## Tigers Outlasted Prairie 19-18; Bulldogs Edged By Timberline 20-14

Kendrick's Tigers withstood a final quarter passing assault by the visiting Prairie Pirates last Friday night to win the opening game of the 1979 football season 19-18. Up in Genesee, the same night, the hard luck Bulldogs out did the Timberline Spartans in 11 departments with the scoring one and dropped a 20-14 decision in a non-league game.

**Tigers Hold On**  
The Kendrick Tigers opened up a 13-0 first quarter lead, saw it cut to 1 point, 13-12 at the half, scored again in the third quarter and had to withstand a closing rush by the Pirates to win 19-18.

Prairie dominated the opening minutes of the game as the Tigers fought a battle of first game jitters. With less than four minutes remaining in the first, Rex Snyder intercepted a Prairie Pass on the Pirate 18 yard line and went down to the 10. Kendrick moved the ball to the 1 yard line where Terry Hudson, a hard-running sophomore back, cracked through the line to score. Tony Moran converted the extra point kick.

Hudson scored again in the second quarter from 8 yards out to climax a Tiger drive of sixty yards. This time the extra point kick failed. "We lost some of our intensity late in the second period," Coach Darrin Munden said Tuesday morning. As the Tigers let down for a few minutes the Pirates came back to score two touchdowns, one on a 15 yard pass play and the other on a 6 yard run, but failed to convert either point, which was to prove the difference in the game.

Hudson set up the final Tiger score in the third quarter with a forty yard run and Dale Wolff banged into the line for 2 yards and six points. A run attempt at the conversion was no good. Prairie unleashed a good passing attack and moved the ball well, aided by penalties assessed against the Tigers who ended the evening with 125 yards in penalties. With 2:12 left in the game, Prairie scored again but failed to convert and the clock ran out.

While he wasn't pleased totally over the game, Munden saw enough promise that he was optimistic about the team's coming season. He had high praise for the defensive work of Richard Wolff and Dale Wolff and Bill Leonard, who came into the game and helped the team. The Tigers should also have Duane Howerton back in the lineup for the game Friday night against Genesee.

**Hardluck Bulldogs**  
An interception, a blocked punt and a play called back on a questionable call, gave the Timberline Spartans a 20-14 win over the Genesee Bulldogs. Timberline ran up a 14-0 first quarter lead on a 25 yard run and then intercepted a Genesee pitchout to score again. Genesee came back in the second quarter to score on a two yard run by Darrell Stout. Tim Stout ran over the extra two points. In the second period Timberline, who was almost being shut off offensively by the Bulldog defensive, came up with a blocked punt on the Bulldog 15 and ran over for another six points.

Mark Kanikkeberg scored for the Bulldogs in the final quarter from three yards but Genesee couldn't make the extra points. Genesee could have tied the game on a run by Tim Stout but the play was called back when the officials ruled that Stout didn't have the required mouthpiece in place. Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg said after the game that the mouthpiece was lost during the play, which could have permitted the run to count, but the officials ruled the mouthpiece wasn't in place when the play began, which prompted the Genesee coach to wonder why the officials didn't whistle the play dead before it began if they saw Stout didn't have his mouthpiece in place.

Genesee At Kendrick Friday  
Hoping to shake its bad luck, the Bulldogs come down to Kendrick Friday night. Ozzie will be bringing a line that averages out at about 170 with Mike Burt at split end, Steve Haxton and Brad Roach at tackles, Steve Becker and Jay Anderson at guards, Dave Swenson at center and Jim Cvancara at tight end. Eddie Reynolds, Tim Stout, Mark Kanikkeberg and Darrell Stout will fill out the back field.

## Loren Kambitsch, Nez Perce County Agent, Retires

Moscow —After 33½ years as a University of Idaho extension agricultural agent in north central Idaho, R. Loren Kambitsch is retiring. Kambitsch, who worked in Nez Perce County for nearly a quarter century, stepped down as chairman today (Aug. 31). A successor is being sought.

Following graduation from the University of Idaho in 1943 with a degree in agronomy, he saw action with the U. S. Army during World War II in Europe. A Genesee native, he began his extension career in 1946 as 4-H agent in Nez Perce County.

Seven months later, he was promoted to agricultural agent for Benewah county and moved to St. Maries. Kambitsch served there for 9 years before returning to Nez Perce in October 1955.

While in St. Maries, he conducted field tests of nitrogen fertilizer on the prairies and of phosphorous fertilizer on the St. Joe flats. He was secretary of the local dairymen's and cattlemen's associations and of the county fair board.

In addition, Kambitsch said 4-H programs were "well supported, and we had an active forest management program because an extension forester was headquartered at St. Maries."

Since returning to Nez Perce county, he has helped form and was first secretary of the Idaho Wheat Growers Association. He also has been secretary of the Idaho Pea and Lentil Commission.

