Kendrick School Board Election Set

May 15 has been the date set for a school board trustee election and also an election to gain approval for the continuance of the 3-mill Plant Facility override for Jt. School Dist. No. 283. The dates were set at the meeting of school trustees last Thursday, April 5, at the high school.

The trustee election will be for a board member from Zone 5 (Leland-Cameron) and is now held by board chairman Luther Parks.

In the past, the bulk of the monies raised by the 3-Mill Plant Facility override has been used for purchase of new buses, with lesser amounts used to buy equipment, provide building repair, and remodeling. It will continue to be used in this way in the future, if voters approve. Under present valuation the 3-Mills generates about \$16,500.00 per year.

The board also determined to call for bids for the District's insurance needs. Bids are due in the Superintendent's office at 4:00 p. m. on May 10th and will be opened at 8:00 p. m. that same day.

Earlier in the meeting, the board heard Miss Jill Hoogland and Miss Lane Utley report on the Senior Class request of May 21-25 as the date for the Senior Sneak. The Seniors were granted their requested trip to Montana.

In final action, the Board set June 14th at 8:00 p. m. as the date for the annual budget hearing.

The next regular meeting will be at the high school at 7:30 p. m. on May 15.

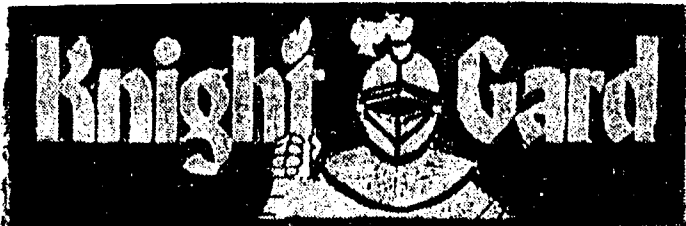
