

Genesee Community Day a Success Despite Cooler Weather, Threat of Rain

Genesee's 19th annual Community Day was a decided success despite the flow of cooler weather that moved into the area late last week and the threat of rain that hung over the skies most of the day. It was estimated that crowds of over 1,000 drifted in and out of town for the Saturday celebration.

The day began well as one of the largest crowds came to consume over 150 pounds of Genesee smoked sausage, 48 dozen eggs, plus many pounds of pancake mix, gallons of syrup, coffee and milk. Some 350-plus persons were fed at the breakfast which ran almost up to parade time because of the crowd.

Weedy Esser and his parade committee had lined up 41 entries in the main parade and Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Johnson, and Mr. and Mrs. David Wahl were in charge of the excellent kiddie parade that preceded the main event.

Cindy, Julie and Christa Johnson won 2nd prize with their trike and bikes, representing a small beginning, bigger and bigger. Grand Opening of Golden Sunset Senior Citizen Center Sunday, June 24

After almost five months and 1300 man hours of volunteer labor, the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens Center in Kendrick is completed and will have its Grand Opening Sunday, June 24. An Open House for the public is planned during the period 2 to 5 p. m. with a dedication ceremony and program scheduled for 2:30. The center is located in the old Little Auto Shop behind the Red Cross Pharmacy.

The building was built by Lester Crocker's father many years ago and housed his blacksmith and gunsmith shop.

The creation of the new center for senior citizens came about when E. M. "Bill" White was instrumental in obtaining a Federal Grant of \$23,-

000.00 under the Title 5 program. The local senior citizen organization had to meet this grant with a matching 25 percent of the funds. One of the stipulations of the grant was that the building had to be created from an older structure. The site chosen easily met this requirement.

The building will have one main hall, plus office, kitchen, storage and restrooms. It is owned by the Golden Senior Citizens, Inc. and will be used for all club functions.

Bill White was project director and Ron McNichols and Son of Lewiston were the contract carpenters.

There will be refreshments, music and guest speakers for this occasion and the public is most cordially invited to attend.

Kendrick School Board Meets; LaMunyan Submits Resignation as Principal

Bill LaMunyan, a teacher, coach and presently principal at Kendrick High School, submitted his resignation at a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of Jt. School Dist. 283, Monday evening, June 18. LaMunyan, who has been with the Kendrick Schools for the past six years, has accepted a position as a teacher and coach for the Challis School District this fall.

No replacement for LaMunyan has been found, but Supt. of School Dick Morton said the search for a new principal will begin shortly.

A budget projecting expenditures of \$525,515.00 in general funds for school year 1979-80 was adopted by the School Board at its regular meeting last Thursday evening.

Glen Utzman, a Moscow attorney and accountant was hired to conduct the annual district audit. The Board also determined to apply for renewal of a Federal Title I Grant to finance continuance of the Elementary Remedial Reading Program.

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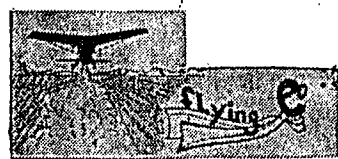

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RESIDENTIAL CONSTRUCTION IN IDAHO INCREASES

Renewed vigor in Idaho's residential construction industry was evident in May's building permit activity according to James Hoogland,

Jr., and Stan Merrill, manager of Kendrick and Genesee First Security Bank Branches, quoting from the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report is edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation.

The number of dwelling unit permits issued in May 1979 essentially duplicated the April 1978 total—the month with the largest residential permit volume last year, continued the report.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in May was \$62,137,537 or 10.5 percent below 1978. New residential construction for 1,244 dwelling units totaled \$40,446,273, an increase of 14.7 percent in number and an increase of 19.1 percent in value compared with a year ago. Non-residential construction valued at \$11,707,695 was down 52.1 percent below last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$9,983,569 were down 9.6 percent.

The First Security publication reports mortgage rates across the nation continued to increase in May. The single most important factor

currently affecting mortgage rates is the outflow of savings deposits (disintermediation) being experienced at many mortgage granting institutions.

