce on this land. Close-by land has yielded up to 100 bushels per acre in the past.

## Area Sportsmen Will Oppose Lenore Dam At Hearing Thursday Evening

Members of the Kendrick Wildlife Club will join other sportsmen in the area Thursday evening, Nov. 19, as they plan on presenting opposing testimony on a proposed Lenore Dam at a hearing to be held in Lewiston by the Corps of Engineers concerning the environmental study of the Lower Clearwater River. The meeting will be held at the Hotel Lewis-Clark in Lewiston, beginning at 7:30 p. m.

Members of the local Wildlife Club are asked to meet at the Kendrick

Fire Hall at 6:30 p. m., and the group will drive to Lewiston from there. All interested parties are asked to attend.

Construction of a re-regulating dam at Lenore on the Clearwater River will leave just 12 miles of free flowing water between Dworshak National Fish Hatchery and the Pacific Ocean, Stu Merrell, Conservation Educator for the Idaho Fish and Game Department said earlier this week.

Murrell said a U. S. Army Corps of Engineers study on Ice Harbor Reservoir in 1969 showed that it takes 26-man days of fishing to catch a steelhead in a reservoir, and only three days to catch one in free flowing rivers.

The Fish and Game Department has taken a stand against the construction of Lenore Dam, a structure the Corps says is needed to control the rapidly changing level of the Clearwater when Dworshak Dam is finished and used to provide peaking electrical generation.

Murrell also cited use of the river that would be inundated by more than 19,000 anglers, swimmers, boaters, picnickers, and others in explaining opposition to the dam.

The elimination of shoreline vegetation will also be harmful to the upland game birds and all other birds, to Murrell added.

## Chet Green Genesee Police, Fire Chief

Genesee—Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst announced this week that Chet Green has been appointed Police and Fire Chief of the City of Genesee, effective November 16. Green will take over the position of Willard "Moon" Dyer, who resigned several months ago.

Green has been employed for the past six years at Genesee Union Warehouse Co., where he was foreman of the West End Elevators. No successor has been appointed to fill that post.

Since moving into town and working at the warehouse, Green has been an active member of the Genesee Community Firemen, Inc., and has also worked as a part-time policeman on various occasions.

Returns so far indicate that about 60 per cent of those sending for information actually do come to Idaho on vacation. Renstrom said that this is a high average and proves the worth of advertising in national magazines.

The study based on a 10 per cent follow up sampling of the 60,000 magazine coupons received by the department so far this year is expected to be completed by the end of November, at which time the results will be released.

The number of cards being returned should also provide a statistically reliable study of advertising response, which is the first of its kind conducted by the department. Renstrom said, "There are people out there that really like us," and consider our state to be a perfect place for a vacation.

Things this delicious should be eaten at the holidays. The Party Mix is something most of us make a batch of every year just to have on hand when friends drop in.

In the coming weeks you'll enjoy trying recipes sent in by Mrs. Ed Jutte, Mrs. Ray Qualey, Mrs. Joe Ferraro and many others. Send yours along too, we can always use them.

### TWO FLAVOR FUDGE

Combine in saucepan:  
2 cups brown sugar  
1 cup white sugar  
1 cup canned milk  
1/2 cup butter  
Bring to boil, and boil for 15 minutes stirring constantly. Add 7-oz. jar marshmallow creme and one 6-oz. package butterscotch and one 6-oz. package semi-sweet chocolate morsels. Stir in morsels until dissolved and smooth. Add 1 cup nuts and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour into greased 9x13 pan. Makes about 2 1/2 lbs.

### DIVINITY FUDGE

2 2/3 cup sugar  
2/3 cup corn syrup  
2/3 cup water  
2 egg whites  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 cup chopped nuts  
Combine sugar, corn syrup, and water in pan, stir only until well mixed. Use cover to bring mixture to boil, then remove cover and boil until hard ball stage.  
Pour syrup slowly over stiffly beaten egg whites and beat constantly till all of the syrup has been added. Add vanilla and nuts and baking powder and continue to beat until it is cool, and beginning to set. Pour candy onto buttered platter, and cut before completely cold.

### PARTY MIX

Heat oven to 225 degrees.  
Slowly melt 6 tablespoons margarine or butter. Stir in 4 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon season salt, or 1/2 teaspoon garlic and 1/2 teaspoon onion salt.

Add 6 cups mixed cereal, (chex, cheerios, etc.). Add 1 1/2 cups pretzels, and 3/4 cup salted nuts.  
Mix until coated. Put in oven, and stir every 15 minutes. Total time in oven 45 minutes. Store in tight container until used.

### CRANBERRY NUT LOAF

1. Grease and flour a 9x5x3-inch loaf pan. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.  
2. Sift together, 3 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 3/4 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup sugar.

