

## Otto Schupfer, Pioneer Juliaetta Businessman, Passes at Age 88

Telephones, cars, motors and anything mechanical were the center of Otto Schupfer's life until he died Wednesday morning, May 2, at the age of 88 years at Gritman Hospital in Moscow. A lifelong resident of Juliaetta, he was president of the Potlatch Telephone Company, a business that he and his brother, Herman, bought in 1915 and which is still in the family.

The village of Juliaetta was founded by the Schupfer brothers' father, Mathias Schupfer and their uncles, Florian and Rupert Schupfer in the 1870's. During their 58 years of marriage, Otto and his wife, Josephine, who survives him, lived in the house Mathias had built around 1875. Otto and Josephine have made improvements in the house as well as additions over the years.

Other survivors are two daughters—Marian Meyer, Hesperia, Calif., and Maribel Samuelson, Post Falls; five grandchildren—Judy Harris, Long Beach, Calif.; Wally Otto Meyer, Hesperia, Calif.; John, Glenn and Steve Samuelson, and two great-granddaughters—Tammy and Heidi Harris. He was preceded in death by a sister, Ida, long-time telephone operator with the family enterprise, and brother, Herman, who worked many years for the Washington Water Power Company.

In 1951 with only blueprints to follow, Otto assembled the first dial switchboard in Juliaetta, which required soldering more than 1,000 wires. This gave the village dial service even before Lewiston. The Schupfer brothers in 1908 began working for R. H. Porter, who owned the small telephone system in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area. At that time some of the barbed wire on fences were used as transmission lines for the company. Their weekly wage for 10 hours a day and six days a week was \$3 a week each, plus dinners. The company expanded to about 300 subscribers when the Schupfers bought it in 1915.

One of Otto's first jobs was that of keeping the thrashing machine in operation for a farm crew. He eagerly welcomed the machine age and was satisfied to see horses replaced with machines.

Working for Porter also included for Otto and Herman the operation of the tramway from the top of Potlatch Ridge down the hillside to the warehouse by Potlatch Creek in the canyon. Sacks of wheat were hauled from the top of the ridge to the warehouse below during the harvest season. Otto would climb the hill each morning and bring the car down to begin daily operation.

The last load ever to be hauled down the tramway was a 104-foot log, which became the flag pole for Juliaetta and stood for many years. In recent years, Otto enjoyed sitting on his front porch and looking across the valley where the tramway once was and reminiscing about his "fun" days running it.

While working into the telephone business, Otto also helped Guy Lewis establish the Kendrick Garage. Otto had such respect for Mr. Lewis that he would have been pleased to have been his brother-in-law, as the Tribune mistakenly reported last week. About a year before his death, Otto and his family hunted up the grave of Lewis in the Coeur d'Alene cemetery and placed flowers on it.

E. A. Deobald, Otto's brother-in-law, bought the Kendrick Garage and managed it for more than 50 years. When the garage was started by Lewis there were only three cars in Kendrick and 12 in the area. Otto was one of the first area residents to drive a car and he taught many others to drive. In 1915 before there were good highways, he drove the John Flesham family in a Chalmers automobile to Turon, Kansas. Roads were only dirt and they found their way across the country by various landmarks, such as old barns. There were seven in the group and Mrs. Flesham, who was seven-months pregnant, did all the cooking along the road where they camped each night. Mrs. Herman Johnson was one of the Flesham children along on that trip and she and Otto often reminisced about their adven-

ture. "All mechanical things can be repaired," Otto always said. He was constantly repairing appliances for someone, even in his later years. Once he fixed a camera, after \$80 had just been paid for a complete overhaul job on it. When it came by mail to Juliaetta from the East Coast, the focusing apparatus was off, so Otto worked several hours to get it adjusted properly.

The first radio in Moscow was installed by Otto. A friend, Fred Petrick, became sick and went to the hospital. He secured permission and then climbed a nearby pole to get the radio working for Fred. Several nurses gathered outside the hospital to watch him work.

When he went to that same hospital two weeks ago, Otto had along his usual tools—a jack-knife, pliers and two screw drivers.

During an ordinary work day while most people enjoyed a coffee break, Otto would hurry down to the Lewiston Grain Growers to check on the machinery and remind the men there to keep the motors oiled.

