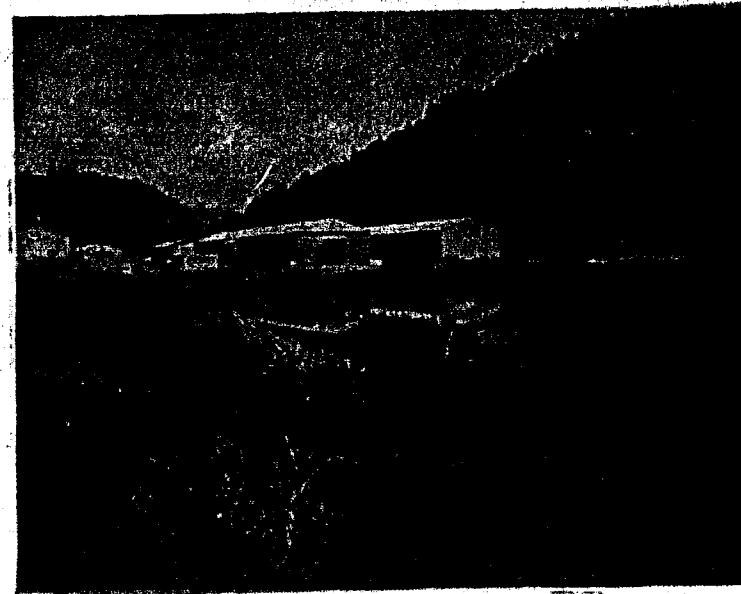


These two photos show the two sewer lagoons of Kendrick now in the process of being re-sealed, following the floods of early this year. In the upper picture the lower lagoon has been almost completely finished and a foot of clay added to the bottom. Water will be transferred from the upper lagoon, lower photo, and when this is dried out, this pond will be re-sealed.



Kendricks two city sewerage lagoons in the west end of town are now in the process of being re-sealed under funds allocated by the Emergency Protection Agency. The seals, that is the ponds' ability to hold water, were damaged in the floods early this year and a grant from this agency is making possible the repair.

The lower lagoon, which was used less frequently, was repaired first. It was cleaned of growth and weeds and then relined with at least one foot of

new clay. This work is now almost complete. When a part for one of the lagoon pumps arrive, the water from the upper pond will be transferred to the re-work pond and the upper lagoon will also be repaired and re-sealed.

The construction work is being done by Lum Farrington and Frank Abrams and the entire project is being coordinated by Jim Armitage of the Latah County Department of General Services.

## Herman V. Johnson, Retired Leland Farmer, Passed August 16

Herman V. Johnson, 65, a well-known and respected member of the Leland community and a retired farmer, passed away at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston Friday morning at 8:45. He had been in ill health for some time and death was attributed to an apparent stroke.

Mr. Johnson's life was one dedicated to Christian service, both to his church and to his fellow man. He was a life member of the Leland Methodist Church and was president of the Potlatch Cemetery District for 10 years, from 1963 to 1973. While serving in this capacity he realized the need and was instrumental in marking all of the unknown graves in the cemetery.

Mr. Johnson had been a member of Kendrick Grange No. 413 for 40 years, five years of which he served as Master.

He was born Nov. 6, 1908, to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Johnson at Leland, where he lived until 1973 when he and his wife moved to Kendrick. He married Mildred Fleishman October 12, 1938 at Colfax, Wash.

Survivors include his widow at the family home, a sister, Mrs. Peth Siderius of Big Fork, Mont.; and two brothers, Carl E. Johnson of Kellogg and William H. Johnson of Mesa, Arizona.

Funeral services were conducted August 19 at 11:00 a.m. from Malcolm's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel with Rev. J. Stanley Lyman officiating.

## Harvest Nears Successful Finish

Without delays from the weather for the second year, the 1974 small grain harvest moved on toward the end this week with almost all of the wheat in from the lower elevations and the Genesee area reporting at least 85 per cent complete.

Forecasters predicted rain and skies threatened several times, but except for a few isolated showers there was no rain during the harvest this year and the result is one of the earlier harvests on record.

Bill Wood, manager of Genesee Union Warehouse Co., reported Tuesday afternoon that he estimated less than 15 per cent of the wheat crop still standing and spring barley was now standing to come in.

Comparing this year's crop with last year's, Wood said the quality was as good or better this year and, of course, with more acreage planted this year, the total tonnage coming into the warehouses would be more.

## Federal Funds Approved For Juliaetta Sewer Project

The City of Juliaetta has received approval from the EPA for Federal funding of the city's sewer project. This is over \$300,000 or 75% of the project's full amount for its treatment plant and the main trunk line.

Senator Frank Church sent Mayor Freeman a mail-o-gram congratulating the city on this funding for its sewage plan.

Another 15% for this part of the project should be funded soon by the state. The remaining 10% will be picked up by the City of Juliaetta; the city will also be responsible to fund the entire collections system.

## Genesee Schools Ready For Sept. 3 Opening; Six New on Staff

Genesee schools are nearing completion of preparations for the opening of the 1974-75 term. The system will have six new staff members for the coming year. Four of these teachers replace teachers who left the district last year and two are additional teachers for this coming year.