## Old Transmitters

Old 47.150 Megacycles was a tiny radio transmitter that "beeped" a steady electronic signal from the neck of cow elk on the North Fork of the Clearwater River, where nine more "bugged" animals of the same species were being monitored by aerial observers. All of them could be tracked without difficulty until one day Old 47.150 Megacycles became silent, and later was brought to the Idaho Fish and Game Department by a hunter who said he had shot the cow that carried it. This means that of the ten elk outfitted with transmitters, only one was harvested by hunters in an area criss-crossed with access roads.

By June 1970, 91 elk were live-trapped and color-marked for future identification including 17 retraps, at six locations on the North Fork of the Clearwater River. To date, hunters have notified the department that four of the 91 elk (4 per cent) have been taken this season.

The department does not need the tags and markers but does want to know when and where an animal was bagged, what color markings, and what the serial number was. Comparing where the tagged elk have moved from the trapping site to the place where they were shot by hunters provides information on the movements and range, as well as hunter take. These data are helpful in maintaining both the habitat and elk herds.

## Limited Hen Hunting

Check regulations for details, but limited hen hunting in some parts of southern Idaho is nearing again this season. For example, the Western and Magic Valley regions will close for pheasant hunting December 6. Beginning November 28, the daily bag is 4 pheasants, one of which may be a hen. Possession limit, November 28-December 6, is eight birds, two of which may be hens. In Bannock, Bingham and Power counties, the daily bag beginning November 28 is four pheasants, one of which may be a hen. On November 29, the possession limit is eight pheasants, two of which may be hens.

Owners of vehicles registered under the annual license system are reminded by the Department of Law Enforcement that registrations expire at midnight Dec. 31 and must be renewed prior to the deadline. New validation stickers may be obtained at county assessors' office now.

3. With a pastry blender, cut n 1/2 cup shortening, until mixture resembles cornmeal.
4. In another bowl, combine 2 eggs, and 1 1/4 cups milk. Add 1 tablespoon grated orange rind.
5. Add milk mixture to dry ingredients, stirring until just damp. Fold in 1/2 cup chopped nuts, or pecans, and 1 cup whole fresh cranberries. Pour into loaf pan.
6. Bake one hour or until toothpick comes out clean. Wrap and store loaf in refrigerator overnight for easier slicing.
7. For each serving, spread with whipped cream cheese, add a second slice and spoon on cranberry relish.

Moscow — The number of persons receiving unemployment insurance benefits in Latah county is more than double the number receiving jobless pay last year, reported Frank Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Department of Employment. There are 195 persons receiving benefits, compared to 127 last week and 87 a year ago. During the week, 80 new claims were filed.

Weather conditions in the woods was the primary factor contributing to the rise in the number of persons seeking unemployment insurance. The largest increase was noted in the Potlatch area and the Troy-Bovill area. Forty-eight persons are receiving jobless pay in the Potlatch area compared to 24 last week and 11 a year ago. In the Troy-Bovill area, 51 persons are claiming benefits compared to 24 last week and 29 a year ago.

There were 79 Moscow residents claiming benefits during the week in addition to four in Genesee, five in Kendrick and eight in Elk River.

## POLLUTION FISH KILLS

PUBLISHED FOR DECADE

In 1960, the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare asked all State fish and game agencies to assist in the reporting of pollution-caused fish kills. Summary reports have been issued annually since 1960 by this federal agency (now the Federal Water Quality Administration).

Data tabulated includes the waters affected, location, date of kill, cause of kill (agricultural, industrial, municipal, or transportation operations), numbers of fish killed with percentages of game and nongame fishes, severity of kill, number of miles or acres affected, and duration of critical effect.

Idaho has been a contributor to this reporting system since 1960. The first report from Idaho was dated December 9, 1960, when 250,000 fish were killed in Milner Reservoir on the Snake River near Burley. The 1960 summary published by the Department of H. E. W. listed 286 fish kills in 38 reporting states.

Idaho's contribution was the second largest reported kill and was surpassed only by a 6-million-fish kill in West Virginia.

Idaho has reported pollution-caused fish kills every year since 1960, ranging from one report in 1961; 1962 and 1965 to a high of 8 fish kill reports through October, 1970. A total of 31 fish kills have been recorded on Idaho waters in the past eleven years, involving 1,846,339 fish in 118.3 miles of streams and 1,689 surface acres of lakes and reservoirs. Thirty-three percent of the fish killed were game fish species.

Industrial operations have been responsible for 52 percent of the fish kills, agricultural operations 32 percent; municipal operations 6 percent; transportation accidents 6 percent, and the remainder miscellaneous.

The fact that 67 percent of the fish killed by pollution in Idaho waters have been nongame species often elicits a "so what" philosophy about pollution kills, especially if all or the majority of the fish involved are suckers, chubs, or carp, etc. Overlooked is the aquatic degradation by pollution which has already precluded the presence of game fish in the affected area.