Like his father who had been a carpenter and barrel maker, Otto also built cupboards and cabinets for the family. Then in 1931 he helped Williams Johns, father of Phil and Art, to build a big barn that still stands on the Schupfer homestead. The two would begin work at 3:30 a. m. Otto would then go off to his telephone work at 7:30 a. m. and return to work on the barn in the evenings. The two had it completed in 18 days and painted it red on the 19th.

Otto and Josephine operated a silent movie theatre in Juliaetta in the early 1920's. Then for more than 30 years they owned and operated the Kendrick Theatre with his brother's family.

Watching trains from his porch was one of Otto's main delights through the years. So anxious to have everyone else enjoy them, too, Otto removed a low, wooden panel in the front door of their home, so that his children could watch the trains, too. "If I hadn't gotten into the telephone business, I think I would have been a train engineer," he recently said. On a trip to Seattle in October of 1978, he made certain the family, including two grandsons, looked over the famous eight-mile long railroad tunnel under the Cascade mountains. They climbed down over a bank at the east tunnel entrance and watched a 100-car freight train enter it.

Otto and Josephine's main diversion was travel. The minute one would suggest going some place, the other put a coat on! After their marriage in Kendrick on June 9, 1921 they began taking a Sunday drive, a habit they continued all of their married life. Also at least one good trip sometime each summer was enjoyed by the family.

They attended many independent telephone exchange conventions around the country. They would have thoroughly enjoyed "nine world fairs abroad," also mistakenly reported, but they did get to one abroad in Brussels, Belgium in 1964, and eight others—Chicago twice, San Diego, San Francisco, New York, Montreal, Seattle and Spokane Expo.

Touring Europe three times, the Schupfers enjoyed visits each time to Grobming and Schlading, Austria, where Otto's parents were born and a number of cousins still live. They continued traveling in later years, putting 70,000 miles on their car in the last seven years, since Otto suffered his first stroke. Visiting old friends everywhere they went was a prime pleasure. About a year ago while talking to Ray Grove, a childhood friend, Otto was overheard saying, "Well, Ray, we can't see very good and we can't hear very good, but we are still having a good time, aren't we?"

Two years ago on a trip to South Idaho, they enjoyed a visit with Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Griffith at Ontario, Ore. Mrs. Griffith, the former Lizzie Elliott, had been an operator at the Potlatch Telephone Company in 1912. On the same trip, they also stopped to see Dora Powell, who still practiced dentistry though up in years in age.

Otto was a lifelong member of the Juliaetta Lutheran Church. Pastor Peter Vorhes conducted the service at the church Wednesday, May 9. The Juliaetta Community Church Choir sang, "When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder," and "He Lives." Mrs. Tom (Jewell) Dennler was organist, Walter Meyer and Kenneth Samuelson, his two sons-in-law, and four grandsons were pallbearers.

Burial was in the Juliaetta cemetery, which was part of the original Schupfer homestead.

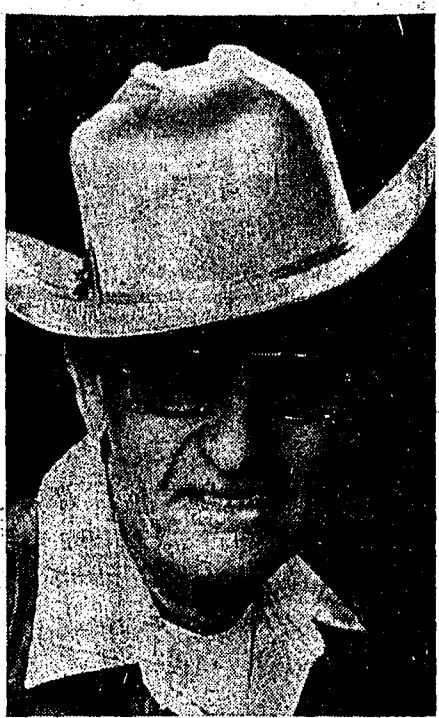

## Sudden Attack Claims Virgil Harris

Virgil Roger Harris of Lewiston, a retired construction worker, died of a heart failure at his home at 730 Burrell Ave., Tuesday evening at 11:00 p. m. He was 75.

