





IMMIGRATION & NATURALIZATION SERVICE LAWS

R. G. Hoffeller of the Immigration & Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to

report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future. All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited diplomats; and (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any post office or immigration service office during the

month of January.

Mr. Hoffelier said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.
