





ATTORNEY BENERAL'S STATEMENT OF MEANING AND PURPOSE S.J.R. No. 114

Senate Joint Resolution 114 is a proposed amendment to Atticle VIII of the Constitution of the State of Make, which provides a new section to Article VIII relating to environmental pollution control facilities and tax free county revenue bonds for obtaining such facilities.

The proposed amendment provides that counties may issue revenue bonds upon approval of a majority of elecfors at a special bond election for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, installing, and equipping facilities designed for savironmental pollution control. Such facilities could then be sold, leased, or otherwise disposed of by the county to private persons of odustry. o 🐷

The proposed amendment further provides that such bonds may not be secured by the taxing authority of the State or its political subdivisions. It is letended that the revenue from the rale, lease of other disposal of the facilities will provide the only source of payment of the bonds.

Among the results intended by this amendment is to enable business to obtain anti-pollution equipment at lower cost and in some cases enable some businesses to obtain such equipment which could not otherwise he financed.

Section 1, Article XX of the Constitution of the State of Idaho presently requires the legislature to submit proposed constitutional amendments to the people for ratification at the next general election following the legislative session at which the amendment is proposed, and in connection therewith, to publish said

(1) For at least six consecutive weeks prior to the next general election; and

(2) In not less than one aswapaper of general circulation published in each county in the

The proposed amendment would change the above stated requirements by providing that the legislature publish the text of proposed constitutional amendments, as well as arguments for and against such amends

(1) Three times, rather than 'at least six times" prior to the next general election; and (2) In all newspapers qualified to publish legal notices, rather than "in not less than one newspaper of general circulation published in each county of the state."

Section 60-106, Idaho Code, currently details the qualifications of a newspaper that may publish legal potices in Idaho.