At the secondary level, Jr. High will have shop classes added for both 7 and 8 grades. A Career Education course will be offered for the Senior High along with a course in Home Ec for boys.

A learning disabilities class will be added at the elementary level this year. This class will help students who have problems with all subject areas of the school. The student will spend anywhere from 30 minutes to an hour in the class and then be returned to his regular class room. This program is in conjunction with the Special Education requirements of the State. Also the district joined the Northern Idaho Multi-District, so that the district could secure the services of specialized persons for the program, such as a school psychologist, Teacher Consultant and a Speech Therapist.

The district will also run a kindergarten program this year, as a one mile levy was approved by voters this spring for the class dates for start in the program will be later than the regular classes—probably around the 15th of October.

School will start the day after Labor Day—Sept. 3.

The district purchased a new 48-passenger bus from Hebling Bros. for the coming year, but delivery date is unknown at this time. The district plans on having the same drivers as last year. Buses will run the first morning of school and the time will be the same as last year.

During the summer considerable re-modeling and maintenance was completed. The district replaced 6 rooms with new windows, replaced 3 sets of double doors to the building and worked on the heating system. A class room was re-modeled for the Learning Disabilities class and new equipment for the room was purchased.

The office of the Superintendent was moved from the 3rd floor to the 1st floor of the building. The old superintendents office will become the Guidance Counselor's office.

General maintenance was completed on the rest of the buildings during the summer.

### ELK CALVES STUDIED IN CLEARWATER AREA

The survival of calf elk in the Clearwater-Glover Ridge section of the Clearwater River drainage near Lowell has been under investigation since the spring of 1973, according to Lloyd Oldenburg, game research

supervisor for the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

Oldenburg pointed out that the ratio to young animals to female animals (calves per 100 cows) in the winter is used to determine the status of big game herds. In an area where calf elk production and survival are the best, the ratio should be 45-55 calves or more per 100 cows during winter. For the past five year period, the ratio of bulls to cows averaged 28 bulls per 100 cows (more than adequate for breeding purposes).

The percentage of pregnant cows in Unit 12, as determined by examination of reproductive tracts collected during the hunting seasons; and by palpation of trapped elk during the winter and spring is high. However, the calves are not surviving, as indicated by winter calf-cow ratios which range from 23 to 35.

Flights made in August and September revealed that the losses occur early in the calf life. Thus the main emphasis of the study, Oldenburg added is to determine what happens to the calf elk the first three months after it is born.

Oldenburg explained that to study the fate of new born calf elk the calves are captured as soon after birth as possible and fitted with a radio collar. The radios have a special motion device built into them. When the radio is functioning normally, a pulsating signal is emitted. When the radio lays in one position four hours, the signal changes to a continuous tone. The collared calves are monitored daily during June, twice a week during July and weekly after July until the batteries run down and quit.

In addition to radio collaring, the calves, various body measurements and blood samples are taken to determine the physical condition of the calves. During the 1973 calving season 13 calves were captured and fitted with radio collars. The collars came off five of the calves, five calves died and three calves were alive when the batteries quit working.

During the 1974 calving season, 27 calves were captured and radio equipped. To date, 3 calves have lost their collars, 19 have died and five calves are still alive.

Nineteen of 22 mortalities have been due to predation while malnutrition has resulted in the death of 2 calves and 1 died of an umbilical

cord infection.

There have been 11 of the 19 killed by bears, 4 by cougar and 4 by unknown predators.

The game research supervisor said that since only a small number of calves have been radio collared (40), the survival study will be continued at this site one more year and possibly two.

He also stressed that although predation by black bear appears to be the primary cause of calf mortality in the Clearwater-Glover Ridge area, verification must also be made elsewhere to determine how widespread this rate of predation occurs before major changes in elk and bear management can be made.