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PUBLIC NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 247

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, ENACTING A NEW CHAPTER 14, TITLE 5, OF THE CITY CODE OF GENESEE, IDAHO, WITH SAID CHAPTER PROVIDING FOR DEFINITION OF TERMS; REQUIRING PERMITS AND FEES FOR INSTALLATION OF A TELEVISION SIGNAL DISTRIBUTING SYSTEM; PROVIDING FOR APPLICATION DATE, ELECTRICAL INSPECTOR'S DUTIES, RIGHTS, AND POWERS AND FOR NOTICE OF INSPECTION; REQUIRING A BOND AND TECHNICAL AND SAFETY REQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING FOR MINOR REPAIRS AND STREET EXCAVATIONS; ALLOWING OWNERS TO DO OWN WORK; COORDINATING THIS CHAPTER WITH OTHER CODES; ALLOWING FOR PREVIOUS CONSTRUCTION AND WORK; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS: The following definitions shall apply in the interpretations and enforcement of this Chapter:

(A) "Electrical Inspector" shall mean the State Electrical Inspector for the City or any of his Authorized Assistants.

(B) "Antenna" as used in this Chapter shall mean the outdoor portion of the receiving equipment used for receiving or radiating television or radio waves.

(C) "Mast" shall mean the portion of the outside antenna system to which the antenna is attached, and the support or extension required to elevate the antenna to a height deemed necessary for adequate operation.

(D) "Height" shall mean the overall vertical length of the antenna system above the ground, or, if such system be located on a building, then, above that part of the level of such building upon which the system rests.

SECTION 2. PERMIT REQUIRED

It shall be unlawful for any person to construct, maintain or repair any central mast, receiving antenna, transmission line, or booster amplifier for a television signal distributing system unless and until an inspection permit shall have first been obtained from the City Clerk.

SECTION 3. FEES:

An inspection fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be paid to the City Clerk for each permit issued hereunder. A re-inspection fee of two dollars (\$2.00) shall be paid for each trip when extra inspections are necessary due to any of the following reasons:

1. Wrong address.
2. Condemned work resulting from faulty construction.
3. Repairs or correction not made when inspection is called.
4. Work not ready for inspection when called.

SECTION 4. APPLICATION DATA

An application for a permit shall be made to the City Clerk and shall contain or have attached thereto the following information:

- (A) Name, address, and telephone number of the applicant.
- (B) Whether it is a new installation, repair, or maintenance work.
- (C) A brief description of the intended work.

(D) A plat and specification shall be filed showing the location of any mast, booster, amplifier, and transmission lines.

SECTION 5. ELECTRICAL INSPECTOR'S DUTIES, RIGHTS, AND POWERS:

(A) It shall be the duty of the Electrical Inspector and his authorized assistants to inspect all television receiving antenna installations, all central masts, all booster amplifiers, and all transmission lines for a television signal distributing system, and also all power and service connections in accordance with the provisions of the current Edition of the National Electrical Code and the provisions of the Industrial Accident Board and Electrical Board of the State of Idaho.

(B) The Electrical Inspector and his assistants are hereby empowered to inspect or re-inspect all masts, antenna, wiring, transmission lines, booster amplifiers, service lines, equipment, or apparatus, are found to be unsafe to life or property, or not in conformity with the provisions of this Chapter, the Electrical Inspector shall notify the person owning or operating the hazardous wiring, transmission lines, equipment or apparatus to correct the condition within a forty-eight hour period or within the time specified by the Electrical Inspector. Failure to correct violations within the specified time shall constitute a violation of this Chapter.

(C) It shall be unlawful for any person to hinder or interfere with the Electrical Inspector or his authorized representatives in the discharge of their duties under the provisions of this Chapter.

SECTION 6. NOTICE OF INSPECTION:

The person to whom a permit has been granted, for the installation, maintenance, or repair of a central mast, transmission lines, or booster amplifiers for a television signal distributing system, shall immediately notify the Clerk when the work covered by the permit has been completed and is ready for final inspection. Upon such notice, the Electrical Inspector or his authorized representatives

shall promptly inspect and approve the installations if the work complies in all respects with the provision of this Chapter and the permit issued, and shall disapprove said installation if it fails to comply, stating in writing the reasons for disapproval and specify a time within which said defects must be corrected. A re-inspection shall be made after notice to the Electrical Inspector that the defects have been corrected.

