

Questions and Answers Concerning School Issues

May 15 voters in the boundaries of Jt. School District 283 will be asked to approve a \$860,000 bond issue for improvements at the Juliaetta Elementary school and also to continue a Plant Facilities levy of 3 mills.

Supt. of Schools Dick Morton has compiled a number of questions that have been asked of him and also some questions and answers he feels might explain the two proposals to the patrons of the district.

About the New School—

- Q. How much will the new addition and remodeling cost?
A. Preliminary estimates are \$496,700 for the addition and \$163,300 for the remodeling.
- Q. With the interest added, how much will the total bonding cost be?
A. Depending upon the interest rate and the method of financing, the total cost of the bonds should fall between \$1.1 and \$1.2 million.
- Q. How will the work be paid for?
A. If the May 15th bond issue passes, the school board will sell bonds (District Promissory Notes) in the amount of \$860,000.
- Q. Who will buy the bonds?
A. Either the state, individual investors or investing companies.
- Q. When will the District repay the bonds?
A. Over a 20-year period these will come due at certain intervals.
- Q. How much will be repaid each year?
A. Averaging between \$55,000 and \$60,000 each year. This includes the interest payment which is estimated at 6.5%.
- Q. Where will be District get the money to repay the bonds?
A. From the school district's bond and interest fund. This fund will get its revenue from the school bond tax placed on the property owners according to the assessed value placed on the property.
- Q. How is this amount expressed in mills for the property owner's assessment?
A. Using the most common method of financing the first year would be approximately 10.9 mills, the 20th year it would be about 7.5 mills. The average is 9 mills per year.
- Q. Why do we need an addition?
A. The present gym is of limited use for physical education instruction and other activities due to its size.
- Q. Will the addition be used for anything besides sports?
A. Yes. It's design is actually multipurpose, with plans calling for a moveable stage to be used for programs, etc. During the winter months its major use will be for indoor recreation and physical education. Its close access to the kitchen, restrooms and locker facilities will make it usable for many other student and community activities.
- Q. Won't the addition use a lot of playground space?
A. Yes. However, much of the ground used is presently sloping and quite unusable. It will also make level and usable some ground which is presently too steep to use.
- Q. How will the addition of the multi-purpose room and enlargement of the cafeteria help the classroom instructional situation?
A. By having an environment for exercise and lunch that is non-cramped, quiet and more comfortable, students are more relaxed and ready for academic work when they return to the regular classroom.
- Q. During inclement weather, do the students currently have a place for exercise?
A. Yes. The gym and the classroom. However, many times they must remain in the classroom all day, as the present gym is inadequate and hazardous for many activities and large numbers of children.
- Q. How does this proposed facility compare with other schools in communities similar to ours?
A. It will make ours compare very favorably.
- Q. Did any citizens, parents or property owners participate in the evaluation of the need for improved elementary physical facilities?
A. Yes on all counts. In 1975-76, the school board appointed a citizens' committee to conduct a survey of patrons in an effort to seek their opinions of the elementary school program and their hopes for future changes. The survey took the form of a number of meetings and several hundred questionnaires.
- Q. If school enrollment increases, will there be any room left for the addition of more classrooms if they should be necessary?
A. Yes. The west end of the present school could support several more classrooms if there appeared to be a permanent increase in enrollment.
- Q. Do you expect a large increase in enrollment?
A. No. There are no indications that a major increase in enrollment will take place in the near future.
- Q. The plans include a Kindergarten room. Does the District currently operate a Kindergarten?
A. Yes. The District rents the basement of the Juliaetta Church of the Nazarene for its Kindergarten class.
- Q. Where are music classes presently taught?
A. In a former store-room. Soundproofing is considered a need because the music classes can be heard throughout the building, and the room is too small for the 20-40 instrumentalists or singers.
- Q. Will this remodeling include any work on the classrooms?
A. No. However, needed work and improvements on the classrooms and hallways have been made in recent years. More improvements are planned to be done over the next few years. This work can be done by local craftsmen at a much more favorable cost than if it were to be included in a large bonded project performed by a general contractor.
- Q. Why doesn't the District just

build a totally new elementary school and gym.
A. The present building is too useful and has many years of service life left to justify the expenditures for replacement.

