#### Latah Museum Society Explores Potlatch Branch

Holding their February monthly meeting at City Hall, Potlatch, trustees of the Latah County Museum Society met with Mayor Paul Tobin and other Potlatch residents at 10:00 a. m. Saturday, February 16 to discuss possibilities of starting a local museum there. Mayor Tobin offered free use of a room in the city building, which would have the advantage of free heat and lights as well as the regular presence of city employees in adjoining rooms to admit visitors. Mrs. Clara Graham offered free use of space in the former city gymnasium now only partially occupied as living quarters.

Earlier hopes that the Washington, Idaho & Montana Railway depot, first structure erected in the town, might be renovated for museum use were discouraged by the Milwaukee Land Company present owners, according to Neal McKellips local manager. The company has found it can build a new depot at less cost, so proposes to do this and demolish the old one. The company would be willing to sell the old depot for \$1.00 on condition it be moved off railway land, McKellips reported, but there was agreement that a large two-story vault in the middle of the structure makes moving impractical.

The Potlatch area has an unusually rich heritage of pioneer logging and lumbering lore, those present agreed. When built, the original Potlatch mill was the largest white pine plant in the world. The giant steam engine fueled with mill waste was famous for its 4-foot-wide leather belt, said to require the prime back sections of 1,800 steer hides. Excess steam heated the public buildings in town. The gymnasium was so skillfully and strongly built that its 60x60 foot main ceiling still shows no discernible sag, though entirely supported by wooden trusses. Although a "mill town" all built and owned by the company, Potlatch was considered a model of community neatness and convenience that made up for lack of individuality. This very character is seen now as one aspect which well might be preserved for posterity, although the homes long have been privately owned.

The idea of a branch at Potlatch is part of the Museum Society's plan to encourage similar local centers in each principal community of the County. Dr. Ray Berry, president explained. Each community has special objects, structures, or historic sites of special interest which cannot be moved elsewhere even though they may have much more than local interest. These call for local exhibits, and for local chapters of the County Museum Society to take the initiative in promoting them. The April meeting of the Museum Society trustees will be held in Kendrick to explore local museum center possibilities there and in Juliaetta, Berry stated.

County Commissioners Gerald Ingle and Wm. Jones, attending the meeting, noted that the County's authorization to allocate up to \$8,000 a year for county museum needs would be a possible source of funding help for such local centers. Larry French, Director of the County Museum in the McConnell Mansion, Moscow, offered technical assistance from that source for properly documenting and displaying donated objects.

### CRICAP GUIDELINE

CRICAP, the new Carpet and Rug Industry Consumer Action Panel, has developed a series of guidelines designed to aid you as a consumer in obtaining the maximum use-life and satisfaction from your carpets and rugs, advises Wilma Shryack, home furnishings specialist, U. of I. cooperative extension service.

The panel makes these recommendations:

1. Make certain you obtain the proper carpet or rug to fit your specific situation.
  2. Acquaint yourself with the basic characteristics of fibers, color and types of construction and application of each to your particular needs.
  3. Expect some changes in the physical appearance of your carpet or rug.
  4. Vacuum and maintain your carpet and rugs on a regular schedule as required by use and soil conditions. Remove spots and stains immediately.
  5. Maintain a file of all information, sales receipts and product literature for reference. CRICAP advises consumers, when complaints occur, to first present the details to the manager of the retail firm where the purchase was made. Then, if not completely satisfied, write the manufacturer.
- Only after the retail firm and manufacturer have had an opportunity to resolve the problem and the consumer still is dissatisfied, should CRICAP be contacted. CRICAP's address is Box 1568, Dalton, Georgia 30720.