SECTION 7. BOND REQUIREMENT:

Every person engaged in the business of making installations of central masts, receiving antenna, transmission lines or booster amplifiers for a television signal distributing system or service connections to said transmission lines or in the business of doing repair work or maintenance work on same shall annually file with the Clerk a good and sufficient bond in the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), executed by a bonding or surety company authorized to do business in the State of Idaho, and approved by the City Attorney. Said bond shall be conditioned upon the faithful observance of all laws of the City and shall indemnify, save and keep harmless the City from any and all damages, judgments, costs or expenses which the said city may incur or suffer by reason of the granting of a permit to install, repair, or maintain antenna or transmission lines for television signal distributing systems or any services thereto. Said bond shall run to the City for its use and benefit for any damages suffered by it by reason of the permit granted hereunder or for the use and benefit of any person who may suffer injuries or property damages by reason of the permit granted hereunder. The maintenance of said bond in full force and effect shall be prerequisite to the issuance of any permit required under the provisions of this Chapter. A liability insurance policy issued by an insurance company authorized to do business in the State of Idaho which conforms to the above requirements may be permitted in lieu of a bond.

SECTION 8. TECHNICAL AND SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

All installations of television receiving antenna, central masts, transmission lines and booster amplifiers for television signal distributing systems, and all television service installations made from transmission lines, shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the current Edition of the National Electrical Code. All of said installations shall be made in conformity with the safety rules and regulations of the State Industrial Accident Board and the Electrical Board of the State of Idaho.

SECTION 9. MINOR REPAIRS WITHOUT PERMIT:

Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, minor repairs to antenna and transmission lines may be made without a permit, provided, however, that a prompt report thereof is made to the Electrical Inspector showing the extent thereof. Should an investigation of said minor repairs by the Electrical Inspector disclose defects, the same shall be pointed out and corrected as required by this Chapter.

SECTION 10. STREET EXCAVATIONS:

All street excavations required for the purpose of installing transmission lines, including pole and coaxial cable shall be governed by the provisions contained elsewhere in this code.

SECTION 11. OWNER NOT PREVENTED FROM DOING OWN WORK:

This Chapter is not intended to prevent the home owner from installing television receiving antenna on his own property or repairing and maintaining same.

SECTION 12. CO-ORDINATION WITH OTHER ADOPTED CODES:

The provisions of this Chapter shall be co-ordinated with the provisions of the Electrical, Building and Fire Prevention Codes of the City.

SECTION 13. PRIOR INSTALLATIONS:

This Chapter shall not apply to any installation, maintenance or repair of a television signal distributing system made prior to the effective date of this chapter; but the future operation of such a system and all future installations, maintenance, and repairs, made to any existing system shall be done in accordance with this Chapter.

SECTION 14. EFFECTIVE DATE:

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by the law of the State of Idaho.

ORDINANCE NO. 248

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE SIX, CHAPTER FOUR, OF THE CITY CODE OF GENESEE, IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR DEFINITIONS OF TERMS; LICENSES REQUIRED; PROHIBITING DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE; PROVIDING FOR NEW RESIDENT AND NONRESIDENT DOG OWNERS; PROVIDING FOR DOGS CAUSING DAMAGE OR INJURY; PROHIBITING THE REMOVAL OF DOG TAGS; PROVIDING FOR PUNISHMENT FOR VIOLATIONS AND

PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO:

SECTION 1. That section 6-4-1 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

6-4-1. DEFINITIONS

DOG: The term "Dog" within the meaning of this Chapter is hereby declared to be a dog over the age of six (6) months.

AT LARGE: The phrase "At Large" shall be intended to mean off the premises of the owner and not under the control of the owner or a member of his household or an agent or employee of the owner by leash, cord, chain, or other physical restraint.

LEASH: The term "Leash" shall be intended to mean a cord, chain, or rope of the length to restrict the dog to the owner's property and when the dog is off the owner's property, the leash shall not be more than eight feet (8') in length.

