Bulldogs Run Win Streak To Five

Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg and his Genesee Bulldogs marked up their fourth of five wins of the current basketball season over the week-end. Friday night they staged a comeback behind rally to defeat the Kamiah Kubs 69-59, and then Saturday they returned to their home court and drubbed the Prairie Pirates 81 to 41.

The Kamiah Kubs, unbeaten in league play this year and rated one of the toughest teams in the league, lived up to their advance notices last Friday when Genesee traveled down in the valley for their toughest match to date.

After trailing part of the first half, the Bulldogs, lead by Junior Guard Bill Schlueter, finally caught up with the Kubs in the third period and went ahead 43-42. After catching the Kubs, Genesee moved out to a substantial lead and held it throughout the final quarter.

Mike Eiland pumped in 18 points for the Bulldogs and Schlueter had 14. John Hermann added 13 more points.

The Genesee J. V. squad took the preliminary game 49-35.

Bulldogs Roll
After the tough contest with Kamiah the previous night, Genesee came home and rolled to an easy 81-41 victory over Prairie, Saturday night.

After marking up an early lead, Coach Kanikkeberg used his reserve strength in much of the contest and all players on the Bulldog roster scored. Ron Hopkins was high point man for Genesee with 16 points. Bill Schlueter scored 14, and Alan Odenborg had 13.

Genesee took the JV game 45-36.

First Cold Wave Drops Temps To Near Zero

A sudden cold snap, following on the heels of a windy snow storm sent the mercury plunging downward Monday night and left area residents shivering in the first really cold weather of the current winter season.

Temperatures dipped down to approximately eight above zero in Kendrick and Juliaetta Monday night or early Tuesday morning, and readings of zero to two above were recorded in Genesee and the higher elevations.

Snow and windy weather had prevailed across much of the region over the week-end, but the temperatures stayed in the low twenties. Hard-packed snow made travel conditions very slippery in some sections. Monday snow fell intermittently in Kendrick and Juliaetta, and in the Genesee area strong winds whipped the snow into almost blizzard proportions.

Late Monday evening the storm passed and the skies cleared. With the clear skies the temperatures dropped rapidly and gave the regions the first real taste of winter.

Sky was generally clear Tuesday, but the cold still prevailed and the temperatures never rose above the freezing level.

Coach Wayne Dust had his Kendrick Tigers throw a full court press and a tight man-to-man defense against the visiting Clearwater Valley Rams from Kootenai Saturday night and the Tigers clipped the visitors 63-53 for their first league victory.

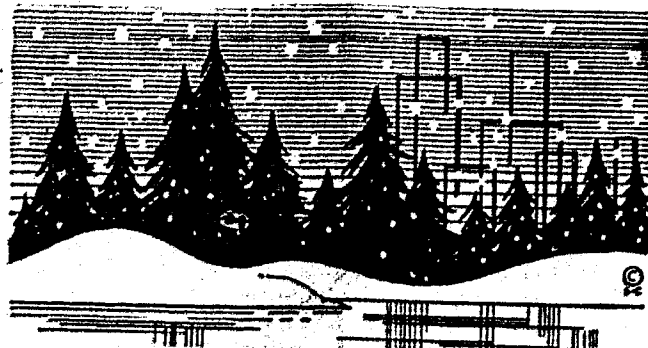

New Audio Visual Aid In Use At Genesee

The Talking Page brings the printed page to life. It is an audio-visual multi-media desk-top learning system designed to involve the learner totally.

The Talking Page plays records, but it does more than talk. It also responds. To use the Talking Page, the student places a Talking Page book on the flat surface of the record into the slot at the rear, and then presses the "close" button. To hear any message on a record side, he moves the pointer handle to any of 33 positions along the

left edge of the Talking Page, and lifts the handle up. This automatically tunes in a message to which the student can listen again and again if he wishes, or he may skip messages at his discretion.

Each page of a Talking Page book is marked by one or more tiny printed boxes at the left edge of the page. If the student moves the pointer to any box on the page, he will hear a message about something he sees on that part of the page. Depending on his task, the student may use the recording as a key to unlock the material he sees on the page, or he may use the page as an index to locate a message he wants to hear on the recording.

