Johanna H. Nelson Passes Away May 10

Johanna Hooker Nelson, an Idaho native and longtime resident of the Kendrick area, died last Thursday, May 10, at St. Joseph's Hospital at Lewiston. She was 83.

She was born November 9, 1895 at Genesee to Abraham and Kari Hooker. She moved with her family to Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick in 1900. She had lived in the Kendrick community ever since.



She married Thorvald Nelson on Sept. 6, 1927 and with him farmed and raised cattle until his tragic accidental death on a tractor June 17, 1939.

She was a member of Bethany Lutheran church at Bear Ridge; a fifty-year member of Canyon Chapter No. 67, Order of the Eastern Star, the Kendrick Garden Club and the Bear Ridge Home Extension Club.

Two brothers and a sister died in infancy.

She is survived by numerous cousins in Idaho and Washington and in Norway; a sister-in-law and several nieces and nephews. Memorials may be given to the American Cancer Society or the Bethany Lutheran Memorial Fund.

Her many interests included growing beautiful flowers, shrubs and trees. Sharing her lovely old farm home with her relatives and many friends, then serving banquet size dinners, she called them "just a little lunch", was a real pleasure for her. Summers were often spent surrounded by nieces or cousins who enjoyed farm life away from the city. The last few years she spent her winters in Clarkston. Here she was involved in the church activities and driving friends where they needed to go. She brought one young cousin from Norway who spent some time with her.

She was never happier than when she was doing kindnesses for others. Her friends were numbered by her acquaintances.

Although they had no children of their own, their home was fun for the fortunate little ones who visited her.

Gruells Return From Five-Week Tour

Cecil and Crystal Gruell returned last week from a five-week "Green Carpet" bus trip — travelling 7,500 miles through 18 states.

They left Portland, Oregon April 2 and arrived at Key West Florida on April 19—the southern-most city in the United States.

They toured Salt Lake City and the Mormon Tabernacle in Utah. "n Colorado the Royal Gorge, Air Force Academy, Garden of the Gods, Colorado and Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Monuments and the world's largest open pit copper mine at Bingham Canyon were enjoyed.

They had lunch at Wichita Falls, Texas shortly before the devastating tornado struck the city, and saw where President Kennedy was killed in Dallas and the memorial representing an open grave with a black marker.

The Bellingrath Gardens and Home — a "Garden for all Seasons" near Mobile, Alabama is considered the most magnificent sight in the Old South, and the 17-mile Azalea Trail thru the city is outstanding. This was enjoyed on Easter Sunday. Many ante bellum homes are being restored by the Garden Clubs of the South.

While in New Orleans, Crystal had her billfold stolen from her purse while on her arm, by a pick-pocket either while walking on the street or in the Marriott Hotel in the French Quarter. A 2½ hour paddle boat trip on the Natchez gave them a view of the Mississippi at flood stage.

While in Florida, they saw the Cypress Gardens and water show, Disney World, took an air boat ride thru the Everglades, followed the Tamiami Trail on the 100-mile Overseas Highway from Key Largo to Key West, visited the world-renowned Singing Tower, cruised Biscayne Bay (past Anita Bryant's home) toured Kennedy Space Center, Mar-ineland of Florida, and St. Augustine the oldest city in the United States founded in 1565.

North Carolina's Great Smokey Mts National Park was beautiful with wild dogwood and Red Bud trees covering the hills, as were the highways through Georgia, South Carolina and Alabama.

A performance of the Grand Ole Opry was enjoyed in Nashville, Tennessee and the highlights of Kansas were old town Dodge City and the Truman Library and Museum in Independence.

The group of 22 were lucky in being ahead of the severe storms and floods that swept through the area travelled, but heavy rains were encountered at times and they had snow showers through Kansas, Wyoming and Boise, where the Gruells left the group and flew to Lewiston.

Juliaetta School Bond Issue Fails to Pass; Plant Facilities Mill Override Is Approved

A bond issue that would have provided funds for the construction of a new gymnasium and remodeling of Juliaetta Elementary School failed to gain the necessary two-thirds majority approval in Joint School District 283 Tuesday afternoon, but the voters did approve the continuance of the 3-mill Plant Facilities override issue at the same election. In the Cameron area, incumbent trustee Luther Parks was re-elected despite a heavy write-in vote that took the district by surprise.

