> The State of Idaho has a majority of rural schools and these schools are required to provide all the services for children with learning handicaps that reside within their districts as a larger school system. The snag comes for rural districts in that funding is so difficult. The rural dis-tricts generally have small budgets due to smaller enrollments making the hiring of individual phychologists, speech therapists and other personnel in specialized fields most difficult. Federal aid also hinders rural districts as aid is contingent on a specific number of students served—a number larger than the total enrollment of some rural school.

It has become a common practice for rural districts to share specialized personnel but the Multi-District takes the situation a step farther with the financial and political stability of a Board of Trustees and the team effort of the four specialists. When a child is referred for testing, all four members of the team cooperate to form a comprehensive, pic-tur of the child so that a specialized program can be formulated for his individual case.



Public Service Employment Program

Providing oppor tunities for per-manent public service jobs for un-employed and underemployed persons is the objective of a program which began operation in the five-county

north central Idaho region August 19. Authorized by Title II of the Comorehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) of 1973, and managed by the Association of Idaho Cities (AIC) the program provides grants to local government units for hiring qualified unemployed persons to fill anticipated vacancies in existent new public serv ce positions, with the understanding that new jobs will eventually be funded by the local governments themselves.

Lynn Hosford, the AIC Manpower Coordinator in charge of the program in Clearwater, Idaho, Latah, Lewis and Nez Perce counties, is working through the Clearwater Economic Development Association office in Moscow, visiting area city and county officials to explain this CETA program. Actual interviewing and hiring is done by the city or county government in association with the local ment in association with the local office of the Department of Employment AIC's involvement includes paying employees salaries and fringe benefits, at least until the end of the present fiscal year.