How the Talking Page Differs from other Instructional Media

The Talking Page serves as a tutor. The moving pointer helps guide the student through a book while the voice asks about or explains each exercise. In addition, the Talking Page approaches another more subtle function of the tutor: it allows the student to have a hand in structuring his own program.

The Talking Page has infinite patience. If the student desires, the Talking Page will explain the same thing again and again, always in a calm friendly tone. It will help the student correct his fifth error with the same composure as the first. It is entirely his servant and will do his bidding without hesitation.

The REC Reading program material used with the Talking Page is a phonics program with the same goal as most traditional phonics programs.

The Genesee School District purchased two of these machines with materials available for use in grades Kindergarten through Third grade.

Mrs. Heinemeyer, 2nd grade teacher, and Mrs. Gee, 1st grade teacher, are using the machines with their reading program now and are very enthused about the interest of the students so far. We have not had the machines long enough for an evaluation as to the help for the reading program.

We feel that one of the most important aspects of the machine is its principal of individual instruction.

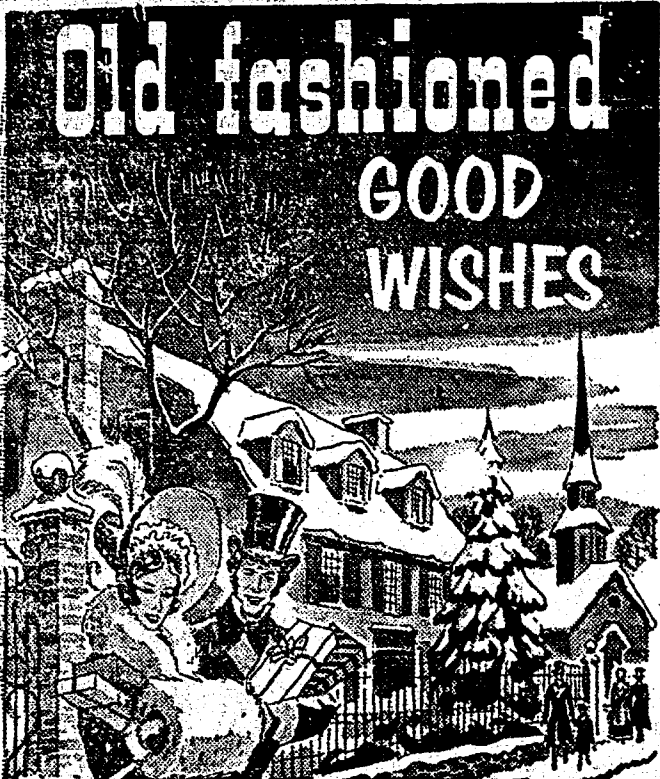

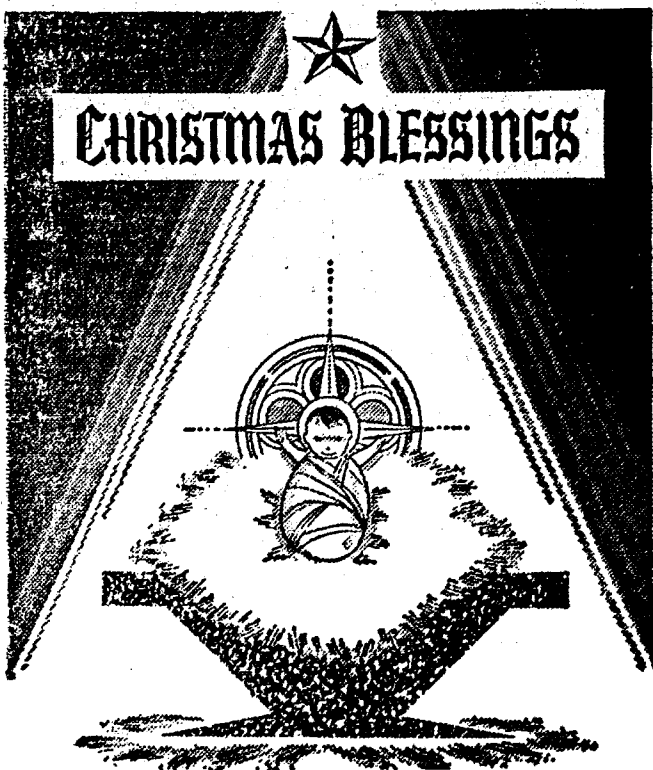

Use Special Caution During Holiday Season

With the holiday entertaining season upon us, the Idaho Department of Health has issued a few special precautions to be taken to prevent illness at this festive season.

In home decorating they urge housewives to be particularly careful to place mistletoe and poinsettias out of the reach of children. The berries, leaves, and flowers are very poisonous and cause serious illness when eaten. The Department of Health also lists some practices the housewife should avoid so family and guests will not get food poisoning and ruin their happy holiday. Things to be avoided in food preparation include: thawing poultry or other frozen meats AT ROOM TEMPERATURE. The number of bacteria on the surface will double every fifteen minutes. Poisons produced by some bacteria are not easily destroyed by cooking. NOT SCRUBBING thoroughly the counter tops or cutting boards where raw poultry or meat has been prepared will leave bacteria which may be transferred back to the cooked meats if you use the same surface to carve.

Pre-stuffing the poultry and allowing it to set at room temperatures for long periods of time; leaving moistened stuffing to set at room temperature; and refrigerating while hot, a pan of food more than four inches deep (so that the middle never gets chilled) are all excellent ways of getting poisoning. Food poisoning may cause mild to severe vomiting, diarrhea or severe abdominal pain. It can be so severe as to require hospitalization. In the very young, the aged or those with a serious disease, it can be fatal.