Harris was a farmer and logger in his early life and worked in construction until he retired in 1965.

He was born July 6, 1903, at Southwick. His parents, Gordon and Millie Harris, were Southwick pioneers. He lived in Southwick until 1954, when he moved to Lewiston.



In 1926, he married Opal Southwick. She died in September of 1933. He married Hulda Torgerson in November 1939. She survives at the family home.

Other survivors include three daughters, Helen Broeke of Kendrick and Valerie Guenther and Verna Harris, both of Lewiston; five sons, Gerald, Rex and John, all of Lewiston, and Wayne and Doug, both of Kendrick; a brother Earl of Clarkston; and 16 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Three brothers preceded him in death.

Final services were held Friday, May 4, at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with Rev. Steve Caskey, of the Kendrick United Methodist Church, officiating. Donna Lohman and Ann Smith sang "The Old Rugged Cross," and "How Great Thou Art," accompanied by Joyce Clemmensen.

These small flowers, made by the veterans in V. A. hospitals, are made available through the women of the American Legion Auxiliary each year. The little poppy became the memorial flower following World War I. From 1914 until 1918 the battlefields of Europe were trampled by the boots of millions of fighting men. From 1917 until 1918 American Troops were part of the Allied Forces which fought to bring peace to Europe. Months of hard fighting and thousands of lives were the price paid for this objective. As American troops advanced through France and Flanders the only touch of life and beauty that they saw were the little white poppies that bloomed amid the rubble of war. The tiny blossoms covered the graves of America's fighting men and they soon became a symbol of sacrifice to the living.

This is why we pin a poppy on our collar and lapel or make centerpieces and use the small flowers in other ways. On Poppy Day, we all have an opportunity to place this memorial flower over our hearts in tribute to the sacrifice which they made.

## Voters Hold Fate of School Remodeling Proposal; Plant Facilities Levy May 15

The fate of the proposed \$660,000 building and re-modeling proposal for Juliaetta Elementary school and a 3-mill Plant Facility override continuance rests in the hands of the voters of Jt. School District No. 283 who will go to the polls Tuesday afternoon and evening, May 15, to cast their ballots.

The Trustees of the district are asking for a 20-year bond issue in the amount of \$660,000 to construct a new gymnasium at the rear of the present building and remodel the existing structure so as to provide better facilities for the music room, the school lunch room, modernize the food preparation area, improve the boys' lavatory and include space for the kindergarten class at the school.

The new gym, which would be a full-size court, would be a multi-purpose room; used not only for sports, but also for school programs, and recreation area during periods of bad weather.

If the voters of the district approve the passage of the bond issue that would give the Trustees the \$660,000 to complete the construction and remodeling, a levy of approximately 9 mills would be required to pay off the indebtedness over a period of 20 years.

Also to be voted on at the May 15 election will be the continuance of the Plant Facilities override of 3 mills. This override is used to provide funds for new buses, equipment and building repair at both schools.

Four polling places have been set up in the district. Voters who live in Clearwater County will vote at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Lawrence in Southwick.

All Nez Perce County voters in the district will vote at the Cameron Lutheran Church, Cameron.

Latah County residents of the district in Zone 1 will vote at the Juliaetta Elementary School.

Latah residents in Zone 2, 3, and 4 will vote at Kendrick High School. The polls will open at 12 noon and will remain open until 8 p. m. that evening.

The Potlatch Ridge Workers 4-H club has received assistance from Kendrick-Juliaetta Businesses and individuals in money and merchandise. The merchandise will be given to the winning chance tickets May 26. There will be 10 drawings, or 10 winners. Some prizes are on exhibit at Culpepper Clothing Co.

The money earned from the ticket sales and a baked food sale during the Blossom Festival, will be used for the 4-H Competitive trail ride May 27. The ride will take place on the Arlie Armitage property and the Tom Marek residence on Cedar Creek.

Two silver belt buckles and ribbons will be awarded to the top horse-riders of the day. A horse judging contest is also planned, with ribbons awarded. The public is invited to watch these kids!

Money is also being raised to buy the food for the 4-H breakfast on the June 23-24 multi-county overnight campout and trail ride to Round Meadows.

