Uniontown Bank Robbed Of \$5,000 December 24

Law enforcement agencies are still without any substantial clues to the identity of the lone bandit who robbed the Farmers State Bank at Uniontown, Wash., of \$5,000 last Thursday afternoon, Dec. 24th. The search area, which originally encompassed just the immediate area, was later enlarged to include most of the western states.

The robber, described by bank manager R. L. (Dick) Goedde, as being about 33, 5 feet, 11 inches tall, with a dark complexion and brown hair, entered the bank shortly before noon with a drawn revolver, and after locking the door behind him, bound up the manager and Mrs. Marilyn Hatley, a teller, with rope and put them in a back room, then looted the money from a vault and the teller's cage.

Goedde said the man apparently knew the bank's operation because he staged the robbery at a time when the bank is normally closed for a one-hour lunch period.

Goedde stated the man spoke to him and his teller in a calm, even voice and told them "no one would be hurt if they didn't try anything."

Dick said the man wore a blue denim jumper with a brown lining, blue denim trousers and brown boots. He left the bank through the rear door and escaped in a car, believed to be blue in color and possibly containing a woman passenger.

Goedde struggled free of his bonds shortly after the bandit fled, and summoned law enforcement officers. Road blocks were quickly thrown up in the area but later withdrawn when it became apparent the robber had eluded the first circle.

Poor Weather Makes Travel Difficult

A combination of snow and ice made travel over much of the region both difficult and hazardous these past seven days, and there were reports of numerous minor traffic accidents because of the slick roads.

Last Wednesday afternoon a moderate, wet snow storm, falling on hard-packed snow and ice and then freezing temperatures adding to the trouble, gave motorists their worst travel conditions of the year. The highway between Kendrick and Juliaetta, and even into Lewiston, were icy and extremely slick. The fresh, slushy snow on top of the ice was a matter of real concern in Kendrick and Juliaetta, and some of the side streets were virtually impassable, if they were on an incline.

The remainder of the week and the week-end saw light snow fall on several occasions and the temperatures stayed well below the freezing mark.

Snow fell again Monday evening and then turned to rain as the mercury rose above the freezing mark. The temperatures dropped again early Tuesday morning and motorists driving to work Tuesday faced slick, icy highways over most of the region.

Despite all the discomforts the poor weather brought, the only consolation was the fact that December 25 brought a beautiful White Christmas with several inches of snow on the ground, and even some sunshine on Christmas Day.

Juliaetta Bridge Construction Is Ahead of Schedule

Work on the construction of a new bridge to span the Potlatch River east of Juliaetta is progressing very smoothly and, in fact, is running ahead of schedule, reports Lloyd Craig, foreman of the work crew from the Nezperce Highway District who are constructing the bridge.

The approaches to the bridge on both sides of the river are complete and the footings for the bridge are in place. The steel spans have now arrived and will be placed across the water shortly after the first of the year, Craig said.

Craig said he expects to have the work completed within two weeks, when his men begin setting up the steel. This should put them finished about two weeks ahead of the February 1st deadline.

The bridge will have an asphalt surface on the steel deck. The approaches and the railroad crossing will also be surfaced with asphalt, but this will have to wait until spring.

Craig said that during the period of construction when there was earth moving done, there were approximately 15 to 18 men employed on the project, which is a joint effort of the Nezperce County Highway Department and the Genesee Rimrock Highway District.

One of the most imposing sights at the new bridge is the huge cut on the other side of the river, allowing for the new approach. This cut is 74 feet at its highest point.

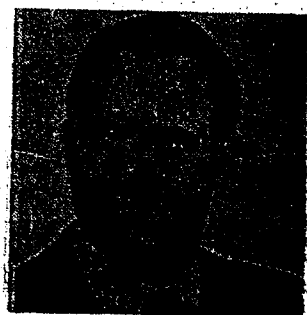
**PART-TIME JOBS MIGHT
EFFECT SOCIAL SECURITY**

Of the approximately 3,900,000 children and students receiving social security benefits, many will take jobs during the holidays. The amount and duration of their earnings can have an important effect on their benefits, D. Gene Shaw, Social Security District Manager in Lewiston pointed out.

The two rules to recognize are these:

1. If total earnings for the year—part-time seasonal as well as a job from last summer—are more than \$1,680, benefits for the year are reduced.

2. Regardless of total earnings,

"Teleservice!"

To Mrs. Edmonson, Mrs. Frost and Mrs. Peterson, it's not only a new word, but a new and better way to do their job at the social security office.