The Idaho Department of Health wants to emphasize that many cases often termed "intestinal flu" are really food poisoning. If several people become ill with such symptoms after eating together this should be reported to the family physician or local public health officials for investigation. Attempts should be made to determine the cause and source of the probable food poisoning and whether the food responsible may be available to others. Other foods purchased from the same source may also contain bacteria and should be removed from the market to prevent others from becoming ill.

Protection of others is one of the main reasons for reporting any food poisoning even from a meal eaten at a private home.

One further caution to the holiday hostess !!! DO NOT LEAVE FOOD OUT, after a meal or for a buffet, at room temperature. KEEP IT HOT OR COLD. Don't store leftovers in deep containers, or they may not cool fast enough in the middle. Food should be kept below forty-five degrees or above one hundred and forty degrees if they are not to be served immediately.

Cattlemen Met In Potlatch Tuesday

John Pierce, Malta, president of the Idaho Cattlemen's Association, talked to a joint meeting of the Latah and Benewah County Cattlemen's Association and their wives Tuesday evening. The meeting was held at Carter's in Potlatch, with forty five in attendance.

Pierce said that dollars produced by the cattle industry turn over many times. Cattlemen are aware of conservation needs, range and watershed problems, and know about ecology.

Bob Henderlinder, secretary of the State Association, spoke on the promotion work being done by the cattlemen, cowbelles, Idaho Beef Council and the livestock and meat board. He displayed charts and posters used in the promotion work. Jim Benham, State Brand Inspector, reported on the work, the budget and problems of enforcement in cattle thefts.

John Jacobs, professor and researcher in the department of animal industries, U. of I., was introduced and spoke in meats and meat cuts. Work is continuing on quality, grades, marbling, palatability and how they are related to finish, lean meat, feeding and many other factors.

Gordon Dalley, Latah County Agent, and Harry Judd, Benewah County Agent, assisted the county groups in arranging the program.

The state officers were to visit the animal industries department of the U. of I. on Wednesday to lend support and guidance in new programs there.

SAFE DUCK HUNTING MEANS LEARNING WATER SURVIVAL

Falling into deep water need not end in tragedy for duck hunters or other heavily clothed persons, the Idaho Fish and Game Department said today.

