Potlatch Cemetery District Facing Financial Crisis

The Board of Directors of the Potlatch Cemetery Maintenance District wishes to inform the families living in the district that a financial crisis will soon face us, a crisis that unless met will inevitably result in loss of the vital maintenance services provided in the cemeteries in Leland and Cameron.

These services have included in the past approximately \$400.00 in annual wages, \$200.00 in required Workman's Compensation Insurance for the one employee, and \$200.00 in equipment maintenance and operation. In more specific terms, these services have kept the cemeteries the decent, neat memorials that they have been for our loved ones for the past twenty-five years.

Ironically, the crisis originated because the Board of Directors in 1978 acted prudently and with full regard for the taxpayers in submitting their budget request to the Nez Perce Co. Board of Commissioners in September of that year.

Having through good management managed a total of approximately \$800.00 in ending balances over several years, your Board requested a budget allotment of only \$200.00 for 1979. These \$200.00 and the \$800.00 in the district's account would cover expenses for the year 1979. Unfortunately, your Board could not anticipate the two-year freeze on budgets imposed as a result of the 1% initiative.

We now face the impossible dilemma of trying to run the district in 1980 on \$200.00. Obviously, it cannot be done.

If the families living in the district want in 1980 to maintain the level of services provided now, they must take steps to overcome the obvious disadvantage that the freeze will impose on us for the next two years. One solution is for the Board to hold a special override election, which if successful (passing by a 2/3 majority) would allow them to submit a realistic budget request to the Commissioners by September of this year rather than have to live with the pathetically inadequate figure of \$200.00.

Your Board is interested in hearing your ideas concerning how to overcome the crisis. If you favor holding an election, we would like to hear from you. And if you have other practical ideas concerning how these essential services can be provided short of taxation, we'd like to hear from you, too. Address your comments to Ted Meyer, the District's Secretary, Kendrick.

Some of you will remember the sad state of the cemeteries prior to the formation of the district in 1953. Few certainly want to see those times of neglect and dishonor return. Your Board certainly doesn't and trusts that you don't either. Again, your thoughtful response to this article will be much appreciated.

## Genesee Council Met Monday; Policeman Hired

The Genesee City Council meeting was held June 4th at City Hall with Mayor Sorenson presiding.

Visitors attending were Jan Caron and Bobbi Lewis. They asked that the eastern half of Spruce Street be opened so they would have access to their property. The western half has been closed for years. They also presented a zoning permit application to reference a fence torn out when the trailer home was moved, and to enclose the present trailer house with fence. City Street Commissioner Moden will have the 40' strip opened and permission to build the fence was granted.

Mr. and Mrs. Larry Lewis attended to discuss the possibilities of a water line to their home. They are on a line that does not have sufficient pressure and would prefer a separate line. Commissioner Smith will check with our engineers and Idaho Code to answer the questions arising. Joe Nowakowski was present and asked for a parking limit on Walnut street during the business hours. Within the one block between Fir and Pine, nine apartments compete for parking space with the business houses and their customers. The parking problem was tabled for the next meeting. LeRoy V. Harris presented a zoning permit application to install an additional space for a trailer house in his mobile home court. He will install the sewer and water lines necessary. Permit was approved.

Bills in the amount of \$10,038.37 were reviewed and approved for payment.

Hired as Chief of Police for the City was Myron Dale Michelsen. Mr. and Mrs. Michelsen and his family will be moving to Genesee within the week.

R. W. Engineering of Lewiston was given authorization to proceed with developing cost estimates for a reservoir and pipelines. It is hoped they can have a total project cost estimate for the Council to review at the July meeting.

The Planning and Zoning Commission of the City of Genesee sent a letter of recommendation to the Council. The Zoning Ordinance should be amended to change the bulk and dimension requirement for two family dwellings. At present the requirement is 5000 square feet per dwelling unit. The P&Z recommends 4000 square feet per dwelling unit. Also recommended to the Council was amending the Zoning Ordinance, the section dealing with the Flood Plain Overlay will have to be brought into compliance with the Federal regulations in order to qualify for the Federal Insurance Program. The Council voted unanimously to accept the recommendations.

An ordinance, amending Title 6, Chapter 4 of the City Code was adopted and passed unanimously. This provides for dog control. Incidentally, a number of dog owners have failed as yet to provide their pets with the required license tag. These tags can be obtained from Treasurer Springer at his office, from the City Clerk during office hours, and from Chief Mickelsen.

Supervisor Luedke has asked for five days leave, the last week of June. This was granted.

Police Commissioner Merrill requests additional police to work on Community Day, June 16th.

June 11th to and including June 15th, was proclaimed as Clean Up Days. With many visitors attending our Community day celebration it is hoped everyone will make an effort to have our city looking its very best.

Latah Sanitation will bring a compactor truck to Genesee on Thursday June 14th during the afternoon and it will be at the City Shop, corner of Chestnut and Tamarack and you can bring materials at that time. If it is not possible for you to take the material to be hauled to that area on Thursday, but if at all possible, try to meet the truck on Thursday afternoon.

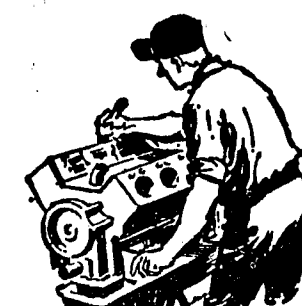

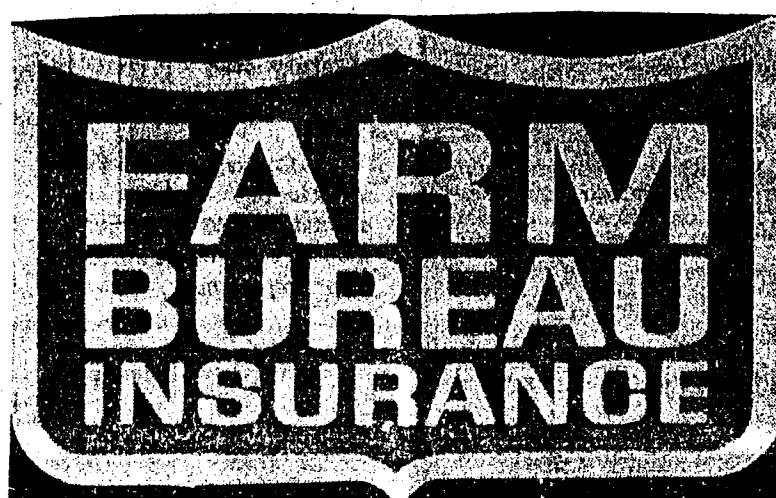

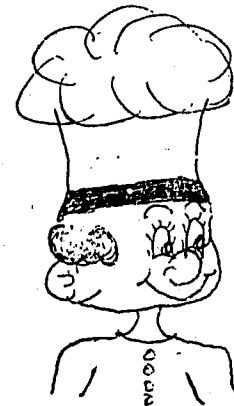