With Teleservice, a person can apply for social security benefits by phone, without taking a step outside his home of office.

The new system saves time for people filing applications.

The personnel in the Lewiston office are sold on Teleservice. "When an applicant calls first, we can tell him what proofs he will need to support his claim and anticipate any problems," they reported.

"In most cases, all the information needed for the application can be taken down during the telephone conversation. Then we send the application to the claimant. He signs it, attaches any necessary proofs, and returns it to us by mail. There are fewer delays in processing the claim, and the claimant usually gets his first check sooner."

however, you can receive the full benefit in any month in which you earn no more than \$140.

As a practical matter, there is unlikely to be a large reduction in benefits to students with part-time jobs during the holidays and summer jobs. Even if total earnings exceed \$1,680, benefits are cut by only \$1 for every \$2 of earnings between \$1,680 and \$2,880. Only for earnings above \$2,880 are benefits reduced on a dollar-for-dollar basis. And since there's no reduction in benefits for any month in which earnings are \$140 or less, workers in holiday and summer jobs will probably get full benefits for most months of the year.

What should a student do who finds that his earnings are likely to top \$1,680 for the year? He should get in touch with the Lewiston Social Security Office and get a form to report his expected earnings. Benefits will be reduced for the short period that his earnings are relatively high.

If he fails to do this, he will have to make an adjustment after the end of the year. And this could turn out to be more of a hardship to the student than keeping earnings and benefits in proper balance as he works.

**CHANGES MADE IN TAX
IMPORTANT TO FARMERS**

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 contains nine provisions that are important to Idaho farmers, according to Bob Sargent, extension agricultural economist, University of Idaho. Many of these provisions are changes that go into effect this year.

One change puts livestock on the same tax base as other property used in business. For depreciation taken after 1969, the income gain on sales of livestock bought for draft, breeding, sporting or dairy purposes is treated as ordinary income, rather than as capital gain, up to the full value of previous depreciation deductions. Depreciation is normally recaptured at time of sale.

A second change concerns livestock and capital gains. Cattle and horses bought after December 31, 1969, and used for draft, breeding, sporting or dairy purposes must be kept two years before they can qualify for capital-gains treatment. The holding period for other livestock is still one year.

The 1969 law eliminates taxation of insurance money paid for crop damage or loss by allowing farmers to report indemnities the year after the loss. They must establish that under their usual practice, income from the damaged or destroyed crops would have been reported in the year after the year of the loss.

Other revisions concern limitation of farm losses, hobby losses, tax-free expenses, and extension of the date for filing tax returns by farmers who do not file tax estimations.

The Internal Revenue Service or your tax accountant can provide more details. Sargent suggests that your county extension agent can help with farm management information.

**PLAN NOW FOR SPRING
PLANTINGS OF TREES**

U. of I., Moscow — The forest nursery at the University of Idaho has a substantial supply of tree seedlings for farm lands. Winter is a good time to get ready for the spring planting, says Vernon Burlison, extension forester. Order blanks and planting tips are available from the county agricultural agent.

The nursery has evergreens, deciduous trees and deciduous shrubs for sale, most of them at a few cents each. They are for windbreaks, woodlots and Christmas tree plantings. The only restrictions are that they cannot be planted inside city limits, used for ornamental purposes or resold with the roots attached.

Most abundant in the seedling supply are 177,000 Scotch pine. The nursery has 151,000 ponderosa pine and 100,000 Douglas fir. Other evergreens include blue spruce, Norway spruce, Austrian pine, lodgepole pine, grand fir, Rocky Mountain juniper, Oriental arbovitae and Virginia juniper.

The deciduous trees are hybrid poplar, golden willow, black locust, Russian poplar, Siberian elm, green ash, Russian olive and honey locust. There are several kinds of deciduous shrubs such as Siberian pea, Japanese barberry, lilac, honeysuckle, cotoneaster and chokecherry.

Oriental arbovitae does best in the southwestern counties, Burlison said. In that area it can be used as windbreaks in place of juniper.

Russian poplar is a fast growing, narrow crowned tree that grows well in southwestern and Magic Valley counties. It is generally more suitable for a woodlot tree and for a tall, single row along a field than as a windbreak. Siberian pea, honeysuckle and lilac are the main shrubs for the outside rows in windbreaks.

Rugosa rose is a new species for the nursery. Burlison said that judging from its growth habit and site requirements it should be a more suitable plant than multiflora rose.