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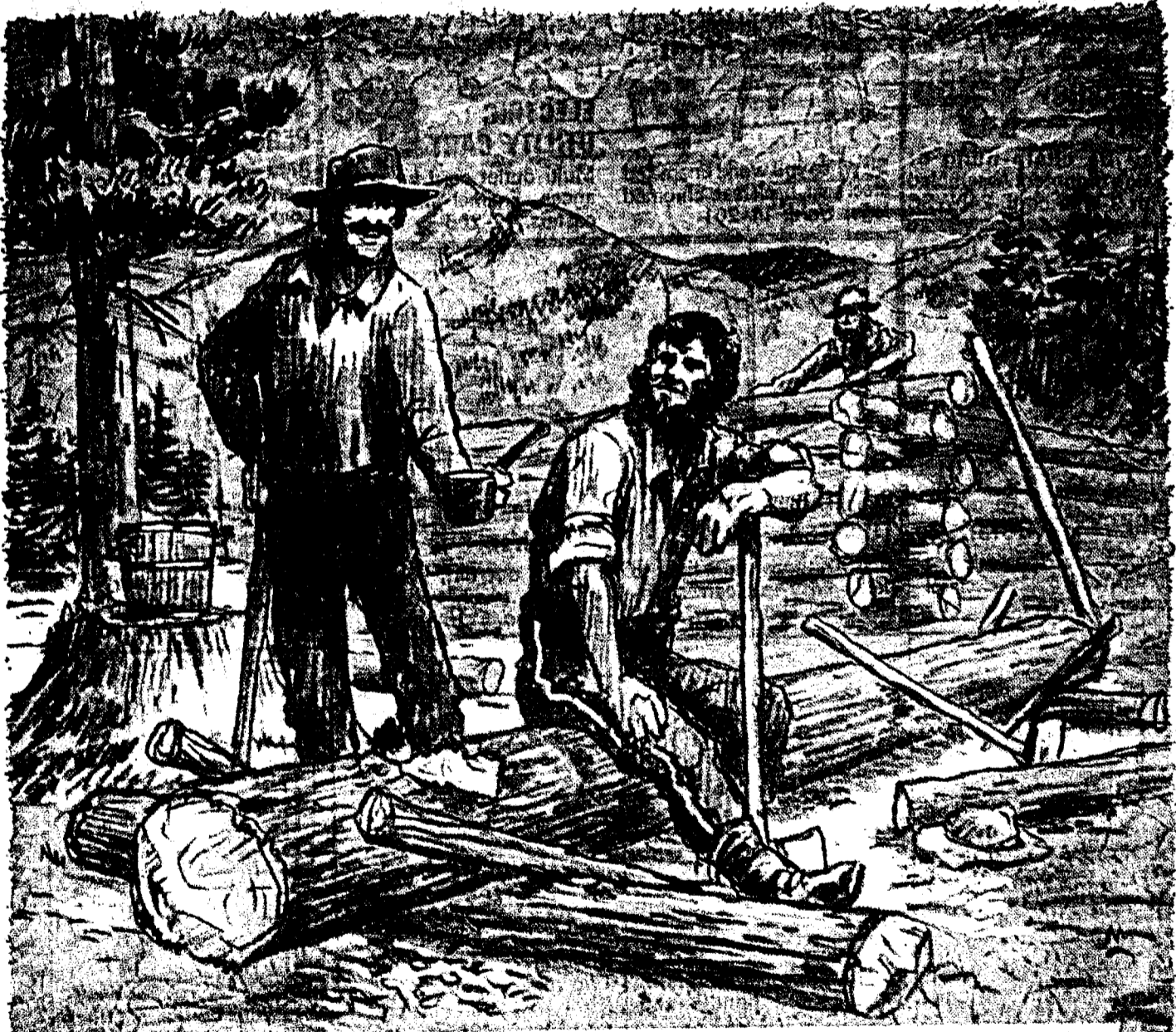

SOY EXTENDERS—WHAT ARE THEY?

Soy extenders (textured vegetable proteins) are available on many grocery shelves today.

Consumers are becoming acquainted with the possibility of using soy extenders instead of bread crumbs or other cereal type foods and eggs to make hamburgers or meat loaves feed more people.

According to Joanne Anderson, Extension Home Economist, U. of I. cooperative extension service, soy extenders help maintain the consistency to the texture of beef. They actually simulate the texture, making it more difficult to determine that the dish has been "extended."

Some markets sell a premixed combination of ground meat and textured vegetable protein. It is quite usual to start with a 30 percent fat content ground beef and add the extender so the resulting product contains from 70 to 80 percent meat and 20 to 30 percent soy protein.

Consumers will have similar percentage composition in their own mixes if they follow directions on the package of the soy extender. In taste tests, 30 percent soy extender to 70 percent meat has been preferred.

Since the extender provides excellent protein content, the mix of the beef with it will provide considerably more protein than when using bread or cracker crumbs.

As yet these extenders do not carry the vitamin or minerals of meat. But neither do the aforementioned "old-fashioned" extenders, says Mrs. Anderson. In time, nutrients will probably be added so as to duplicate the nutrient content of meat.

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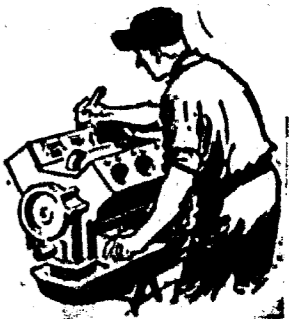

# Job Listings Down In Latah County

Job finding for Latah County residents dropped during the past week according to Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Idaho Department of Employment. He reported that his office received only 4 new job listings during the week compared with 9 during the week before. A year ago the total new jobs received was 3. Only 2 persons were placed on jobs during the week and 12 jobs remained open at the end of the week.

Hartstein explained that workers had been sent to most of the 12 job openings but that employers were still in the process of deciding whom to hire at the end of the week. A year ago there were 11 jobs still open the same as at the end of the previous week.

The number of persons seeking unemployment insurance rose slightly from the previous week, according to Hartstein's figures. He reported that the total for the county now stands at 480, a slight increase from the 463 of last week and also up slightly from the 466 of mid-February 1973. The energy crisis was blamed for at least 6 persons, the weather for some others and a variety of other reasons were given for the rest of the 27 persons who filed new claims for benefits during the week.

The number of persons filing new claims during the previous week was 29, the same as for a year ago. In the immediate Moscow area, the total rose from 253 a week ago to 264 currently and was 243 one year ago.

In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the total now stands at 91, up one from last week, but down from the 116 of a year ago. At Potlatch the total is now 91, an increase of 11 from last week and a rise of 20 from the same time a year ago. At Genesee the totals are 23 now, 25 last week and 15 a year ago. In the Kendrick area the totals are 11, 12, and 16.

4 additional workers filed claims for Disaster Unemployment Assistance through his office Hartstein said, bringing the total to 10 at this time. Some others may be eligible for some benefits, while some of those who have filed claims will no longer be entitled to receive benefits because of changes that have occurred in working conditions throughout the area.