About the Plant Facility—

- Q. How much will the levy raise?
A. The maximum it could raise with the current valuation of the district would be \$16,500.
- Q. How long would this levy last?
A. 10 years.
- Q. If passed does the district have to raise 3 mills each of the 10 years?
A. No. If passed, the school board could get no more than 3 mills each year but could ask for none or any amount less than 3 mills.
- Q. How do they determine the amount?
A. The Board annually adopts a budget for estimated expenditures. Part of that budget is the estimated plant facilities revenues and expenditures.
- Q. Could the board ever raise more than \$16,500 in any one year from this 3-mill levy?
A. Yes. The maximum amount could increase as the total assessed valuation of the district increases. That is, 3 mills (.003) times the present assessed of \$5.5 million gives \$16,500. If the assessed valuations were to increase to \$6.0 million, 3-mills would raise \$18,000.
- Q. How often can the assessed valuation change?
A. Present law allows an increase in market value of no more than 2% per year once the property has been appraised at the 1978 values.
- Q. What does this mean in actual dollars on my home?
A. If the assessor determines the market value of the home to be \$21,000 (market value is usually less than what the property could be sold for), its assessed value would be about \$4,200. The 3-mill levy on that property would be \$12.60 tax per year.
- Q. With a market value increase of 2% the next year, how much could the tax raise?
A. The tax would be \$12.85, a .25 increase.
- Q. If the assessed valuation raised 2% each year for the 10 year life of the levy, how much would my plant facility tax be in the tenth year?
A. 4.547 mills times the 1st years assessed valuation of \$19,100.
- Q. Has the district ever had a Plant Facility Levy before?
A. Yes. The last one was passed in 1974 for 5 years, at 3-mills. Others have been approved in the district in the past for 5 to 10 years, at 2 to 5-mills.
- Q. What will the money be used for?
A. To remodel and repair buildings, to purchase equipment and to purchase school buses. In the past it has been used for these same purposes.
- Q. Does our district vote on a special override levy every year for maintenance and operations funds as many district do?
A. No. This has been done in the past. However, this is the second consecutive year the board has not asked for an "M & O" override levy.

Brockes Return from Trip To Mainland China

Mr. and Mrs. George Brocke, Jr. returned to Kendrick Sunday evening after a three-week trip to Red China as part of a 23-person trade delegation to that nation. Brocke, manager of Geo. F. Brocke and Sons, Inc., and his wife, Helen, visited in three major Chinese cities, Shanghai, Peking and Canton and attended the internationally famous Canton Trade Fair.

The visitors were traveling in China at the invitation of the Chinese government.

April 14, the Brockes left Kendrick for Spokane and then on to Seattle where they and other members of the trade delegation were given a briefing by Gary Wenske, Foreign Relations Committee staff member, and Sylvia Stanfield, country officer in the office of the PRC, Department of State, at a breakfast meeting.

Their plane, a commercial jet, left Seattle at 1:50 on the 15th and arrived at Tokyo the next afternoon at 5 o'clock. After staying overnight at the Narita International Hotel their plane left Tokyo and arrived in Shanghai at 1:20 p. m. April 17. There they were greeted by the CC PIT Committee (China Commission for Promotion of International Trade) at the airport where greetings were exchanged with local officials who accompanied them on their stay in Shanghai. They visited the Shanghai Industrial Exhibition Museum and the Bund Avenue on the Riverfront in the afternoon. The CCPIT hosted a banquet in the evening. They stayed in a guest house as the hotels were booked full. The next morning visits were made to a Buddhist Shrine and an Arts and Crafts Institute center. The CCPIT officials saw the delegates off to the airport at 11:40 the morning of the 18th and the plane arrived at Peking at 1:30 the same day.

Again the delegates were greeted by another CCPIT group then bussed to the Peking Hotel where a meeting was held at the CCPIT office building and higher officials were met. The trade delegation joined with U. S. Senator Frank Church and other Senators and their staff for a banquet that evening with Chinese government officials hosted by the Chinese.

The following morning at 8:30 a meeting was held with An Chi Tao, Deputy Managing Director, China National Cereals, Oils and Foodstuffs Imp. and Exp. Corp. At 10:00 a. m. another meeting was held, this time with vice premier Fang Yi at the Great Hall next to Red Square. The Vice Premier stated policy and answered questions presented by the group. A bus trip to the Great Wall in the afternoon was very interesting and an unbelievable sight. They drove through a large farming area which was all irrigated. A banquet was hosted that evening by the Foreign Relations Committee Senators with Chinese officials as guests.

On the morning of the 20th the bassador Leonard Woodcock at the held in a permanent building in the American Embassy. The Ambassador and his assistant, Charles Sylvester, answered all questions asked by the trade delegation. The meeting lasted for 1½ hours. The Embassy facility is very impressive, Brocke reported. They were then taken to the airport for an 11:30 a. m. flight to Canton.

The delegation arrived at Canton at 2:30 that afternoon where they were once again greeted by another CCPIT group and escorted to the Canton Trade Fair. Throughout the United States during the period of April 22-28 Grange Week is celebrated in a number of ways. Kendrick Grange was recently reminded of some of the contributions made by the Grange on the national, State and local levels.

Speaking at the April 17 meeting of Kendrick Grange, Nellie Heimgartner reviewed some of these achievements.

Since 1887, the Grange has been a mainstay for rural roads and was solely responsible for initiation of Rural Free Delivery and our Parcel Post System.