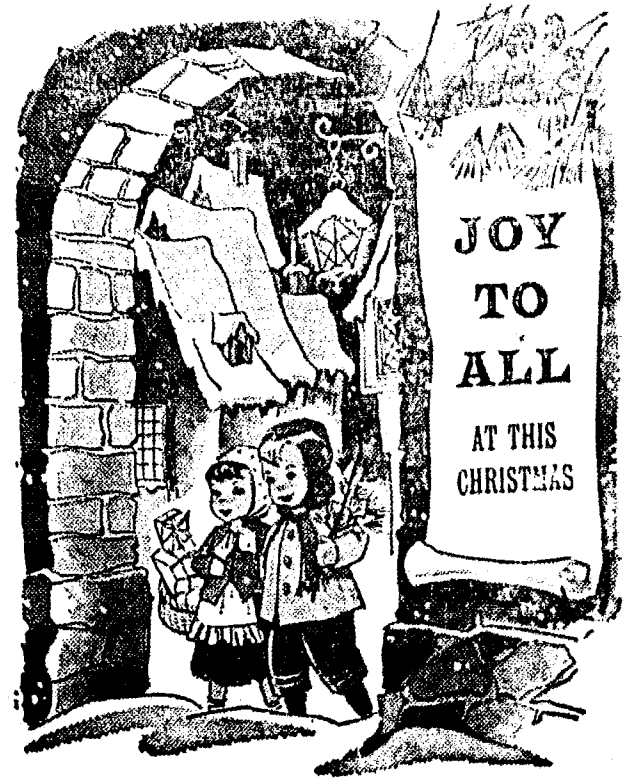
Contrary to popular opinion, clothes do not weigh a person down in water, they trap air. Unless it is lost as the result of thrashing around, the air trapped in clothing is buoyant enough to float a man. Most important of all is that swimming movements be made below the surface without splashing.

Duck season ends January 10, 1971, outside the Columbia Basin Mallard areas of Idaho, with a bag and possession limit of seven ducks.

The season for Idaho counties included in the Columbia Basin Mallard Area runs through January 24, with bag limit of seven and possession limit of 14 ducks.

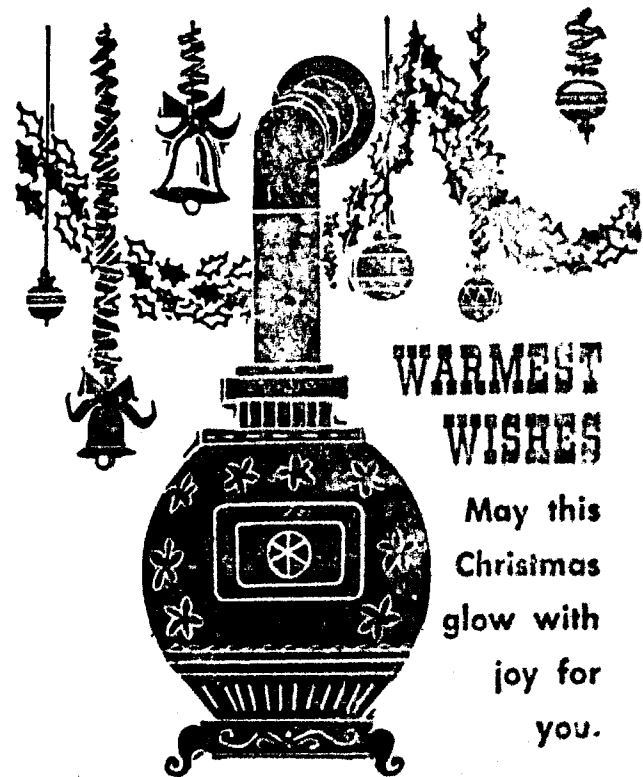
Goose season in 13 eastern Idaho counties ended December 6, 1970. Goose season in all other counties ends January 10, 1971, with bag and possession limits of three geese (not more than one Ross' goose).

