The collared calves are monitored daily during June, twice a week during July and week-ly after July until the batteries run down and quit.

In addition to radio collaring, the calves, various body measurements and blood samples are taken to determine the physical condition of the calves. During the 1973 calving sea son 13 calves were captured and fitted with radio collars. The collars came off five of the calves, five calives died and three calves were alive when the batteries quit working.

During the 1974 calving season, 27 calves were captured and radio equip ped. To date, 3 calves have lost their collars, 19 have died and five calves are still alive.