After the expenses have been paid from these special projects, the remaining money will be put in the main fund of Potlatch ridge workers to be used by all of the 4-Hers in the club.

These two projects, sponsored by the horse group is to increase interest in the Trail Horse Project; to increase interest in pleasure riding for the beginners; to share riding experiences with other clubs and other counties, and to learn as much as possible from leaders, jr. leaders and others involved with horses.

To achieve all of the goals the club has set for itself the expenses have already reached \$200.00, \$228.00 was collected from the local businesses in cash donations alone. Without this kind of support the horse club could not sponsor these activities or be an active club.

We will keep the Gazette readers informed of our activities and successes during the rest of the year. The support shown is greatly appreciated.

The horse projects are some of the most expensive 4-H projects available but also are the most active. The 4-Hers pay for entry fees and transportation costs regularly. They do not sell their projects at the fair at the end of the year. The club has to provide insurance at the events, pay for awards and advertising costs. 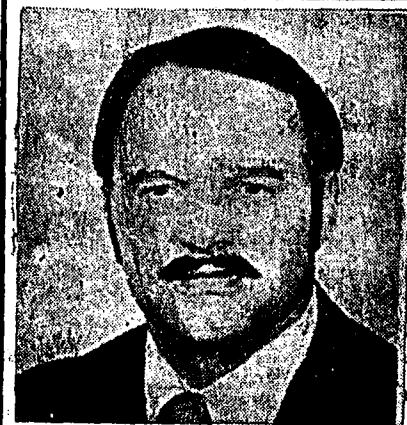
## Senior Ball

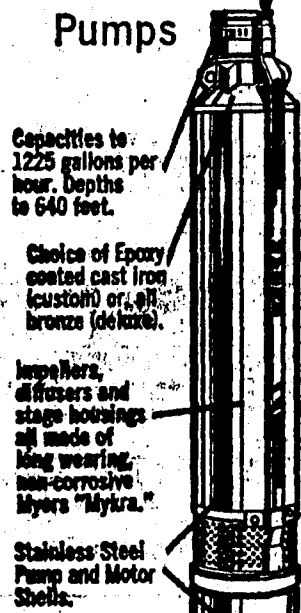

### FmHA Loans May Be Available to Some

Latah County residents who wish to purchase or have an existing home that needs repair may be eligible for a loan and/or grant through the Section 502 or 504 program of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) a rural credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Under the Section 504 program applicants may be eligible for a loan or grant up to a maximum \$5,000 to be used for any necessary home improvement that will make their dwelling safe and sanitary and remove hazards to the health of the occupant, their families or the community. This would include repairing roofs, supplying screens, insulation, heating system or any other improvement that will make their home better to live in. Section 504 loans are at 1% interest for a maximum of 20 years and are limited to applicants who own and occupy a dwelling in a rural area and who are unable to receive credit elsewhere, have insufficient income to qualify for a Section 502 FmHA housing loan and have sufficient income from all sources to repay the loan. For those applicants who are unable to repay any part of a 504 loan and are 62 years of age or older, a grant can be made for the same purpose as the loan.

Under the Section 502 program an applicant's gross annual income is adjusted by subtracting 5% of the gross income plus \$300 deducted for each minor child living in the home. Applicants whose gross income adjusts between \$11,200 and \$15,600 and are unable to receive credit elsewhere may be eligible for a housing loan at a current interest rate of 9% for 33 years.

If the income adjusts below \$11,200 the applicant is eligible for an Interest Credit Loan. Under this program the interest rate is adjusted according to the income, and may range from 1% to 9% with the government subsidizing the difference. The Interest Credit Agreement is reviewed every two years and may be adjusted according to the changes in income. Should the home be sold or when the loan is paid out, the amount of subsidy the borrowers received must be paid back to the government from the borrowers equi-

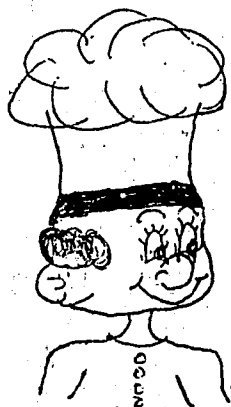