Conservation officers have received complaints from farmers regarding hunters who do not obtain possession before entering private lands. Some trespassers even have mistaken domestic mallards and geese for migratory waterfowl. The Fish and Game Department says that domestic mallards are a strain of ducks whose coloration is the same as wild stock, but these birds are heavier and larger.

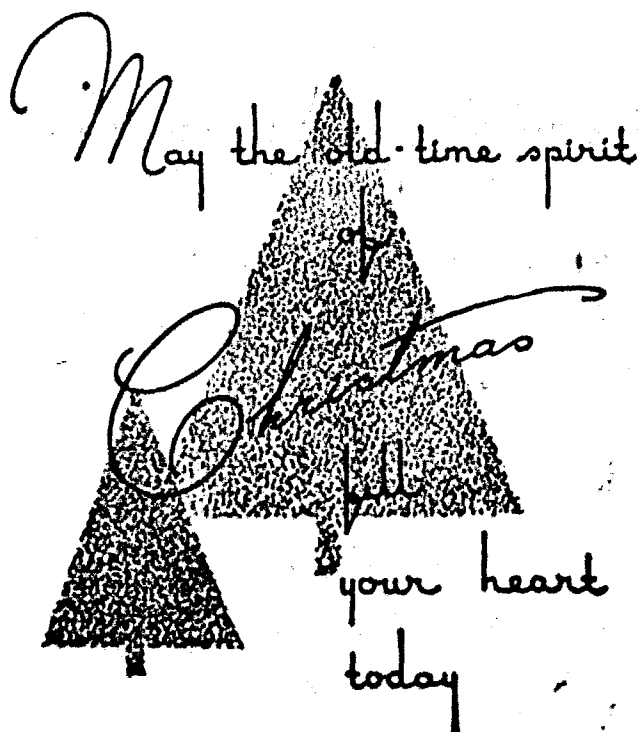

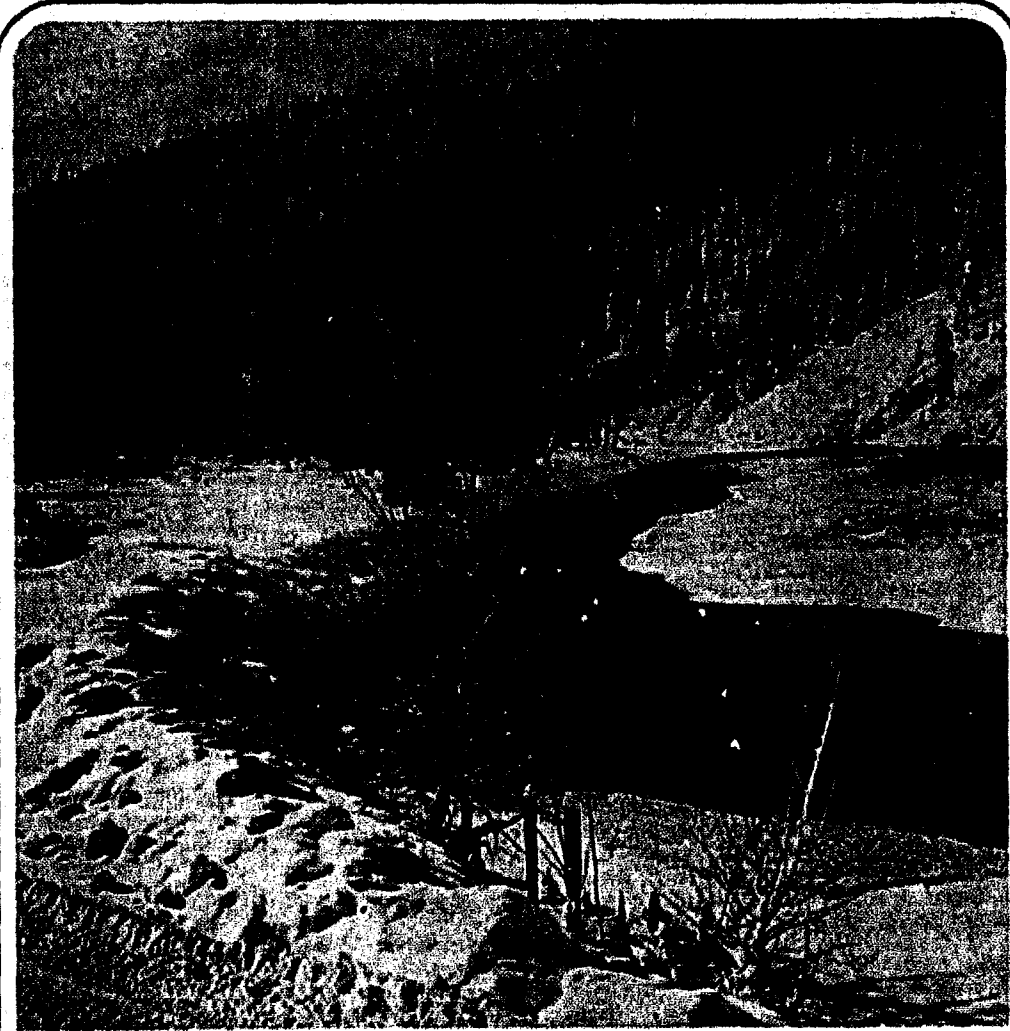

1 cup pecans, finely, chopped

Powdered sugar

Mix ingredients together. Place in a greased casserole. Bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Stir several times. Cool and stir again. Form into 24 small balls and roll in powdered sugar.

GRAHAM CRACKER BARS

1 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup milk
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 cup graham cracker crumbs
1 cup flaked coconut
1 cup nuts, chopped fine
48 graham cracker squares

Boil together 1 minute, the butter, milk, sugar and egg.

Add crumbs, coconut and nuts. Spread the filling, while hot, on 24 graham cracker squares laid flat in a jelly roll pan. Place 24 crackers to cover the mixture.

Frost if you like with powdered sugar frosting. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

SEASONS GREETINGS TO ALL

IMMIGRATION & NATURALIZATION SERVICE LAWS

R. G. Hoffeller of the Immigration & Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are exempted from this requirement: (1) Accredited diplomats; and (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any post office or immigration service office during the month of January.