Many kills have and probably will continue to involve only nongame fish species for the simple reason that the water can no longer support pollution intolerant game fish species.

## Licenses Needed For Holiday Parties

Boise Persons or organizations planning holiday parties where liquor is to be served or sold are reminded by the Liquor Law Enforcement Division that the law covering catering permits necessary for such affairs was changed by the last legislature. It is pointed out that an applicant for a catering permit no longer has to file his application at least 20 days in advance of the event.

Applications for catering permits, which are good for no more than three consecutive days, must be filed with city or county officials where the affair is to be held, accompanied by a fee of \$20 for each day the permit is to be used.

Only holders of Idaho retail liquor licenses are eligible to obtain the catering permits for the sponsoring group.

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**LEAD SHOT POISONING  
NOT HARMFUL TO MAN**

Pheasants this year are getting all the public attention because of the mercury problems in Idaho and elsewhere while many ducks, geese and swans throughout their flyways will die for the most part emaciated and unnerved, from eating lead shot on their feeding areas, the Idaho Fish and Game Department said today.

Both mercury and lead, among others, are called heavy metals. Lead shot ingested by humans while eating ducks or geese is not harmful. In the gizzard of waterfowl, however lead shot may be ground against gravel and stone

as food is digested. Any lead "salts" resulting from this grinding action can be absorbed into the blood stream and become toxic.

Lead bird shot is scooped up accidentally by migratory waterfowl from the bottoms of wetlands throughout the continent. Mixed with lead pellets often generate enough toxic fluid in the gizzards to kill the birds.

Iron shot has loomed as a possible substitute for lead pellets for years but its damaging effects on gun barrels is too well established. Experimenters now are trying to develop a new soft iron that might reduce barrel wear and tear.

**Landscaping Your Home**

In landscaping a home, plan before you plant. A careful plan comes first in creating beauty and utility, advises Tony Horn, horticulturist of the University of Idaho extension service. He offers practical suggestions in "Landscaping Your Home Grounds," a leaflet just published. You can get a free copy from the county agent.

Make a scale drawing of your home and yard on graph paper, Horn suggests. An ideal scale is a quarter inch to one foot. You can plan where and what you want in the yard and make changes with an eraser instead of a spade.

Most landscape designers divide the yard into several areas. The public area is the front yard and parking space. The private area is the outdoor living room and play space. The service area include the driveway, clothesline and garbage cans. The garden area is for vegetables and flowers.

Base plantings of low shrubs and small trees tie the house to the ground and emphasize a point of interest such as the front door. The lawn should slope away from the house for good drainage. A lawn is as effective in landscape design as carpeting is in interior design.

Concrete walks are best in areas that have lots of snow, Horn says. If you don't need to shovel snow, a walk of brick or flagstone may be more interesting. As a rule, the specialist says, walks should be straight and conveniently located. If not, the people will take shortcuts and make paths in the grass.

You must have a valid reason for curving a walk, such as going around a rock or tree.

Trees should be placed at least thirty feet from the house. Plant trees that are hardy and suited to the geographical area and purpose.

The bulleting lists trees and shrubs suitable to each of four Idaho districts.

**Drive Carefully**

BOISE—The Idaho State Police urged motorists Tuesday to practice courtesy and drive cautiously during the Thanksgiving Day holiday.

"Courtesy and caution on the highways can help a lot in attempts to reduce traffic accidents," said the Idaho State Police.

The ISP also advised those planning holiday trips to start early and allow extra travel time in order to arrive safely.

Two persons lost their lives in Idaho traffic accidents on this holiday last year, it was pointed out.

Speed is a deadly killer, reminds the Idaho State Police. That is why legal speed limit signs dot every major highway in Idaho. They are to remind you that danger is just a second ahead. Don't drive too fast for existing conditions.

**Over 7 Million Chinook  
Eggs Planted In River**

There were about 7,579,000 spring chinook salmon eggs planted in artificial hatching channels on the Clearwater River this fall according to Steven Hoss, Fishery Biologist, Idaho Fish and Game Department. This number of eggs is three times greater than any number planted in earlier years and included two hatching channels on the South Fork of the Clearwater that had not previously received spring chinook eggs. The planting program is an attempt to increase the runs of spring chinook salmon that were eliminated by Lewiston Dam when it was constructed.

The eggs were placed in Running Creek, Ditch Creek, and Indian Creek channels on the Selway River and in Crooked River and Red River channels on the South Fork of the Clearwater River. The eggs were provided by egg-taking operations at Rapid River Hatchery near Riggins. John Parvin, Superintendent of Dworshak Fish Hatchery, provided the additional incubation trays to "eye up" almost 5 million eggs at Sweetwater Eyeing Station. The "eye up" stage is reached when a black dot appears in the egg which will eventually become the fish's eye. During this stage, eggs develop a tough coat and are resistant to handling, which makes an ideal time to transport and plant them. The U. S. Fish Hatchery at Clear Creek near Kootenai also incubated eggs for the operation.