It fostered the creation of the Extension Service and fathered legislation creating the Vo-Ag program. It also secured initial legislation establishing our system of agricultural experiment stations and has since helped Congress guide and support an adequate program of research.

The Grange furthered the cause of the Soil Conservation Service and Crop Insurance Program. Leading the fight that gave Cabinet status to the USDA, the Grange has been a stalwart supporter of that Department ever since.

The Grange sponsored legislation which created the REA, and rural telephone program and initiated the party concept for measuring agricultural welfare.

In addition, it developed the original Farm Credit Act and was the dominant force in bringing Social Security to farmers and other self-employed persons.

The Grange, however, is more than just a farm organization. Its programs are generated by total community and national interest. And above all, it is based on the family, the hub of civilization.

I would like to point out some things about the school bond issue and the 3-Mill M & O levy that were not brought out at the Monday night meeting.

As was stated at the meeting and also in the Gazette that the bond issue would be a 9 mill levy. If they are going to raise \$60,000.00 per year as they plan—they will have to levy 11 mills against present assessed val-

uation. The money the 11 mill raises will stay constant even if the valuations go up and the millage goes down. For example, if a farmer has 30,000 of assessed valuation he will pay \$330 a year or \$6,600 in twenty years.

A \$30,000 home would pay \$66.00 a year or \$1,320.00 in twenty years. This bond issue is not a \$660,000.00 as we are told—it will cost the taxpayers 1.2 million dollars—of this 1.2 million the new gym will cost \$800,000 dollars in 20 years.

Those voting against this kind of expenditure are not voting to deny our children basic education—but question the need for two full blown

gymnasiums in this district.

To make this expenditure now when we don't know whether the legislature will protect the property owners after revaluation or set them up for a rip-off could be disastrous.

The state tax commission says our district is at about 13% of market value—this means we could get a 35% increase in market value and in our taxes—we do not know at this time. If we get this 35% increase then the 3 mill M&O levy would become a 4.5 mill levy and it would continue to increase every year—unless they reduce it and we have no assurance of that.

This 3-mill levy should be voted on every two years and not extended for ten years as it is now.

Another totally unfair situation that now exists is that many of those voting are not doing the paying.

Any non-property owner over 18 years of age that has lived in our district for 30 days can vote.

After the election they can get in their car and move on and leave the people living here to pay the taxes. They will never receive a tax statement.

We also have people who must pay the tax voted on them by others—yet they are denied the right to vote.

All of this unfairness could be corrected by an optional tax. There shouldn't be anyone among us that would not want to help correct this unfairness.

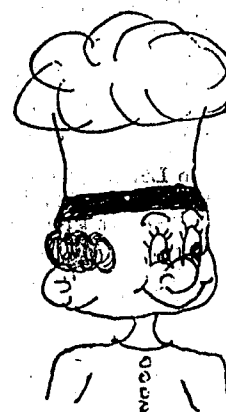

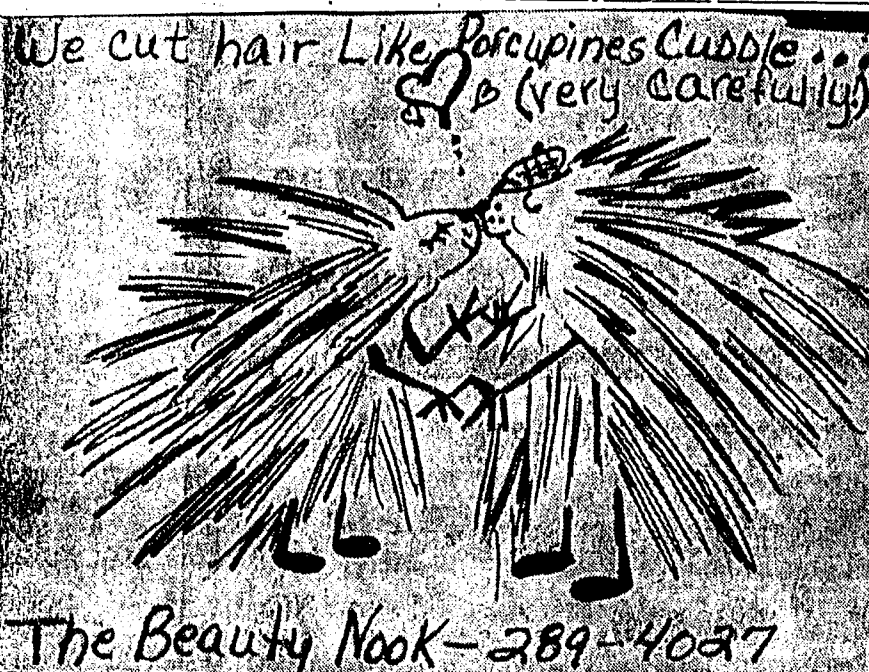