Kambitsch initiated a certified seed program in the county which, combined with similar efforts at producing disease-free seed stocks in neighboring counties, developed into the North Idaho Foundation Seed Association.

"We also have developed quite a test pilot program," he remarked. "Focusing on winter wheat varieties, they are used to demonstrate new varieties, determine yield and test behavior under local growing conditions."

Kambitsch is a past president of the Idaho County Agents Association and the Idaho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Phi extension honorary. He has won a distinguished service award from the National Association of County Agricultural Agents and an outstanding work award from Epsilon Sigma Phi.

Kambitsch has been chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the Greater Lewiston Chamber of Commerce and a director of the Idaho Noxious Weed Association. He served on the State Extension Advisory Committee in 1970-71.


Indicating his retirement plans include hunting, fishing and golfing, Kambitsch said he and his wife Gale plan to remain at Lewiston. They have two sons—Bob of Boise and Don, a senior in plant protection at University of Idaho College of Agriculture.

What happened 20 yrs. ago (1919)

**Residential Building  
Activity Slows Down**

Residential building permit activity in July registered a significant decline relative to the previous month as well as a year ago, according to James Hoogland, Jr., manager of First Security Bank and Stan Merrill, manager of First Security's Genesee Branch, quoting from the Idaho Construction Report, a publication of First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. The report is edited by Dr. Kelly Matthews, vice president and economist for First Security Corporation.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 54 major Idaho locations in July was \$38,286,548 or 5.1 percent above 1978. New

residential construction for 608 dwelling units totaled \$23,532,978, a decrease of 17.1 percent in number and an increase of 5.9 percent in value compared with a year ago.

Nonresidential construction valued at \$7,460,828 was up 26.5 percent above last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$7,292,742 were down 12.1 percent.

According to the report, nonresidential building permit construction in Idaho totaled \$75,568,436 during the first seven months of 1979, a decrease of 7.5 percent below the same period a year ago. In this January-July period, nonresidential construction in Boise was \$28.9 million, Nampa accounted for \$7.4 million and Lewiston had \$5.7 million.

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

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## Genesee School District Policy For Free, Reduced Price Milk and Meals

Philip Stanley, Superintendent of Genesee Joint School District No. 232, today announced its policy for (free and reduced-price meals, free milk) for children served under the National School Lunch, and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility.

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Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child and disaster or casualty losses are urged to attend.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the main office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of income and family size is required, plus a signed certification by

the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal Funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and Federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, Mrs. Karen O'Neil, School Lunch Supervisor, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to (Bill Haxton, Genesee, Idaho 285-1185) for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure. If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, or national origin.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

### SUMMER HEALTH ILLS ARE PRODUCT OF HEAT

#### Summer Ills Named

Winter is the favorite time for colds and flu and sneezes, but there are some health and accident hazards that do their worst in hot weather.

Sun strokes and heat strokes are more likely to occur in July and August than in January. Too much exposure and too much exercise in hot sun may produce sun stroke. Prolonged excessive heat, either in or out of doors, can cause heat stroke. The symptoms are similar and in either case it is important to keep the victim cool and call a physician at once.

Sunburn has hospitalized many a vacationer, the AMA reminds. Everyone should know that gradual exposure to the sun, beginning with a few minutes a day, is the recommended course. But many of us forget to watch the clock and take precautions against sunburn in the excitement of the first day at camp or at the seashore. Swimming is a fine exercise and al-

so is good for cooling off on a hot day. Those with sinus or ear troubles should be careful about swimming. Swimmers should make certain that the water is safe from pollution. A clear mountain stream may look beautiful, and also be loaded with germs. Campers can disinfect drinking water by boiling or by commercial tablets.

If there are horses or cows around, there is likely to be tetanus. Tetanus, or lockjaw, is very serious. It can be prevented by injections of tetanus toxoid. If your family hasn't had tetanus boosters recently, get your shots before going to the country.

Flies, roaches, mosquitoes and ticks are troublesome in hot months. Insecticides and screens usually can keep them under control. In tick country it is essential to make a close examination after disrobing to remove all ticks.—August, 1979. Frank Chappell Science News Editor, AMA.

### Cookin' ...

Our recipes for this week were sent in by a former Genesee resident, Mrs. Jean R. (Bertha Gash) Edgar of Kern City, Ca. They sound delicious. Homemakers are always looking for something new and different to serve their family and friends, and I'm sure you'll enjoy trying Mrs. Edgar's recipes.

#### Tater Tot Casserole

Serves 6-8  
1 lb. raw, ground beef (or more)  
1/2 large onion—chopped  
3/4 lb. sharp cheddar cheese  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1/3 can milk  
Tater Tots

Crumble the ground, raw beef in the bottom of a 12x7" baking dish. Add a little pepper, no salt necessary. Sprinkle generously with chopped onion. Mrs. Edgar uses frozen chopped onions.