Mr. Hoffeller said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

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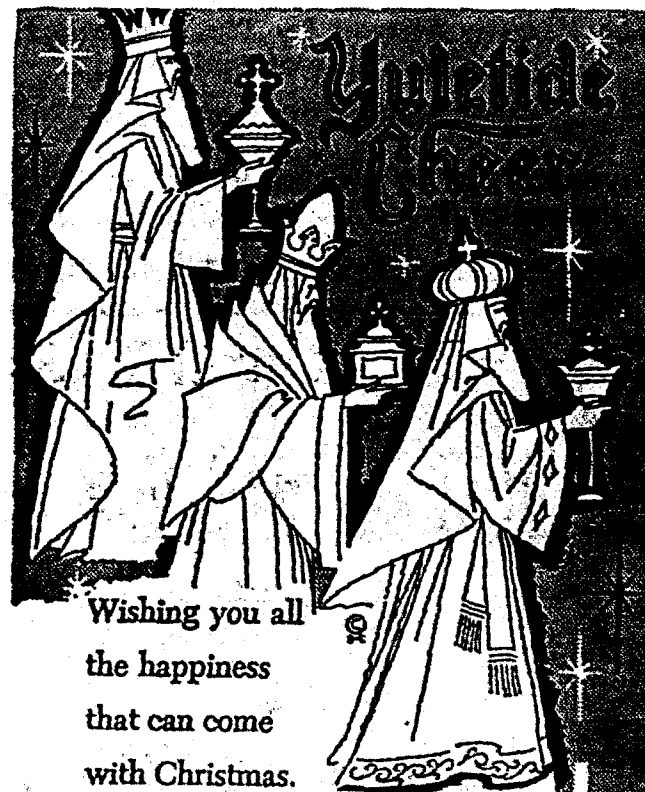
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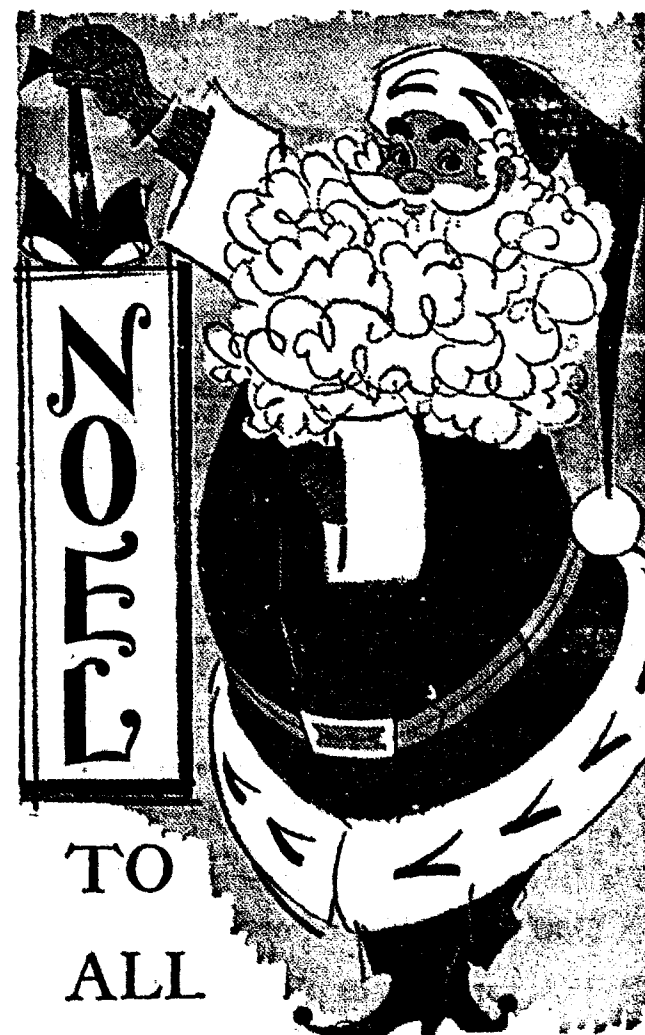

YOU CAN STILL HUNT BIRDS — LEGALLY

Boise — Most chukar, Hungarian partridge and quail hunting ends on December 31, but a longer season on these fine upland game birds species runs through January 24, 1971, in the Snake River drainage from Hells Canyon below Brownlee Dam downstream to, but excluding, Tammany Creek just south of Lewiston. The extended hunt also includes that portion of the Salmon River drainage in the counties of Adams, Custer, Idaho, Lemhi, Lewis, Nez Perce and Valley, but excluding that part of John's Creek above Tolo Lake near Grangeville. Two of these species, the Hungarian and the chukar partridge were introduced as "exotics" to the Idaho scene. Their success in the right kind of habitat has been phenomenal.

Plan 1971 Trips Now

Although this year's hunting and fishing is not over yet, it is not too early to start planning next year's trips into remote back country regions. To get into roadless wilderness areas often requires the service of experienced outfitters and guides. Without their help, much of Idaho is inaccessible to many hunters and fishermen. To obtain the services of outfitters and guides, advance planning is necessary.

As a means of helping sportsmen plan their trips, the Fish and Game department has scheduled permanent opening dates. Information on all hunting and fishing seasons can be obtained from the Idaho Fish and Game Department, P. O. Box 25, Boise, Idaho 83707. The names and addresses of all licensed outfitters and guides can be obtained from the Idaho Outfitters and Guides Board, P. O. Box 95, Boise Idaho 83702.

Bear Lake Cisco Fishing

Idaho's only dip-net fishing season in 1971 will run from January 1 to February 15, 1971. It will be at Bear Lake, which straddles the boundary line separating Idaho and Utah. The quarry will be a small fish species — the Bonneville "peaknose" cisco. The bag limit is 50 fish a day for all licensed fishermen or permit holders. There is a special bag limit of 25 cisco a day for non-license holders under 14 years of age.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS
ON MEDICARE INSURANCE

December 31, 1970, is the deadline for filing Medicare medical insurance claims for services received October 1, 1969, through September 30, 1969, according to D. Gene Shaw, social security district manager in Lewiston, Idaho.