SECTION 2. That section 6-4-2 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

6-4-2. LICENSES REQUIRED:

All dogs kept, harbored or maintained by their owners in the City shall be licensed. Any person having charge of any dog in the City shall on or before the fifteenth day of January of each year make application to the Clerk for a license for said dog. The Clerk shall collect from each applicant the following license fee:

(A) For each male and spayed female dog the sum of three dollars (\$3.00).

(B) For each unspayed female dog the sum of five dollars (\$5.00). Each applicant for license shall present to the Clerk evidence satisfactory to him that every dog over six (6) months of age has been inoculated against rabies according to standard veterinary practices and each applicant for the license of a spayed female shall present evidence satisfactory to the Clerk that said female has been spayed prior to issuing any license. Upon application, payment of fees and submission of evidence or rabies, inoculation and spaying as required, the Clerk shall issue to the applicant a receipt designating the name of the applicant, the number of the license to be issued, sex of the dog, amount to be paid by the applicant and a metal tag bearing the number corresponding to that on the receipt. It shall be unlawful for anyone to make a false statement on said application for license. A charge of twenty-five cents (.25) shall be made for each lost license tag replaced and issued by the Clerk when requested by the person having charge of any licensed dog. "Seeing eye" dogs properly trained to assist blind persons when such dogs are actually used by blind persons for the purpose of aiding them in going from place to place shall be licensed without charge and shall be exempt from the provisions of this Chapter.

SECTION 3. That section 6-4-3 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

6-4-3 DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE

No owner or keeper of any dog shall permit such dog to run at large within the Corporate Limits of the City at any time and any person may take up such dog and deliver the same to the Dog Catcher. In any prosecution under this section, it shall not be necessary to allege or prove any intent on the part of the owner or keeper of a dog to allow or permit such dog to run at large.

SECTION 4.

That section 6-4-5 of the City Code of Genesee be and the same hereby is, repealed.

SECTION 5

That section 6-4-7 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

6-4-7 NON RESIDENTS AND NEW RESIDENTS:

Any licensing provisions of this chapter shall not apply to any dog owned by nonresidents, or to dogs brought into the City for exhibition purposes. New residents and new owners shall purchase licenses at the regular fee within thirty (30) days of acquisition of a dog or establishment of residency.

SECTION 6:

That section 6-4-9 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, repealed.

SECTION 7:

That section 6-4-10 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

6-4-10. PROCLAMATION OF MAYOR:

The Mayor is hereby authorized and empowered to issue a proclamation upon order of the Council when the prevalence of rabies in the City and vicinity deems it necessary, calling attention to the public to the necessity of complying with the provisions of this chapter.

SECTION 8.

That section 6-4-12 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

6-4-7. DOGS CAUSING DAMAGE OR INJURY

After complaint of damage or injury caused by a dog, either on or off the owner's or keeper's property, with evidence of injury, has been made to the Dog Catcher, the Dog Catcher shall prepare to serve a no-

tice upon the owner or keeper of the dog complained of, informing him of the same or injury caused by such dog. After being served with such notice, and owner or keeper of the dog complained of who willfully, or negligently fails, neglects, or refuses to keep such dog securely confined within an adequate enclosure or physically restrained by a leash when not under the immediate care or control, and physical presence of a competent and responsible attendant or master shall be guilty of a violation of this chapter.

SECTION 9.

That section 6-4-14 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, repealed.

SECTION 10.

That section 6-4-15 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

6-4-14: VIOLATION TO REMOVE TAG:

It shall be a violation of this chapter for any person to remove the tag or collar provided for in this chapter from any dog except the rightful owner.

SECTION 11:

That section 6-4-17 of the City Code of Genesee, be and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

6-4-17: VIOLATION AND PUNISHMENT

Any person who violated any provision of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by the imposition of a fine of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

EFFECTIVE DATE:

SECTION 13

This Ordinance shall take effect and be a full force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by the law of the State of Idaho.

PASSED under suspension of rules upon which the roll call vote was duly taken and duly enacted an Ordinance of the City of Genesee, at a Regular Meeting of the City Council held on June 4, 1979.