Heat together until sugar is dissolved. Add—

1/2 cup salad oil and 1 tsp. each of salt and pepper  
Chop and add—  
1 cup celery  
1 cup green pepper  
6 green onions with tops

Then add—  
1-16 oz. can French style green beans  
1-16 oz. can LeSever brand tiny peas  
1-12-oz can shoe peg corn, (tiny white) all drained—mix well, and small jar of chopped pimentoes

Put in jar and refrigerate. Will keep 2 weeks if you can leave it alone. This makes about one and a half qts.

#### Raspberry Shrub

Raspberry Shrub—Mrs. Edgar says it is something she enjoys serving at a late Sunday morning brunch instead of fruit or juice.

Into small, individual glass dishes put 1 small scoop of raspberry sherbert. Pour over sherbert a small amount of chilled cranberry juice cocktail. She never measures the cranberry juice but probably about 1/3 cup would be enough. Her family even likes this as a "picker upper" on a hot afternoon.

#### Desserts

Pink Dessert.  
1-6 oz. pkg. strawberry jello

1-20 oz. can crushed pineapple—unsweetened  
2 cups buttermilk  
9 oz. Cool Whip  
Heat pineapple to boil and add jello. Stir well—cool till thick like egg whites. Add buttermilk, let thicken, fold in Cool Whip and refrigerate. Mrs. Edgar suggests an 8x8x2" pyrex dish.

Could serve at least 8.

#### Pistachio Pudding Dessert

1-20 oz. can crushed pineapple, unsweetened  
1 pkg. pistachio instant pudding mix  
2 cups miniature marshmallows  
1-9 oz. Cool Whip

Mix pineapple and pudding mix together well. Fold in marshmallows and Cool Whip. Refrigerate. This makes about the same quantity as the Pink Dessert.

#### Coconut Cream Dessert

Use 9" by 13" pan Serves 10-12

#### First layer—

1/4 cup brown sugar  
1 cup flour  
1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted  
1/2 cup chopped nuts, optional  
Mix well, press in bottom of oiled pan. Bake at 350 d. 15 min. Cool

#### Second layer—

8-oz. cream cheese (softened)  
1 cup powdered sugar  
1/2 of 12-oz carton Cool Whip  
Cream softened cream cheese and powdered sugar. Fold in Cool Whip and spread over first layer.

#### Third layer—

2 pkgs. coconut cream instant pudding mix (small) and 3 cups of milk. Beat till thick. Spread on 2nd layer.

#### Fourth layer—

Spread rest of Cool Whip over pudding layer. Sprinkle with coconut or nuts.

Refrigerate overnight. Can be frozen for a period of time. Serves 10-12.

Our cook says this recipe is delicious with almost any flavor of Instant Pudding mix. She has used chocolate, pistachio, butterscotch, lemon with a dash of fresh lemon and all have been good. She likes to divide the recipe into 2 equal sized pans. She freezes one and uses the other.

This might sound quite involved, she adds, but it really isn't.

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## Some Back Country Units Open for Deer, Elk September 12

Seven big game management units and portions of 2 others in the heart of Idaho's back country open for general deer and elk hunting, September 12.

The hunts are for antlered elk only and either sex deer. Seasons are longer than normal because hunting pressure tends to be light, according to the Department of Fish and Game.

All of the units are accessible only by airplane or horseback.

Seasons in unit 16A, 17, 20, 20A, 26, 27, 27A and a portion of unit 19 are from September 12 through November 18. Part of unit 12 is open from September 12 through October 28.

A refresher course in the regulations will familiarize hunters with unit boundaries, says the department's bureau of enforcement, and knowledge of the basic rules can make a day easier for the hunter and the conservation officer.

A legal bull elk, the regulations state, is one of the antlers longer than the ears and an antlered deer must have at least one branched antler.

In hunts restricted to male animals, evidence of sex must remain attached. The regulations give exact instructions for compliance.

## Regulation Change Noted for Game Bird Seasons

With September 15 openers at hand for most upland game birds, the Department of Fish and Game advises hunters of a change in the regulation governing identification of species and sex.

Hunters this year will be required to retain a full feathered wing or the head on all dressed game birds while they are being transported.

The change makes the regulation consistent with the requirement for identification of waterfowl.

Seasons for Hungarian partridge, chukar, quail, blue, ruffed and spruce grouse, sage and sharp-tailed grouse and wild turkeys open September 15.

The forest grouse opener is three days earlier, September 12, in those areas opening for general deer and elk hunting the same day.

Season lengths, hunting areas and limits vary. They are shown in the regulations, which the department expected to distribute about Sept. 1.

Pheasant seasons open October 13 in northern Idaho and October 27 in the remainder of the state.