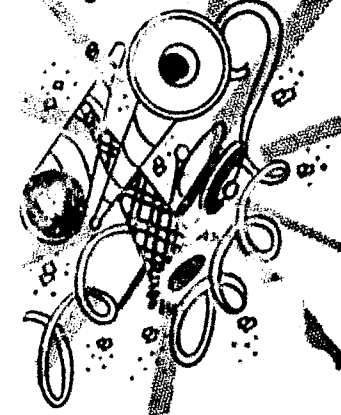

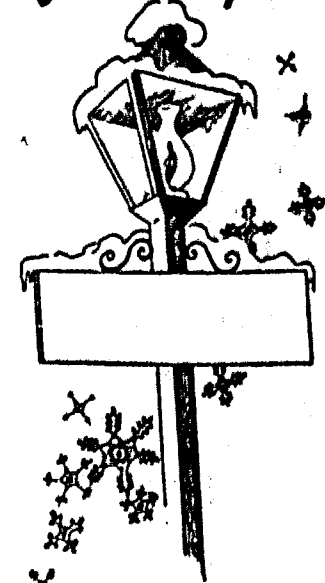

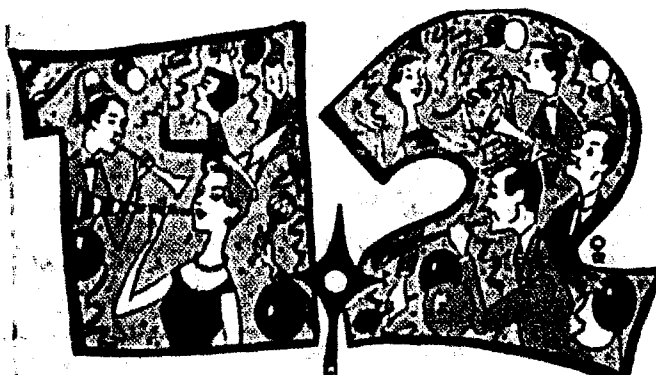

Most chukar, Hungarian partridge,
and quail hunting ends December 31 but
a longer season on these fine upland
game bird species runs through Janu-
ary 24, 1971, in the Snake River drain-
age from Hells Canyon below Brownlee
Dam downstream to, but excluding,
Tammany Creek just south of Lewiston.
The extended hunt also includes that
portion of the Salmon River drainage
in the counties of Adams, Custer, Idaho,
Lemhi, Lewis, Nez Perce and Valley,
but excluding that part of John's Creek
above Tolo Lake near Grangeville. Two
of these species, the Hungarian and
the chukar partridge, were introduced
as exotics to the Idaho scene. Their
success in the right kind of habitat has
been phenomenal.

Bear Lake Cisco Fishing
Idaho's only dip net fishing season in
1971 will run from January 1 to Febru-
ary 15, 1971. It will be at Bear Lake
which straddles the boundary line sep-
arating Idaho and Utah. The quarry
will be a small fish species—the Bonne-
ville or peaknose cisco. The bag limit
is 50 fish a day for all licensed fisher-
men or permit holders. There is a
special bag limit of 25 cisco a day for
non-license holders under 14 years of
age.

ODD AND INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT BEAVER

Boise — Beaver pelts these days
are worth less than the price of lynx
and bobcat. Gone are the days when
mountain men traded pelts for guns,
horses, food, squaws and tobacco.
The lure of beaver and other val-
uable fur-bearing animals brought ex-
plorers, trappers and settlers deep
into all parts of the Inter-Mountain
West 130 to 150 years ago. Giant
companies and trading posts were
founded.

But the value of beaver never has
been pegged exclusively to the price
of pelts, whether high or low. North
America's largest rodent with three-
inch fast-growing teeth and a pad-
dle-shaped tail owes his chief claim
to fame on the fact that he builds
dams of greater value than man's.
Man's dams are built to boost his
economy, but adverse side effects
sometimes include flooding already
productive crop lands along rich river
bottoms; blocking fish passage for
spawning; upsetting aquatic food
chains in reservoirs and downstream;
increasing water temperatures and
incidence of fish diseases; and chang-
ing recreational and aesthetic values
of free-flowing streams.

Beaver dams, on the other hand,
check soil erosion, reduce flood dam-
age, store water, sustain stream flow,
create better fishing, and generally
improve the ecology for a host of
other creatures. Such dams cause
streams to slow down, dropping silt
and eventually filling up impound-
ments behind them. In time this
creates lush, fertile meadows for the
other wildlife species.