The chinook salmon run increased dramatically from 990 in 1968 to 2,529 fish over Lewiston Dam in 1969 as a result of previous plants in the Selway drainage. However, the 1970 run was disappointing with only 1,700 fish counted. This reduction was probably the result of nitrogen gas bubble disease caused by downstream dams since over 40 percent of the spring chinook returning to Rapid River Hatchery showed symptoms of the disease.

Spring chinook eggs are planted in the fall and hatch under the gravel and remain as "sac fry" in the gravel over winter, emerging in May or June as small fish ready to feed. "Sac fry" are fish with a yolk sac attached to their bellies. They use this sac as food during the winter. Steelhead eggs are planted in the Spring, hatch in early summer, and emerge as feeding fry in late June or July.

There were also over 2 million steelhead eggs planted in the South Fork of the Clearwater River this spring. Explorer Scouts from Post 188, Lewiston, assisted in planting these eggs. The steelhead re-introduction program in this drainage has been very successful, with anglers catching large numbers of the juvenile fish during trout fishing season. This indicates the steelhead have had good spawning success.

During the 1970 season, coho fingerlings were released into the waters of Coeur d'Alene and Hayden Lakes in northern Idaho, as well as several Idaho reservoirs. Fishery experts are interested especially in the Hayden lake release because it is landlocked and the coho transplants cannot escape over a dam.

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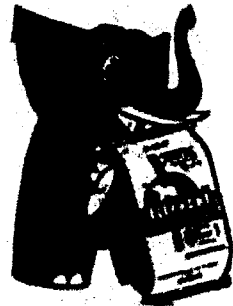
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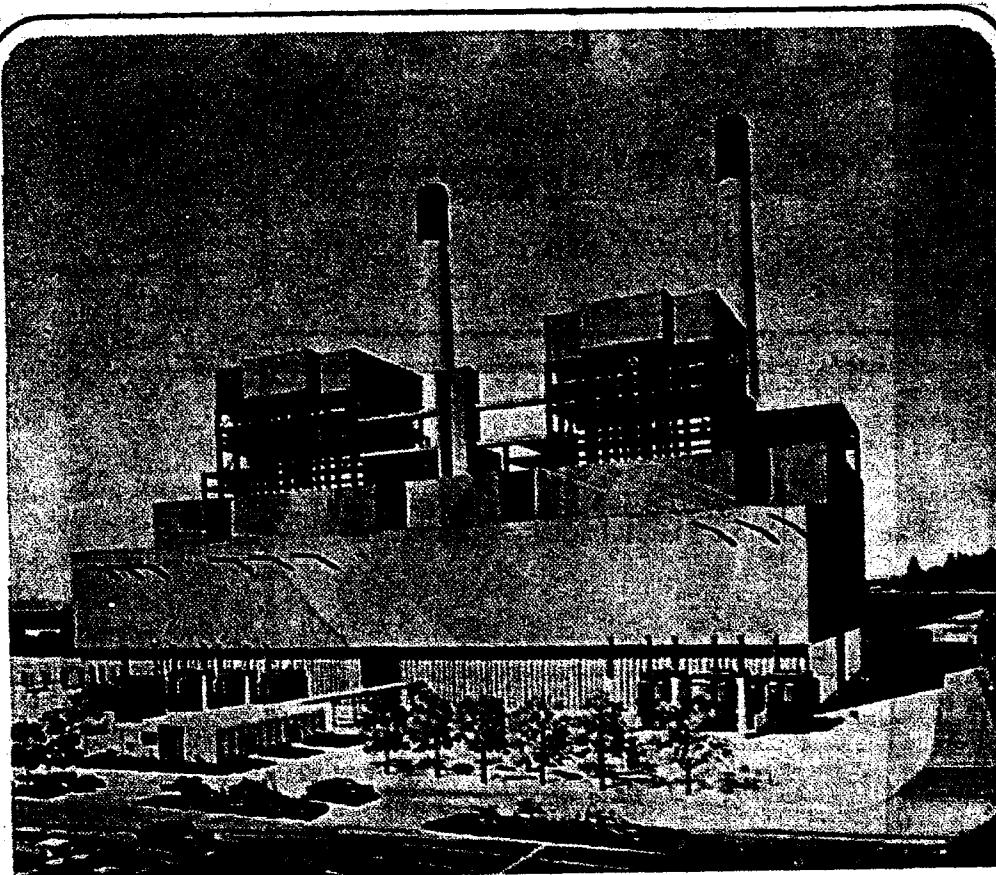