Perfect weather and intense voter interest provided one of the largest turnouts in history for a school election as 408 voters cast ballots on the bond issue and the Plant Facility override election.

While a majority of voters favored the passage of the \$660,000.00 bond issue that would have provided the funds for the Juliaetta School building and remodeling, the issue failed to gain the needed two-thirds majority. There were 408 ballots cast with 241 Yes votes; 165 No votes and 2 blank ballots. This was a 59 percent majority.

There were 407 ballots cast in the Plant Facilities election to continue the 3-mill override. Of the 407 votes cast, 283 were Yes; 120 were No and 4 blank ballots.

Luther Parks, incumbent trustee from the Leland-Cameron zone of Jt. District 283, and chairman of the board of directors found himself facing a strong write-in campaign Tuesday afternoon. Parks was returned for another three-year term, but Vern Wegner received 33 votes as a write-in. Parks received 50 votes.

While Supt. of Schools Dick Morton expressed his disappointment at the failure of the building bond issue to pass, he said he was very grateful for the passage of the Plant Facility continuance, "that really takes the heat off," he said. He added that the large turnout was especially gratifying. "It gave all the issues a good, fair shake."

The breakdown of votes by zones showed only Juliaetta giving the bond issue the necessary two-thirds approval. Kendrick voted 86 Yes, 74 No, for 53 percent. Juliaetta votes 99 Yes, 30 No; 1 blank ballot for 76 percent. Cameron voted 53 Yes, 57 No, 1 blank ballot for 47 percent.

Asked about the future of the Juliaetta building project, Morton declined to make any predictions for himself or the board. "We'll just backoff and take a good long look at it," he said.

Genesee Votes Overwhelming Approval Of M&O Mill Levy; Stout Elected Trustee

In an unprecedented show of strength and solidarity for its beleaguered and trouble-plagued school system, Genesee voters went to the polls in record numbers Tuesday afternoon and voted overwhelming approval of a 12-mill override levy to support Maintenance and Operation of the school. There were 459 votes cast in the Tuesday election and 322 voters favored the additional levy while just 137 said No.

In an election for Trustee to replace outgoing board member Marion Holben, who declined to seek another term, Genesee farmer Martin Stout received 70 votes to win the position on the board. His opponent, Genesee farm wife and former teacher, Darlene Krick received 47 votes. This

was for a three-year term.

For the Genesee School system, riddled by internal strife and victimized by an avalanche of mostly unfavorable publicity, the Tuesday vote was a reassurance that Genesee people care a great deal about their school system and are willing to pay the price in taxes to see to it that Genesee Schools continue to be among the best in the state.

"Just Great, Just Great," was board chairman Marion Holben's reaction to the Tuesday vote. Many of the farmers, who are far behind in their spring work took the time to come in to vote and others, 55 in all took out absentee ballots, just so they could register their opinions on the issues.

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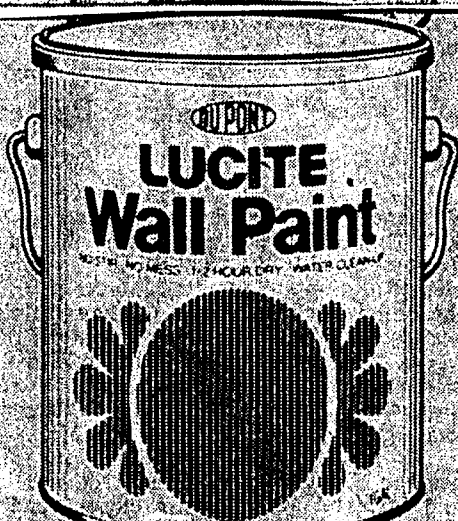
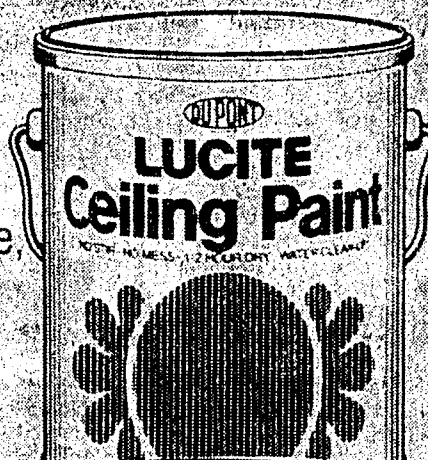

CHARGES INVOLVING WOLF BRING FINE, PENALTY

A plea of guilty to charges involving a wolf taken in Bear Valley last year has resulted in a \$450 fine and a 3-year revocation of hunting and fishing privileges for a Cascade man.