Beaver dams prevent floods by
trapping water in headwater streams,
preventing it from gaining the mo-
mentum that causes destruction. It
is far more efficient to dam the
smaller tributaries of a stream than to
dam the main stream. Beaver do
this job better — and far cheaper —
than man.

Beaver ponds also force water to
go underground, thus helping to raise
low water tables of arid lands. They
serve as watering places for many
species of wildlife, from birds to big
game animals. Sub-irrigation pro-
duces lush forage and browse, and
trout often become "lunkers" in beaver
ponds.

Beaver management objectives
have evolved over a half-century as
follows:

- (1) To keep populations at a low
level in agricultural areas.
- (2) To remove surplus animals in
the higher, forested watersheds to
prevent depletion of the food supply
and consequent downstream migra-
tion into complaint areas.
- (3) To transplant beaver to suit-
able drainages that are not already
populated.

The world market for beaver and
most other furs broke many years
ago. Beaver pelts dropped from an
average price of \$30.00 each in 1947-
48 to \$12.00 in 1969-70.

Complete protection is not the
answer to good beaver management.
It defeats its own purpose. Let
alone, beaver soon reach population
levels that are maximum for the
habitat. Too many beaver in a col-
ony eat out the food supply and the
beavers leave.

Aspen, for example, is preferred
food but is relatively intolerant to
heavy use. Aspen stands can be de-
pleted or destroyed by beaver, which
compounds the habitat problem. In
recent years over-crowding in the
hills has caused hundreds of beaver
to move down into the "wrong places"
— more than the conservation of-
ficers can handle while fulfilling other
duties.

There are many "right places" for
beaver in Idaho. Numerous moun-
tain meadows can be found that are
just right.
Many beaver ponds are supporting
good populations of trout in areas
where no other fishing is found. And
many a camping trip has been en-
riched by an opportunity to watch a
family of beaver at work and play
in the cool of a summer evening.

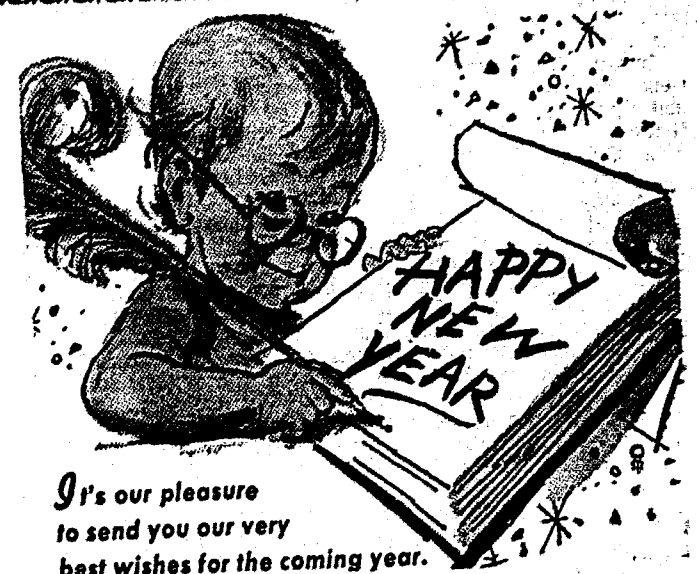

Our recipes this week will give you some ideas on just what to serve for that New Years Eve and New Years day dinner. Mrs. Ray Qualey is our cook this week and we know how much you will appreciate her recipes, and will use them many times through the year.

STEW STROGANOFF:

Brown in a large heavy dutch oven:

2 lbs stew meat, lean
Add: 1 large onion, chopped
1 clove garlic, chopped
1/3 cup celery leaves
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can tomato soup
3 beef bouillon cubes
Salt and pepper to taste
dash, thyme, parsley
Cover the above with water and let simmer for 2 or 3 hours or until the meat is tender.

Then Add:
4 large potatoes
6 large carrots, cut diagonally
4 stalks celery, cut diagonally
1 pkg. small frozen onion, (optional)
1 pkg. frozen peas
Cook just until the carrots and potatoes are tender; if cooked too long the potatoes get mushy. Thicken with a flour-water paste. Then add: 1/2 pint sour cream. Heat but do not boil as the cream will get curdly. Serves 6-10. A good "go-with" is

CORN STICKS

Mix Together:

2 cups biscuit mix
8-oz can cream style corn
1/4 cup grated onion
Roll out on a floured board and cut into sticks about 3" x 1 1/2" and roll in 4 tablespoons butter that has been melted in a 13x9 cake pan. Place sticks side by side in pan after rolling in butter and bake at 450 degree for 10-15 min.

