**UI Commencement
 Saturday, May 14**

Moscow—For the first time, the University of Idaho's traditional Commencement exercise will be held on a Saturday. The ceremony is set for 1:30 p. m. on May 14 at the William H. Kibbie-ASUI Activity Center.

Dr. Ernest W. Hartung, out-going university president, will give the Commencement address, "Crisis 1977, The Threatening Opportunity." Gov. John Evans will also address the graduates.

Among the highlights of the week end will be reunions for the classes of 1927, 1932, and 1937.

Festivities begin on Friday, May 13, with alumni registration from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. in the SUB lobby. During the late afternoon, reunion members will visit at informal gatherings at private homes in Moscow. A reunion dinner honoring the three groups will be held at 6:30 p. m. in the SUB, followed by picture-taking and reminiscing.

Local hosts for the reunion classes are Bela Toth, Spokane for the "Golden I—Class of 1927" and Moscow residents Dr. Malcolm Renfrew, for the Class of 1932 and Katherine

ine Owen, for the Class of 1937.

On Saturday morning (May 14) there will be an alumni board of directors meeting at 8 a. m., a guided campus bus tour leaving at 9 a. m. from the SUB, and the alumni association luncheon and business meeting at 11:30 a. m., also at the SUB.

Following the graduation exercises, all campus visitors are invited to a social hour at St. Augustine's Center beginning at 5:30 p. m. This year, the reception is in honor of President Hartung.

The annual Commencement banquet for all alumni, parents, students, staff and faculty will be at 7 p. m. in the SUB ballroom. Featured will be a baron of beef buffet, entertainment and award presentations. Among those to be honored are the alumni Hall of Fame members, honorary alumni, retiring faculty, intramural athletes of the year and retiring alumni board members. Tickets for the event are \$6 per person and should be purchased in advance from the Alumni Office.

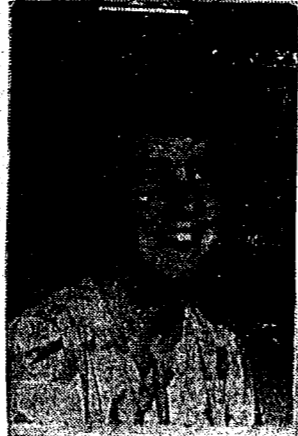

SAVING ELECTRICITY
 Saves water and jobs

Here's how. Most of our electricity comes from the power plants on the rivers. Dams hold back the water which runs the generators to meet power demand. If the demands are reduced, water can be held back. That's why you and everyone else can help by curtailing electric use during this unusually severe dry spell.

WALL INSULATION
 Adequate wall insulation is a big energy saver. Figure three to four inches of insulation in the walls. An insulation contractor can blow loose or foam insulation into enclosed outside walls.

CEILING INSULATION
 You can prevent considerable heat loss by adding six inches or more insulation in the attic. Use batts or loose insulation.

LIGHTS
 Turn off lights and equipment in the study, TV rooms, bedrooms, and work areas when not in use.

DOORS AND WINDOWS
 Install storm doors and windows. Weather stripping can be used to seal the cracks found around doors and windows.

FIREPLACE
 Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fire is out. Don't let precious living room heat escape up the chimney.

THERMOSTATS
 Set the thermostat at 65° During the night turn it down 5° to 10°, as seems most practicable.

HEATING SYSTEM
 Have the furnace and heating system checked annually. Check the furnace filters once a month during the heating season. Clean or replace if necessary.

RANGE
 Don't preheat any longer than necessary. Prepare entire meals in the oven or the broiler, not both. Avoid opening oven door any oftener than needed.

LAUNDRY
 In the laundry room, use only full loads in the washer and dryer. Keep lint filters in the dryer clean. Avoid over drying.

DISHWASHER
 Wash only full loads of dishes. The dishwasher uses hot water so don't use it for just a few dishes at a time.

REFRIGERATOR-FREEZER
 Remove everything necessary for a meal from the refrigerator at one time. Frequent opening of the refrigerator and freezer doors can waste a lot of energy.

BATHROOM
 Cut down your time in the hot shower. Don't let the hot water run while you're shaving or washing hair.

Look at the house diagram and check off the ways your family can help curtail. Saving is good neighborliness. Somebody's job could depend on it. Possibly your own. Cutbacks that might endanger health, safety, or security are not suggested. Just by using common sense, most homes can reach the goal of saving 10 per cent.