Under the law, Medicare can pay your medical insurance claim only with in a certain time after treatment or other service. If you have Medicare medical insurance and received covered services during the period of October 1, 1968, through September 30, 1969, claims must be filed before the end of the year, Shaw said. After December 31, 1970, Medicare cannot pay on these bills.

Shaw said that a completed "Request for Medicare Payment" form should be sent to the intermediary. If the doctor or supplier does not complete his portion of the form (Part II), an itemized bill or Part II of the claim form must show the date, place, and description of each service and the charge for each service.

Anyone needing claim forms for Medicare medical insurance or related information should call the Lewiston Social Security Office. The telephone number is 746-2333.

Medicare medical insurance is the voluntary part of Medicare. It is available to almost everyone 65 or older and helps pay for doctor's services and certain other health care services. Financed by individual premiums and matching Government Bonds, it pays 80 percent of reasonable charges above the \$50 annual deductible for covered medical services.

Medicare hospital insurance, funded through employee and employer contributions to social security during a person's working years requires no premium payments. It helps pay for hospital care and for related health services for people 65 and over.

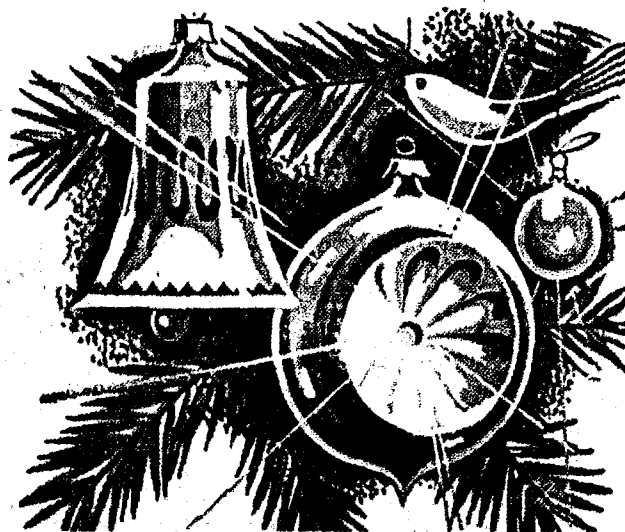

UNEMPLOYMENT CONTINUES TO RISE IN LATAH COUNTY

Moscow — Unemployment in Latah county continues to rise, as 60 workers filed new claims for jobless pay during the past week. Frank J. Harstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment reported that this figure compares with 54 workers filing new claims during the previous week, and only 32 during the same week one year ago.

Harstein said the total number of idled workers now seeking unemployment insurance rose to 345, compared with only 160 at this same time in 1969. In the immediate Moscow area the total is now 146, last week it was 130, and a year ago only 72.

In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the figures are 102 now, 107 last week and 43 last year. In Potlatch the totals are 54, 50 and 16, and at Elk River 12, 10 and 6. Many of the new claims were filed by workers who were laid off from the lumber industry and from the construction industry in the area. Some of the other workers claiming benefits were persons who have recently moved into the area for various reasons.

Job activities remained about normal for the year, with the local employment office placing six workers on jobs during the week. During the previous week seven workers were given help finding jobs, and the same number were assisted during the same week a year ago. At the end of the week there were still 12 jobs open. Included were jobs for a general office clerk, a secretary, cooks, waitresses and domestic workers.

Buckle up when you start out, and don't mix drinking with driving — advises the State Patrol.

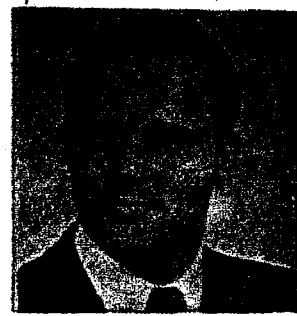