WILDLIFE VIEWPOINT

Steelhead are in serious trouble in Idaho because of the accumulative effects of downstream dams. It was estimated that we lost 50-60 percent of the small steelhead migrating to the ocean this last spring. Most of this loss was caused by nitrogen gas bubble disease. This excessive nitrogen gas in the water is caused by water spilling over the spillways and trapping free nitrogen gas under pressure from the air. It is also aggravated by the additional nitrogen in our waters, caused by water pollution from various sources.

This nitrogen gas is absorbed through the gills of a fish, expands in their blood and often kills them. Other symptoms are breaks in the slime layer of the fish which acts as the protective coating from infection. This is caused by the bubbles breaking through the surface from inside the fish. Quite often this shows up as fungus (white areas) around the head and along the back. The pressure from inside can also pop their eyeballs out and blind them.

Idaho cannot afford a serious loss like we had last spring for any length of time. Since steelhead are on a 4 to 5-year life cycle, we could end up with the eventual elimination of the runs within that period if some corrective measures are not instituted quickly. It appears there are solutions to these problems if we apply sufficient knowledge and money for research and construction.

What are some of the management programs we can apply? Present plans call for the National Marine Fisheries Service (formerly U. S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries) to construct a pilot project on Little Goose Dam of trapping facilities to collect downstream migrant chinook salmon and some steelhead for truck transportation directly to the ocean. They have \$544,000 to complete this program and the contracts have already been let for their completion prior to the spring of 1971. These screens, consisting of endless belts revolving on drums, would divert the fish away from the turbine inlets and into the gate wells of the dam where they would be collected. The screens will be constructed on the 3 inlets to one turbine at Little Goose Dam. The spillway and the 6 inlets to the other two turbines will remain open most of the time. However, research personnel may close off these two turbines and leave only the screened one available to determine just how many fish they can trap with such a setup.

Experiments at Ice Harbor Dam in 1968 showed that chinook salmon smolts (the little downstream migrants) that were trapped at Ice Harbor and transported to the ocean below Bonneville Dam returned in about twice the numbers as those having to go over the dams downstream. The steelhead that were trapped in a similar manner and taken below John Day Dam returned at the rate of about 1.7 to 1. Both of these experiments showed that dams were causing a significant loss downstream and that transportation by truck reduced these losses. It also indicated these fish would return to their freshwater spawning areas even if their migration was interrupted at some point on their downstream migration.

In all these experiments, chinook salmon smolts were much easier to capture than steelhead. So the facilities being installed at Little Goose Dam may not be very effective for steelhead. Fishery biologists hope to trap about 20 percent of the chinook salmon smolts passing the dam. They will mark 100,000 of the trapped chinook and the same amount of steelhead by freeze branding so they can estimate the success of their program in 2 to 3 years hence.

The preceding discussion has covered a possible short-term solution to our problems. What are some of the long-term solutions? Proper construction of future spillways and modification of existing ones could reduce the nitrogen gas since it is the actual spilling that causes the problem. The water passing through the turbines does not create nitrogen problems because the water is taken below the surface and does not have direct contact with the free nitrogen in the air. Installation of all the generators at downstream dams would reduce the amount of water going over spillways. These generators would have to be screened and the fish diverted to the ice and trash sluiceway to allow them passage around a dam without going through a turbine. Turbine losses in past years have almost been as bad as nitrogen gas bubble disease. It is very important to operate the fish ladders properly to allow the returning adults to find them quickly and have a minimum of delay. The Idaho Fish and Game Department will continue to carry on a program to bolster runs by construction of spawning channels and planting of eggs. These will help to offset some of the losses during the critical next few years.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department feels there should be no new dams constructed in this area because they would only serve to increase these problems. They have indicated the proposed High Mountain Sheep, Asotin, and Lenore Dams are in this category.

WINTER CHUKAR HUNTING

Although this year's hunting and fishing is not over yet, it is not too early to start planning next year's trips into remote back country regions. To get into roadless wilderness areas often requires the services of experienced out fitters and guides. Without their help much of Idaho is inaccessible to many hunters and fishermen. To obtain the services of outfitters, advance planning is necessary.

As a means of helping sportsmen plan their trips, the Fish and Game Department has scheduled permanent opening dates. Information on all hunting and fishing seasons can be obtained from the Idaho Fish and Game Department, P. O. Box 25, Boise, Idaho 83707.
