Changes Made In Westendahl Scholarship Fund

In this rapidly changing area of technical knowledge and computer business, post high school education seems almost a necessity for survival. Many times students must postpone or forego a college or vocational education for lack of financial resources and the valuable moral support that a scholarship can offer. Young people today need the assistance of scholarships and the encouragement to reach their goals. There is now a local scholarship program available to local Kendrick High School graduates known as the Westendahl Memorial Scholarship Program.

This program has evolved from the Charles Westendahl Educational Loan Fund that was established in 1958 in memory of the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Westendahl. At the age of twenty-one, Charles, a graduate of KHS and a student at LCNS in Lewiston, lost his life in a car accident. Contributions given in Charles' memory were organized into a scholarship loan program to be administered by the PTA of School District 283. In the past twenty years over \$3100 was awarded in scholarship-loans to assist nearly a dozen young people in advancing their education. When the PTA organization dissolved, the program became dormant.

Effort has been made recently to revitalize the program with some changes in its structure. Following the recent passing of Ben Westendahl, the family requested that contributions be given to the scholarship program in memory of Ben. A scholarship committee has been established to administer the program and the following changes have been adopted:

1. The fund will be known as the Westendahl Memorial Scholarship Program.

2. Several scholarships will be given annually to local KHS graduates. (The program is no longer a loan fund.)

3. Preference will be given to students preparing to enter the teaching profession.

The first scholarships will be presented at the 1979 commencement exercise. Efforts will be made to maintain the scholarship fund with future contributions.

Individuals or groups who would like to make a contribution to the scholarship fund may do so at the First Security Bank in Kendrick. Contributions are tax deductible. Families may request that contributions be made to the Westendahl Memorial Scholarship Program in memory of loved ones.

School Board Proposes Major Remodeling, Construction at Juliaetta; \$660,000 Bond

A major re-modeling and construction project proposal for the Juliaetta school was set forth this week by the trustees of Jt. School District No. 283. The plans call for building an addition onto the existing elementary school as well as for extensive remodeling of the present facilities. The board proposes to finance the work by asking the patrons of the district to pass a 20-year bond issue of \$660,000.00. A vote on this issue has been set for May 15.

The addition itself will house a full-size gym, a girl's lavatory, and boys' and girls' showers. The gym would be used for elementary physical education, athletics, school programs, and some high school athletics, if necessary. The gym would seat 270-280 persons in folding bleachers and will accommodate a portable stage for special presentations.

The addition would enable remodeling of the present building to relocate the music classroom and provide for instrument storage; enlarge and modernize the food preparation area;

enlarge the cafeteria and separate it from the kitchen; improve the boys' lavatory; and include space for a kindergarten classroom.

The new addition would primarily be constructed of clay block exterior walls insulated with a zonalite material. The floors would all be poured concrete with appropriate finishes such as ceramic tile in shower and toilet areas and hardwood or thick polyvinyl chloride sheet.

The new addition would set directly in back of, and be attached to, the present building.

If the voters in the district approve the passage of the bond issue that would give the district the \$660,000.00 to complete the construction and remodeling, a levy of approximately 9 mills would be required to pay off the indebtedness.

If the voters pass the bond and also vote to continue the 3 mill plant facility levy as described in last week's Gazette, the next school levy against their property will be between 27.5 mills and 34.5 mills total (the difference in the levy depending on which county the property owner has his property—Latah, NezPerce or Clearwater). If neither the bond issue nor the plant facility levy pass, the school levy against property will be between 15.5 and 22.5 mills. (22.5 mills amounts to \$22.50 tax paid for each \$1,000 of assessed valuation).

To estimate what an individual's school tax will be for next year, use the assessed value shown on the most recent tax notice and multiply that amount by .001. Multiply that figure by the number of mills. For example, a home whose market value (also listed on the tax statement) is \$21,000 will have an assessed value of about \$4,200. The total school tax, including the building bond and the plant facility levy, would then be about \$4200 x .001 -- 4.2 x 34.5 or \$144.90.

The present 1978 school levy against that home would be about 35.2 mills or \$147.84. However, due to new laws implementing parts of the 1%, if neither the bond issue nor the plant facility levy passes, the next school tax on the home would be about \$94.50. All the figures shown above are estimates.

Spring Construction To Start On Genesee TV Cable

The Genesee Cable T. V. Co. announces that spring construction will soon commence.

Because of the hard winter much of the equipment and antennas have been damaged by the weather. The following construction will be done as soon as weather permits.

Channels (2) and (6) antenna arrays will be repaired and rewired so that they will develop maximum output.

Channel (4) array will be completely rebuilt and rewired. New antennas have been ordered and they are larger and develop better gain than the old ones.

Channel (3) is going to be converted to Channel (11) so it will not interfere with Channels (4) and (2). Ghosts will disappear because stray (3) signals will not affect the main signal on (11). Adding Channel (11) should not affect Channels (10) and (12) because these channels are strong enough to resist co-channel interference and conversion will enable us to better regulate the KLEW signal.

All of the active and passive equipment on the distribution line will be checked and tuned. Some new line and equipment will be installed.

The T. V. System appreciates your patronage and patience through the long winter and hopes that spring construction will give you better cable viewing.


