The girls' parents, Victor Hasfurth and Frances Hennen were married June 27, 1892, at the St. Mary's Catholic Church in Genesee with the Rev. Father Hartlieb officiating. Mr. Hasfurth was born in Hasfurth, Germany, and came to America with his parents when he was just six weeks old. Frances Hennen was born at Fond de Lac, Wisconsin, and came to Genesee when she was 17 years old. Following their marriage they set up housekeeping on a farm two miles out of Genesee, where four of their children, Kate, Dora, Mayme and Martha were born. In 1904 the Hasfurthers left the farm and moved to Genesee, settling in the house now owned by Henry Kinzer. Here Madeline and Wilfred were born. All of the children are living and in good health... a fitting and happy tribute to one of Genesee's fine pioneer families.

With football season over and winter weather rapidly approaching, athletes from Genesee and Kendrick High Schools moved their activities indoors as both Ozzie Kanikkeberg of Genesee and Wayne Dust of Kendrick have been putting their 1970 teams through practice sessions in preparation for the opening of the basketball campaign, Tuesday, December 1.

The Tigers will debut before the hometown fans Dec. 1st in a contest against the Deary Mustangs. Genesee will travel to Troy that same evening as they open against Coach Glen McKie's Trojans at Troy.

Tigers Lack Height
Coach Wayne Dust has seven lettermen back from last year's squad to form the nucleus of the 1970 Tiger Hoop team, and although he will have both speed and experience, the height is missing. Until Boyd

Candler has enough practice sessions to qualify for the team, Dust will not have a six-footer on the squad! Lettermen returning this year are Don Parks, Doug Pratt, John Deobald, Boyd Candler, Alan Kimbley, Kim Trout and Dave Hutcheson. Moving up from the Jr. Varsity team will be Dave Wilken, Dale Taylor, Eddie Osborn, Dale Alexander and Warren Austin.

The Tigers will be hoping to improve on last year's record which saw them winning four games and losing 16 in regular season play.

Home games will begin at 6:30 with varsity games immediately following at approximately 8:00 p. m. After the opening game at home the Tigers will meet Orofino at Orofino, Tuesday, December 8. The first league game will be at Lapwai, December 11.

The Bulldogs will have Mike Egland back in the keyhole slot this year and Mike is pushing slightly above the 6'-5" mark. Also returning will be John Hermann and Steve Mader, each at 6'-3". Other lettermen back will be Bruce Scharnhorst, Ron Hopkins and Leroy Zenner. Recently the class completed a unit dealing with space. The class members participated in group reports, individual reports and in making models of the planets out of paper-maché.


At the present time the class is studying the "Seasons." Class members have planted a variety of seeds to discover the effect of heat, light and pollution on the seeds and plants as they grow.



Home Cookin' . .

Spaghetti and meat balls and sausage or spaghetti with sauce are both delicious and a favorite food of most everyone. So this week we are fortunate to have a family favorite recipe for Italian Spaghetti from Mrs. Frances Ferraro. The Ferraro family are new comers to Genesee and we welcome them and hope they stay! They moved here a few months ago from California and are residing on the Tom Wahl place. How about serving spaghetti, garlic bread and a green salad for supper some night real soon? Sounds good, huh.

In large sauce pan place—
2 large cans tomato sauce
2 large cans tomato puree

In large fry pan place 1/2 cup olive or vegetable oil. Add 1 small can tomato paste and 1/4 cup sugar and stir. (Add more sugar is needed). Add about 2 shakes of onion and garlic powder and 1/2 tsp oregano.

Grate about 1 T. Romano cheese into pan and 1/2 tsp. each of salt and pepper. Add 2 cans water and cook 10 minutes stirring until free from lumps. Pour into sauce pan with tomato sauce.

Add 1/2 green or dry green pepper, 1 1/2 inch square of Romano cheese. Add little more sugar if too sour.

Fry either a piece of pork, spare ribs or pork chop until browned. Place in sauce pan.

To Make Meat Balls:
2 or 3 lbs hamburger, with salt, pepper, onion powder, garlic powder and oregano to taste. Grate Romano cheese

2 or 3 times, 2 eggs, 1 cup cracker meal or bread crumbs. If too dry, sprinkle with a little water. Mix thoroughly. Make medium sized meat balls. Brown, place in sauce.

Brown 1 pkg. Italian sausages and add to sauce.

Bring almost to a boil, then cook uncovered a while, then cover part way.

Simmer 5 or 6 hours. May make a day ahead and simmer 3 hours, then finish simmering the next day. Serve with spaghetti.

This will serve a large family. Mrs. Ferrera says, with some left over for next day. She asks that anyone who finds Italian sausage in the store, to please contact her.

FIVE HOUR STEW

3 or 5 lbs stew meat, cut in pieces
2 or 3 cups diced carrots
2 or 3 cups diced potatoes
2 cups diced celery
1 onion, chopped
1 Tbls. tapioca
1 Tbls. sugar
1 cup water
1 cup tomato soup
Salt and pepper to taste.
Place in roaster and bake 5 hours at 225 or 250 degrees.

1 unbeaten egg
1 teaspoon vanilla. Mix thoroughly.

Add—
2 cups sifted flour to which has been added 2 teaspoons baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Drop on greased cookie sheet and bake.

Icing: While still warm spread on the following:

1 cup confectioners sugar
1/2 cup orange juice
Rind of one orange
1 teaspoon butter, blended well.

DATE FILLED COOKIES

Blend: 1 cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup hot water
1 teaspoon vanilla
Add 3/4 cup sifted flour to which has been added

1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Drop by teaspoonfuls on cookie sheet. Make indentation and fill with following:

2 cups chopped dates and 1/4 to 1/2 cup water. Boil until very hard.

Add 3 cups brown sugar
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
Cool. Place more dough on top and bake.





EMPLOYMENT DROPS

The number of persons seeking unemployment insurance benefits continues to climb, reports Frank Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Department of Employment. During the week, 85 new claims were filed boosting the total to 263. This compares to 195 last week and only 98 a year ago. Poor weather conditions in the woods has been the largest contributing factor to the rise in unemployment. During the week, 84 Moscow residents received jobless pay in addition to six in Genesee, 97 in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, eight in the Kendrick area, 58 in the Potlatch area, and 12 in the Elk River area.

Ten area residents were placed on jobs through the Moscow office, Hartstein added. Eight new jobs were received during the week. At the close of the week there were 13 jobs available including openings for a service station attendant, T. V. repairman, kitchen helper, newspaper deliveryman, housekeeper, babysitter, waitresses, maid, Licensed Practical Nurse, counter girl and laundry hand.