Donald Nitzel entered the plea in magistrate court. He was charged with purchase, possession and sale of an endangered species.

The wolf is protected by federal and state law.

Trial dates have not been set for the two other defendants, Gilman Shafer, Nampa, and David Howard, Cascade. Shafer is charged with sale and possession of an endangered species and Howard with purchase and possession of an endangered species.

The court agreed to a continuance for a pre-trial investigation in Howard's case.

Department of Fish and Game personnel say the wolf is a rare animal in Idaho. Last summer, however, a department biologist photographed a wolf during a flight over the Clearwater River drainage.

He later made plaster casts of the tracks and collected samples of hair. Unconfirmed sightings of wolves have been reported since 1962 from Boundary county in the north to Mountain Home near Interstate 80.

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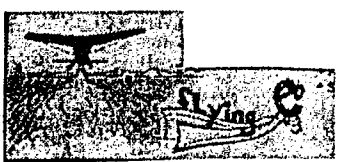

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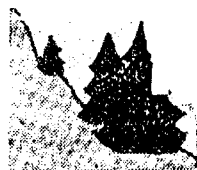

The following are a few tips to help runners remain safe while enjoying the sport:

—Always let someone know the route you intend to run and when you expect to return.

—Run in a familiar area. When in an unfamiliar city, ask a law enforcement officer or other responsible person to suggest an area in which it is safe to run.

—If you run at night, select a route with adequate lighting and wear light-colored clothing that will allow you to be seen by passing motorists.

—Avoid secluded areas or locations containing hiding places for potential criminals.

—Avoid running alone whenever possible.

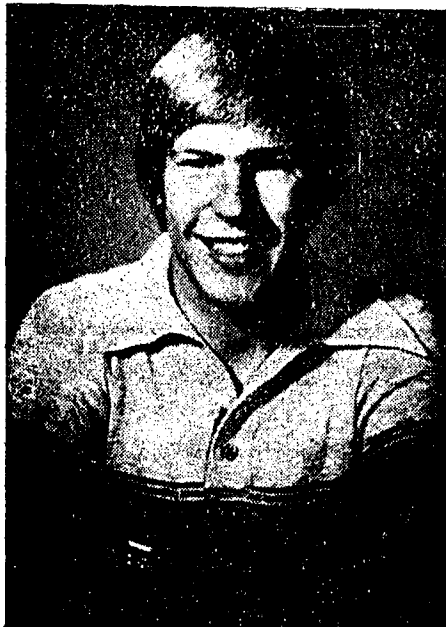

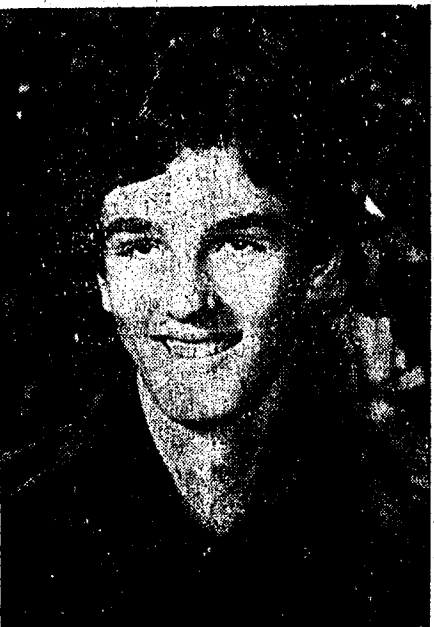

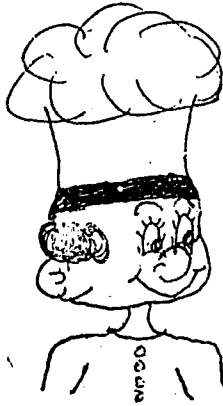