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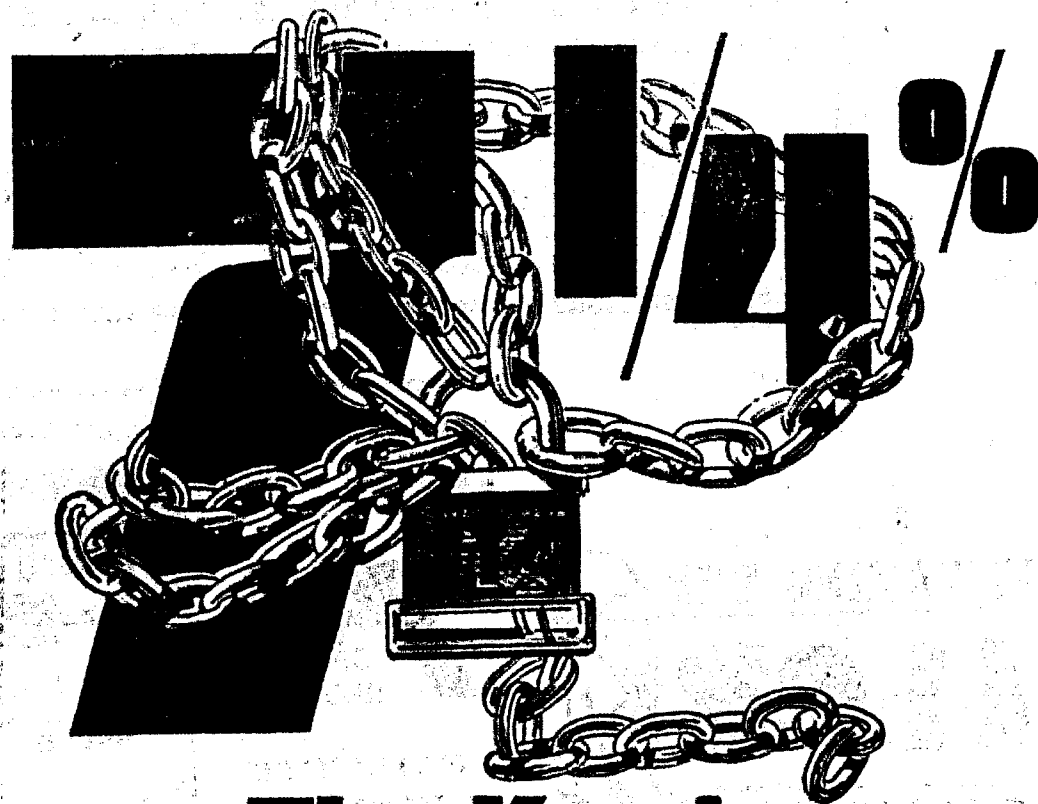

Genesee News 30 Years Ago

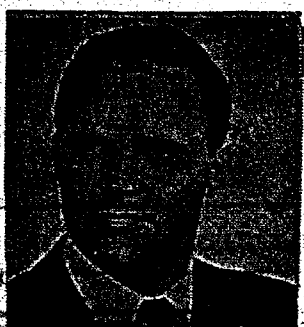
Student nurses Bernice Manderfeld and Mary Emerson of Sacred Heart hospital arrived Thursday for a vacation until Sept. 11.

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### NORTHERN IDAHO MAKE IT YOURSELF WITH WOOL CONTEST

The 1974-75 competition of the Make It Yourself With Wool contest marks its 27th anniversary. It is sponsored in Idaho by the American Wool Council, the Women's Auxiliary to the National Wool Growers Association and the Women's Auxiliary to the Idaho Wool Growers Association.

There are five district MIYWW contests in Idaho. The Junior and Senior winners from each District will compete at the State Competition in Idaho Falls November 18, 1974. The two winners of that competition will represent Idaho at the National MIYWW finals in San Antonio, Texas January 19-21, 1975.

Prizes are awarded at the district, state, and national levels of the contest and include sewing aids, fabrics, yarn, sewing machines, lamb pelts and scholarships and others.

The contest is open for young men and women ages 10 through 21. Jr. contestants ages 14-16 and Sr. contestants ages 17-21 may enter a dress, coat or two-piece suit. Pre-teens ages 10-13 may enter a pair of pants, a skirt, jumper or vest or hand knit or crocheted sweater. There will be competition for pre-teens at the district level only.

The Make It Yourself With Wool Contest is more than a sewing, knitting or crocheting contest. It is also a fashion competition. Judges look for awareness of fashion and style, poise and presentation. Fabric and yarn which meets the wool blend mark standard—70 percent or more wool—30 percent or less other fiber as well as 100 percent wool fabric and yarn will be acceptable in MIYWW program. The fabric or yarn may be American made or imported.

The District V MIYWW contest includes Benewah—Bonner—Boundary—Clearwater—Idaho—Kootenai—Latah—Lewis—Nez Perce and Shoshone counties. The contest date is October 12, 1974 and will be held at the Home Economic building, University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho.

Wrong Class Licenses

The flow of public information about Idaho's different classes of fish and game licenses, both resident and nonresident is being stepped up by the department to reduce the number

of wrong class licenses that are sold each year.

Wrong class licenses are purchased in the fall months to avoid high priced nonresident fees for fishing and hunting privileges or when nonresident hunting licenses are not available because quotas under the new law have been exhausted.

Prevention campaigns are made through individual and group contacts through news media and the distribution of leaflets and posters. Information giving the requirements for state residency is directed at colleges and universities, labor camps, construction projects and other locations involving nonresident groups. Posters in Spanish, as well as English are used at labor camps.

### Dove, Rabbit Seasons

Idaho's dove and rabbit hunting seasons start September 1 statewide. Mourning dove season is September 1-15, with daily bag 10 doves and possession limit 20. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Closing dates for cottontail and pygmy rabbit seasons and fur trapping seasons and regulation details will be set at the special meeting of the Fish and Game Department in Boise August 16.

Other early seasons include archery starting August 31 for deer, elk, black bear, antelope and mountain goat. General hunting seasons begin August 31 for mountain lion and black bear. Controlled hunts open September 1 for big game, sheep, moose

and mountain goat. The special season for chukar partridge in parts of the Middle Fork and main Salmon River canyons is August 1-September 13; and the statewide season for chukar, Huns and grouse starts Sept. 14.