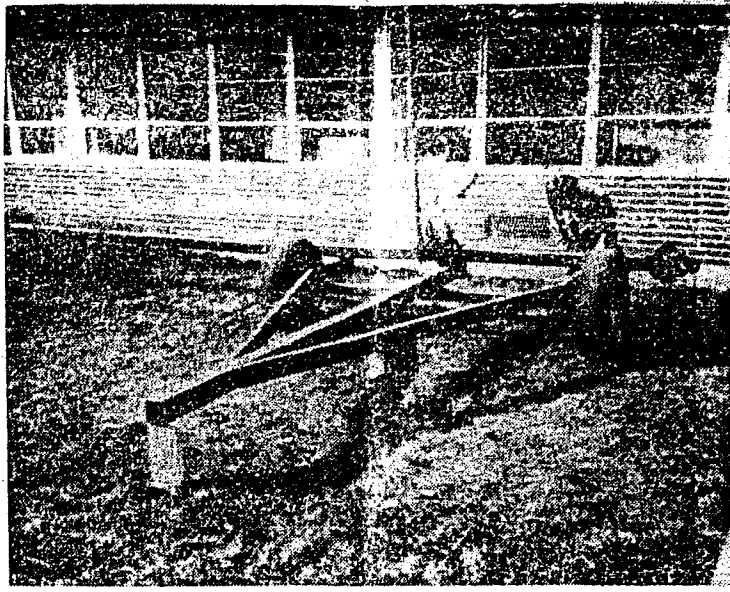

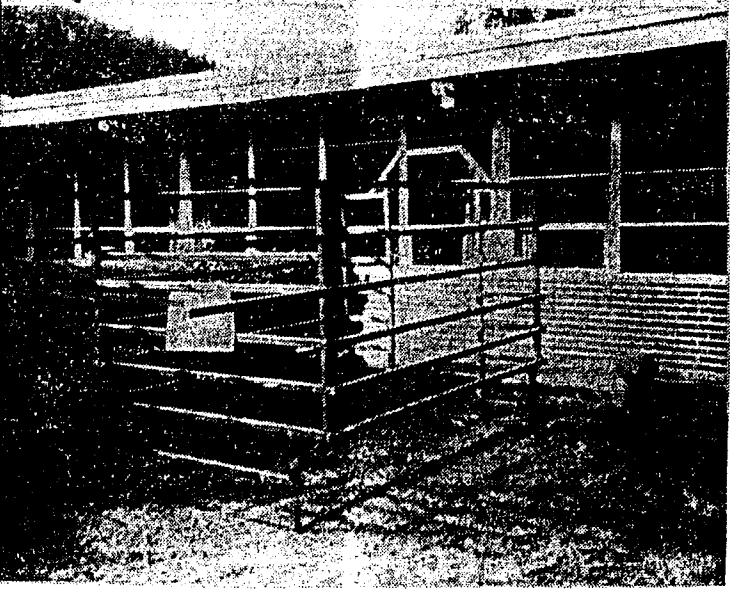

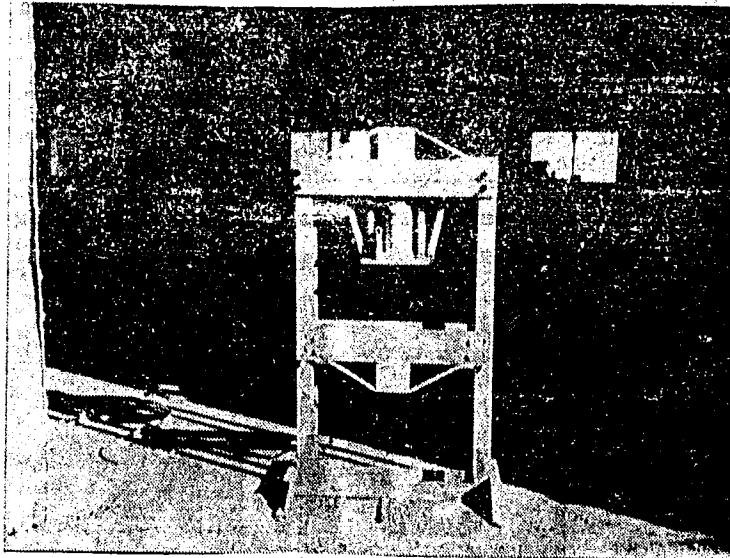
Metal Work Projects by Kendrick FFA


